





## Licensing fun

# • HB 150: Trampoline Park Safety Standards

- Requires trampoline parts to maintain local business licenses, get annual inspections, display certain signage, monitor operations, and carry insurance.
- Local government may revoke or refuse to renew business licenses if parks fail to comply.

# • HB 381: Amusement Ride Safety

- Creates the Utah Amusement Ride Safety Act and Committee under DOT
- Ensure that operators are properly inspected/permitted for your summer events.



## Licensing beer

- HB 202: Off-premise Beer Retailer Amendments
  - Clean-up of last year's bill
  - Clarifies who needs training to get an off-premise license
  - No direct impact on cities, but retailers that fail to complete training and licensing will lose the ability to sell beer.

- HB 453: Alcohol Amendments
  - Laundry list of changes
- SB 132: Beer Amendments
  - Defines "heavy beer" 5% by weight – and "beer" – 4% by weight







# Licensing food trucks, of course

# SB 71: Food Truck Amendments

- Clarifies that the license applies to the business, not the individual.
- Clarifies that you can't require a permit or fee for a truck to operate at a private event.
- Food trucks can remain in place for the duration of an event if other food vendors can.
- Fees are limited to the actual cost of processing.

## Licensing nicotine

- HB 338: Changes to Tobacco Retail Permit
  - Changes "person" to "retail tobacco specialty business" to clarify that the permit is tied to the location, not the person.
- HB 252: E-Cigarette and Other Nicotine Product Amendments (NOT PASSED)
  - Would have moved e-cigarettes, vaping products, and other nicotine products under the "other tobacco product" regulations and taxing policy.

- HB 324: Tobacco Age Amendments
  - Enacts Tobacco 21 law statewide
  - Beginning July 1, 2020, a person must be 20 to purchase tobacco/e-cigarette product.
  - Beginning July 1, 2021, a person must be 21 to purchase.



## Licensing other stuff

- HB 18: Massage Therapy Practice Act Amendments
  - Exempts a bowenwork practitioner from massage therapist licensure.
- HB 23: Gambling Machines Amendments
  - Defines a "fringe gaming device" and clarifies that it is a form of gambling.


- HB 258: Sexually Oriented Business License Amendments
  - Increases the penalty for operating a sexually oriented business without a license from a Class B misdemeanor to a Class A misdemeanor.

# SB 139: Motor Assisted Transportation Amendments

- E-scooters: don't ride them while drunk
- Gives locals some flexibility to regulate where they can be staged and ridden.
- Insurance and indemnification

### Production/cultivation establishments (4-41a-201)

- Maximum number of 10 (8 have been announced)
- Must have a local business license in order to get a state license from the Dep't of Ag
- May not deny a business license on the basis that it is a cannabis business
- May enforce business license regs like you would any other business

- Applicant must demonstrate the proposed production facility is consistent with zoning
- City must allow in industrial or agricultural zone
- May not be within 1000 feet of a community location or 600 feet of primarily residential use zone (city can waive)
- Dep't of Ag will consult with local land use authority before approving more than 1 location

## Cannabis pharmacy (26-61a-301)

- Maximum number of 7-10 (7 through 2021; if central fill is not operational than 1 new license could be issued every 6 months
- Must have a local business license to get a license from the Dep't of Health
- Dep't of Health is in process of collecting applications now
- City may not deny license on the sole basis it is for a cannabis pharmacy

- May enforce business license regulations like any other business
- State must ensure geographic dispersal among licensees
- Applicant must demonstrate the pharmacy is consistent with zoning; city can't deny in ag or industrial
- May not be within 600 feet of community location or area zoned primarily residential (city may waive)
- May enact time, place, manner of operations ordinance



### Other cannabis considerations

- SB 161: Medical Cannabis Act Amendments
  - Clarifications to HB 3001 including transport, testing, & protections for parents of minor patients.
  - DHRM also working on a form that political subdivision employers will give to employees informing them that job duties may violate federal law.





## Outdoor sign enforcement

- HB 254: Unlawful Outdoor Advertising Amendments
  - Allows UDOT to issue a citation and levy a fine for a person guilty of unlawful outdoor advertising without a required permit.
  - Off-premise sign enforcement

- HB 343: Development Advertising Amendments
  - Requires cities to meet certain notice requirements for public hearings or meetings when illuminated sign regulations or applications are considered.
  - 500 foot radius of sign site
  - Property owners must commence construction within one year after sign is installed.

# HB 148: Vehicle Idling Revisions

 Reduces required warnings from 3 to 1 before a city can issue a citation under an anti-idling ordinance

# HB 139: Motor Vehicle Emissions Amendments

- It is a traffic violation to intentionally spew exhaust at a vulnerable person in a non-attainment area.
- Enhances penalties for people who illegally modify diesel vehicles.

### Code enforcement

# SB 184: Code Enforcement Amendments

 Must give written notice of a violation, specify the violation, and allow a reasonable time to cure before collecting a fine.

#### SB 250: Graffiti Amendments


• City must give "victim of graffiti" notice and one week to remove; financial hardship provision.

SB 90: Political Signs Amendments (NOT PASSED)

SB 107: Nuisance Amendments (NOT PASSED)

We'll probably see both of these next year.





### Other enforcement

# SB 93: Agricultural Nuisance Amendments

 An agricultural operation operating in accordance with sound practices and local regulations is presumed not to be a nuisance.

# Other enforcement


# HB 228: Towing revisions

- Addresses rotation issues
- As of Jan. 2, 2021, cities may not charge towing companies a few to be included in a towing rotation.
- Cities must also provide an appeals process for towing companies that are suspended or removed from a towing rotation.

# HB 394: Pawnshop & Secondhand Merchandise Amendments

- Requires certain recordkeeping by pawnshops.
- Yearly database training for law enforcement.
