A Little History About Acres Green

Acres Green Covenants and the Architectural Control Committee (ACC)

Yes, covenants exist for all homes in Acres Green. There is one set for each two filings. On May 19, 1972 covenants for filings one and two were recorded with Douglas County. Filings three and four covenants were recorded May 1, 1973, and filings five and six covenants were recorded February 25, 1976. The covenants were created to govern items not covered by county planning and zoning. The biggest difference between the covenants for each filing are the setbacks.

A copy of the covenants should be provided to new homeowners at closing. A copy should also be included in the welcome package provided by the AGHOA.

The Architectural Control Committee (ACC) was formed to operate within the power granted by the neighborhood covenants and to act as a liaison between the community and higher authorities (Douglas County and the State of Colorado). The ACC reviews architectural changes or new construction requests to ensure they are in keeping with the integrity of the community. The ACC is not a policing entity.

When building permits are required, the request must first be approved by the ACC. Residents are bound by Douglas County building and zoning regulations.

In 1985 a move was made to prepare to strengthen the covenants for all filings when they were eligible for modification. No record of these suggested modifications is available. According to the covenants, for each filing, they can be modified by 51% of the property owners in that filing 25 years after they were first recorded. Filings one and two were eligible for modification in 1997. Regardless of modifications or not, the covenants run with the land and are renewed automatically if not modified.

In 1996, a committee was formed to revise the covenants beginning with filings 1 & 2. Many long hours of meetings and door to door contacts took place. In 1997 having owners of only 41 homes out of 195 respond positively to the amendment of covenants, no changes were made to filings 1 & 2. After that, no further action was conducted on filings 3—6.

The covenants, which run with the land, are separate from the Acres Green Home Owners' Association (AGHOA) and are not enforced through the AGHOA. Residents are encouraged to talk with neighbors regarding disputes. Disputes that cannot be resolved between homeowners can go to small claims court. The AGHOA can join a homeowner in a dispute, but cannot institute a lawsuit, as it does not own property.



Updates from the Architectural Control Committee

Jim Hope ACC

As always, my goal is to help you understand Douglas County codes and regulations and to help you navigate through the paperwork required by the County for indoor and outdoor building projects.

A couple of topics have come up over the last couple of months.

Retaining walls: The County requirement reads: A building permit and engineered design is required for a retaining wall when the wall is over 4 feet in height measured from the top of the wall to the bottom of the footing.

Note that the requirement is from the top of wall to the bottom of the footing. Please note that the bottom of the footing is the requirement, not the surface grade level. There are other requirements as well. Be sure to ask at the building department if you have questions.

Artificial lawns (Astroturf): There are no current Douglas County regulations as to the installation of artificial lawns within Douglas County. This is consistent with the County not regulating landscaping.

For those of you who desire a natural lawn, Spring is the time

to apply a pre-emergent weed control and fertilizer. When the lawn is growing healthy and robust, a broadband weed and feed fertilizer is adequate to continue to kill weeds and provide nutrients to the lawn grass. During the fall a post-emergent fertilizer is recommended. All types are available at hardware, garden and home stores.

The Douglas County Building Dept in Castle Rock can be reached at 303-660-7497 – Dial 0 for Building Dept. You can also contact me, and I will do my best to help you and point you in the right direction.

Issues regarding public right-of-way (roads) are under the authority of the Douglas County Sheriff, who can be reached at a non-emergency phone number; 303-660-7505.

Issues regarding activities at residences which are disturbing to the neighborhood are under the authority of Douglas County Zoning Compliance; phone number 303-660-7460.

Many thanks to all the thoughtful, considerate neighbors who took the time and trouble to clear the sidewalks from recent snow falls.

Students walking to school or bus stops, parents with baby carriages, seniors and others walking their dogs and those just getting out for some exercise greatly appreciate those of you who do clear the sidewalks.

Did you know that within 24 hours of snow stopping you are supposed to shovel your sidewalk? The Douglas County Sheriff Office can be called to report ice- and snow-covered sidewalks at 303-660-7505, the non-emergency number. They can send an officer out to give a warning regarding snow removal.

The sun comes out and starts the melting process, so please do your part and get out there. If you are going to be gone or need help, ask your neighbor kid to help out.

I generally clear several sidewalks with the snow blower – it doesn't kill me and I enjoyed it.



