### South Suburban's Matching Gifts Program

Back in 2020 the AGHOA submitted an application to South Suburban's Matching Gifts Program. Due to the pandemic, the program was suspended for last year. So this year we have been advised that our application will be considered again.

The Matching Gifts Program through South Suburban Parks and Recreation District, provides a way for individuals, neighborhoods, homeowner associations, sports groups, businesses, and other organizations to join with South Suburban Parks and Recreation (SSPR) in the development of their particular projects.

Projects that are less than \$2,000 are more likely to be approved for funding than requests in excess of that amount. The AGHOA has, over the years, submitted suggestions. Some have been approved and some not.

Some projects that have been approved were for the picnic table in the rest area next to the trail on the east side of the neighborhood. Another was for the covered picnic table and barbecue stand in Altair Park.

Our proposal was for the redesign of both the north and east entrances around the Acres Green signs. These two areas, especially the north entrance, need a makeover. The ugly green bushes have grown over the years to the point they obscure the sign.

As a result, we have worked with Larry Hurd, the horticulturalist from SSPR. He has come up with a plan to reinvigorate both entrances. We should hear if our plan is approved sometime in March or early April. The cost for the project is roughly \$1,700. If approved the AGHOA would be responsible for about \$850.

### **Architectural Control Committee**

Yes, Spring is upon us and what a good feeling it is! Keep in mind that significant snow can still fall in April (our 2nd heaviest month), but it is a good time to plan and begin any outdoor projects.

Thank you to those of you who have shared potential plans with me for out buildings and workshops. My goal is to help you understand Douglas County codes and regulations. Also, to help you navigate through the paperwork required by the County. Hopefully you have found the people at the Building Dept friendly and helpful.

Couple of notes based on the covenants for each filing:

Sheds and other buildings should conform to the setbacks on sides and rear of property lines. i.e. No building shall be located nearer than (5 feet to an interior lot line for filings 1 through 4), (8 feet to an interior lot line for filings 5 & 6). No building shall be located on any interior lot nearer than (15 feet to the rear lot line for filings 1 through 4) (25 feet to the rear lot line for filings 5 & 6).

You can check your covenants to determine what filing you are in.

Do not assume the fences are on the property line. Rolloff dumpsters and containers are allowed on your property, not on the street, per Douglas County codes. Douglas County has the authority to enforce their codes.

Just as a reminder; if you have any doubts about a project, even inside your home, contact or visit the Douglas County Building Dept in Castle Rock. Their number is 303-660-7497 — Dial 0 for Building Dept. You can also contact me and I will do my best to help you and point you in the right direction

# The Good and the Bad

### The Bad.

In my last bee article, I wrote about the death of both of our hives from the bad freeze/wind we had late last year. It was really disheartening to see the top of one hive blown off, but more so was to find all the bees were dead. Both Jean and I discussed what to do next, and we decided that we would give it one more try this spring.

When the weather got better (some days) I started to take the hives apart and to get the frames and boxes ready for the new bees. It was somewhat depressing to find the bees were dead. On some frames there was a huddled mass, 10-15 bees, where they died in place. We were really disappointed in the type of bee.

When we first started five or so years ago, we went with Italian bees. Last year we decided to try a different variant of bee; Carniolan bees. We were led to believe that they were heartier and more capable of surviving the arid weather of Colorado. Not so much. So as of this writing, I'm still in the process of getting ready for the new bees.

#### The Good.

After the downer of losing the two hives, something positive did happen. As I wrote, they died, not of starvation, but from cold and wind. What they left behind was honey and quite a bit of honey.

After I started cleaning out the dead bees, from the 32 frames (16 frames in each hive) we were able to scrouge up enough frames to harvest honey! I guestimate we had maybe 6 frames worth of honey.

So the week before the big blizzard when the temperature got into the 60's, Jean and I started to "spin" the frames. When it was all said and done, we were able to gather just a little over three quarters of a gallon of honey.

That should hopefully get me through my need for coffee sweetener until we can harvest again.

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



### **Indoor Air Pollution and Seniors**

Poor indoor air quality can be detrimental to the health of senior citizens. Here are some tips for improving indoor air quality.

- **1. Use natural ventilation.** Opening windows and doors can clear the air, or spot-ventilate at some common pollution sources, like kitchen and bathroom exhaust fans and dryer vent are working properly. These fans remove moisture that could lead to mold growth.
- 2. Change the furnace and air-conditioner filters. Forced-air heating and cooling systems filters should be changed regularly, at least at the start of the heating season and the cooling season if a central air-conditioner is part of the system.
- **3.** Use non-polluting products. Limit indoor air pollution by cutting down on the products that can cause the pollution. Paints, adhesives, cleaning products, solvents and building products, also carpets and other types of flooring, can produce fumes that may be harmful. Look for low-VOC products (volatile organic compounds). Most VOCs are harmless, but some can produce dizziness, headaches, eye and nose and throat irritation.
- **4. Test and monitor.** Have your home tested for radon and install carbon monoxide detectors.

Radon is an odorless, invisible gas that is a byproduct of the decay of uranium that occurs naturally in some soil. If it finds its way into your home, it can lead to serious illness. You can do the test yourself, and test kits are relatively inexpensive.

Carbon monoxide (CO) is another odorless, invisible gas that can cause you harm. CO is

a byproduct of combustion, and there are a number of possible in-home sources, including unvented kerosene heaters, fireplaces, gas-fired water heaters and space-heating equipment that are not properly vented.

A car idling in an attached garage can also be the cause of CO in the home. A CO detector will alert you to a problem before it can harm you. Many building codes require CO detectors in new homes. The Environmental Protection Agency recommends installing one on every level of your home.

### Indoor Gardening for Seniors: Health Benefits and Tips to Get Started

According to a study by the Journal of Preventative Medicine Reports, growing plants improves mood, lowers anxiety and increases wellness.

Nurturing plants also helps maintain existing skills that provide pleasure and confidence at a time when memory loss or physical decline can affect people's self-confidence.

Spending daily time with plants may reduce the likelihood of dementia by up to 36%, according to a 16-year study of 2,800 seniors conducted at St. Vincent's Hospital in New South Wales, Australia.

Nurturing plants provides similar satisfaction to caring for another human, and is a great way to maintain the physical and emotional benefits of the nurturing experience.

People are happier when they see something beautiful. In addition to the visual benefits of nature, oxygen produced by plants has a relaxing effect on the body and encourages deep, steady breathing.
