On Sunday November 24 the Sovereign Grand Commander of The Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of Canada, David Bennett, together with Jim and Linda Stanley cut the ribbon to Truro open the new Satellite Learning Centre. The Halifax Centre was incorporated in 2009 and currently has 80 children enrolled and 65 tutors!

This brings the number of SRCF Learning Centres in Canada to nine with one satellite and one centre (Niagara) in the planning stages.

From our Tutor-Trainer

The fall seems to have just slipped by so quickly! It is hard to believe that our new tutors have been tutoring since early October. These tutors are welcome additions to our Learning Centre family and their children are settled in and already show signs of pride with their progress.

The fall has been busy with training sessions for these new tutors, and especially with in person observations. The tutors are required to have at least eight observations completed in order to become certified Orton-Gillingham Practitioners. These observations start soon after tutoring begins in order for the trainer to ensure that the lessons are being delivered according to OG standards of practice. The tutors are expected to get high marks when observed to show that they are following all the steps of an Orton-Gillingham lesson with precision and fidelity. The precision and pace of a lesson is critical as we rewire children's dyslexic brains to automatically decode and encode English words accurately and quickly.

I am pleased to report that these new tutors are off to a skillful start! Other observations were also conducted with Centre tutor trainees who are further along with their training. Understandably, being watched with such focus takes getting used to. In many ways, becoming a Certified OG Practitioner is an intensive apprenticeship process resulting in a close-knit community of very skilled interventionists. We are truly luck to have such a high caliber of tutors making such a difference in the lives of our children and their families.