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Here it is the middle of March, and I'm not sure if the bees like March or not. First it got cold, then the very warm days (greater than 50 degrees) and then it got cold and snowy again.

I do know one thing, we still have both hives alive and kicking! The four days where it almost reached 70 degrees, the bees, or at least the foragers, were out and searching for food.

At first I thought there isn't anything out there for them but apparently I was wrong. I would sit in front of the hives, six feet away, and watch them. I finally saw several of the bees bringing pollen back to the hive. It wasn't the orange color but more of a grayish color.

In a few weeks when the temps get reasonable, we will start checking the health of the hives, checking/applying a mite treatment, and deciding whether we want to split the hives into additional hives.

Since we already have two, I'm not sure what we will do. One thing for certain is we will need to do some major cleaning, removing the tar paper wrap, as well as swapping the hive boxes, switching the top for the bottom, removing the bottom board and cleaning out the bottom of the hive – a lot of dead bees.

You might wonder why we swap the boxes. The bees cluster and throughout the winter they basically eat the honey. They started near the bottom last winter and back in the middle of January I found that the cluster had moved to the top of the hive.

This told me they were running out of food stores. I had to supplement them with granular sugar by putting a sheet of newsprint right on the top of the frames where I poured four pounds of granular sugar out for them. The bees ate through the paper to reach the sugar. By switching the boxes the cluster will now be on the bottom where they need to start getting ready for new bees and honey storage.

The bees work from the bottom up so they will have an empty box to start working on. All this will be happening between the middle of April and the first week or so of May. Can't wait for spring!

Watch for Allergies



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

He mentioned that someone adjacent to the property has to complain before the county will take action on a property. Douglas County Zoning is the agency to call, their number is: 303-660-7460.

One resident had a question regarding the setbacks on property, which are stated in the covenants. Jim suggested they go to the county and talk to the building dept.

There was also a question regarding the proposal to put 5G towers in the community. There was approval to put in a couple of those towers in the community a couple of years ago. One at Lonesome Pine Park and another near Acres Green Dr. and Mercury Cr. No towers have been put up yet. We have not heard the status.

Brandon mentioned the topic regarding increasing participation and membership online. He is looking at improving our website and making more information available online.

Another order of business was speeding on Maximus Dr. The county has proposed changes to Maximus Dr. to reduce speeding including restriping and narrowing the lanes by designating parking and bicycle lanes. The new pavement markings will be installed in the spring when more paint becomes available. The Douglas County Staff has also requested stepped up enforcement of the 25 MPH speed limit on Maximus Dr. Another issue on Maximus Dr. was the gate into the apt. complex that has been open. One resident brought that up to the apt. complex manager. Ron got an e-mail from the apt. manager regarding that issue. Ron attempted to explain to her that this was only to be used as a fire access only, and not open at other times. Ron went down to the county to get documents from the Commissioners meeting which show this in the site plan.

Matt Williams, Asst. Director Public Works Engineering, found the original site plan, which was approved in 1996. It clearly states that the access to Maximus Dr. from the apartments is for emergency use only and a snow event is not considered an emergency by Douglas County. That information was forwarded to the apartment manager. Matt will work with Douglas County Planning and the City of Lone Tree to make sure the original intent of the site plan, specifically access, is followed.

The request for the Living Water Car Wash at Park Meadows Dr. and Yosemite has been disapproved by The City of Lone Tree.

Someone suggested that we have an open question session at the parks once in the spring and once in the fall so people could just come and ask questions.

There was a proposal to have Food Truck nights at the school when the weather is warmer. Joann has already talked to Gina (principal at the school) and she was in favor of it.

Jim and Ron both mentioned that some folks are still not shoveling snow off their sidewalks. Ron mentioned that you can call the Douglas County Sheriff's office and complain about those who haven't shoveled. The sheriff's office will come out and talk to the people. Their non-emergency number is: 303-660-7505

An issue was brought up regarding several areas in the community where ice buildup is particularly bad. A couple of people have called the county to request they get trucks out to those areas. Douglas County did come out after the last couple of storms with trucks to clear the ice. Those areas continue to need more attention.

Douglas County Public Works is one office to call to address this issue. Their number is 303-660-7480. Another office to call is the Douglas County Commissioners. Their number is: 303-660-7401.

Ron mentioned that the June 16th AGHOA meeting will be held at the HUB (in Lone Tree at the old Library), we will have a commissioner, Abe Laydon, attend that meeting.
