

Help Us Build The Community – Get Involved

Happy Summer everyone! My name is Brandon, and I'm an AGHOA newbie. I attended my very first meeting in February (via Zoom; soooo convenient) and have enjoyed my time so far meeting neighbors and helping to plan and coordinate a number of community events this summer.

My family and I have lived in Acres Green since the summer of 2015, so you might be asking, why get involved now? Like so many folks, when my office job went 100% remote last year, I found myself spending A LOT more time walking the sidewalks of Acres Green. In spite of the difficulty and uncertainty of the year, on these walks I took heart in the feeling of community I experienced throughout the neighborhood: each of us had chosen to call AG our home, and we were all navigating this new reality together. So this year, I wondered, was there anything I could do to help support this community that had been so supportive for me last year?

Enter AGHOA.

From day 1, the AGHOA has made me feel welcome, and it's been a treat to learn more of the behind-the-scenes operations that make the neighborhood run. They've also been very open to new ideas and suggestions, including most recently, an idea I proposed for a neighborhood Water Fight following the Independence Day parade. The team was all in, and over the course of just 3 weeks, we turned that idea into a reality.

After the parade, over 150 kids and neighbors gathered at Lonesome Pine Park to enjoy some ice cream and take part in our very first Water Fight. We had 1000+ water balloons in 7 stations across the park (including one dedicated to kids 5 and under) and by the end, there wasn't a dry t-shirt on the field. Special thank you to the Pritchard and Padrevita families who helped setup, to Yogi's for their generous sponsorship of the event year after year, and for everyone who pitched in after the fight to clean up the water balloon debris on the field!

Do you have ideas or suggestions for how we might continue to build and grow community within Acres Green? If so, consider joining us at our next AGHOA meeting. We don't have a meeting in August, so the next meeting is scheduled for October 21. More information will be available on Nextdoor and in the Oct. *Greenleaf*. Hope to see you there!



Updates from the Architectural Control Committee

As we usher in summer it is an excellent time to begin those outdoor projects.

I will use some of the space in this column to provide answers to commonly asked questions regarding building and yard projects.

Fences: According to Douglas County, wooden fence posts should be dug at least 3 feet below the ground level. Placed in/surrounded by concrete is suggested, but not required. Posts in concrete tend to last twice as long. No permit is required if fence is 6 foot and under.


Decks: Any deck building or repair with overhead structure requires a permit. Decks built on the ground (or slightly above) also require a permit. County will be looking for proper hole depth, joist spacing and size etc. If you are doing a minor repair to replace a surface board, no permit is required, unless you replace joists or posts.

I was asked if there are any summer reminders to provide. This is a short list:

- Caulk cracks in driveway.
- Clean outdoor light fixtures (especially since miller moths were invading our neighborhood last year.)
- Fertilize the lawn for 2nd time, but not if the temperature is over 80 degrees.
- Sharpen the lawn mower blade. (If the tips of the grass blades are brown after mowing, the mower blades may be dull, ripping instead of cutting the grass blades.)
- Check fences for any needed repair.

As always, my goal is to help you understand Douglas County codes and regulations and to help you navigate through the paperwork required by the County. The Building Dept people are friendly and helpful.

Just as a reminder; if you have any doubts about a project, even inside your home, contact or visit the Douglas County Building Dept in Castle Rock. Their number is 303-660-7497 – Dial 0 for Building Dept. You can also contact me, and I will do my best to help you and point you in the right direction.

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Middle of summer and all is well with the bees. So much so we have four boxes on one and three and a half boxes on the other. We did an inspection about four weeks ago and the top half box was getting full but we waited.

What we were more concerned about was whether we had a mite problem. Earlier in the season we applied a formic acid application to both hives. There are other ways to treat for mites but formic acid is one of the few ways to treat the bees when you have a super (our stash of honey) on top. It does not affect the flavor of the honey and is safe to the bees and those who eat the honey.

This past weekend we opened both hives. The super on one is maybe 2-3 frames semi-full but the other is fantastic. After checking the frames not all the honey is capped. You never want

to harvest honey with uncapped honey. Basically, it has too much moisture. We decided to leave that box on but added another half box so there was room to expand.

I mentioned we did a formic acid application in both hives so this time around we wanted to test for Varroa mites. Varroa mites are present in virtually all hives, the problem is keeping them at manageable levels. Varroa mites can kill a hive.

There are two basic ways to test for the mites: an alcohol wash or the sugar roll. We decided on the sugar roll.

To do a sugar roll you collect about 300 bees in a glass jar by smacking a good frame of capped brood (see picture) onto a plastic basin then dumping them in to a jar.

We then put two tablespoons of powdered sugar through a screen opening on the top, set the jar aside for two minutes then shaking the bees for another minute. Turn the jar over and shake the sugar and any mites that died from the sugar into another flat basin. Lastly, pour in one cup of water to dissolve the sugar and count the number of mites that you have. If you counted more than 3 (from the 300 bees you collected) you have a mite problem.

We have neither in both. We are now just making sure they have a good water supply and waiting another four weeks. Humm, I can taste the honey already.

A Failure To Communicate

Previously I had written an article regarding the median on Acres Green Drive and trying to bring back the intended look – wild grasses. After discussing what we wanted with South Suburban, the median started to look great, especially with all the water we have had this past spring and early summer. SSPR was not going to mow the median and all was well.

Then the other day as I was leaving the neighborhood, I saw what I thought was SSPR mowing the median. I immediately called SSPR and told them what I saw. The reaction was “What? I told the mowing crews several times NOT to mow the median.” So, I went on my merry way, somewhat miffed to what happened.

When I got home, I was called by SSPR. It wasn’t their crew! He found out who they were and had them stop. It was Douglas County Open Space who sent mowers out because they had complaints about visibility at the intersections and weeds in the median. Both issues are being addressed by South Suburban. And we hope we have a better working relationship between the two entities. Because of this cutting we now we have two different looks of the median. One by the school and the other farther down Acres Green Drive.

The bad is brown, dead and looks terrible while the other is great. Yes there is a weed problem but SSPR has a crew out to pull the noxious weeds.

As the title says; “we have a failure to communicate...” from that great movie; “Cool Hand Luke.”

So I will say this once more and hope more of the neighbors read the newsletter – the median is not going to be mowed. If you would like to call and “communicate” your concerns, please send me an email: rbrink@ix.netcom.com or give me a call 303-649-1497.

A little history on the subject. The medians were originally created with many large boulders. South Suburban took over the ownership and management of the parks, medians and some other small plots during the 1970’s. Residents requested that the medians be converted to grasses sometime in the 80’s. Since there is no water in the medians or in Maximus Trail Park, it was decided to seed with native grasses, which if maintained properly (by not mowing and allowing reseeding) will be able to survive.

Over the years the intent of this redesign has been lost and mowing has been done, which has reduced the amount of native grasses and has allowed weeds to creep in. Two years ago, the AGHOA requested that SSPR stop, yes stop, mowing the median

to allow the grasses to reseed and return it to its intended state.

Some folks had been calling SSPR complaining that the grasses are too tall and there are weeds growing in the median. SSPR has responded to those calls in the past and cut the grasses at an inappropriate time thereby not allowing the reseeding of the grasses and allowing weeds to take over and the grasses to turn brown, short and ugly.

These native grasses should look like the grasses on the open space side of the school hill and along Maximus Trail Park. SSPR has sprayed those nasty weeds that grew up along the curb edge so hopefully within a year or two we will have tall native grasses return.

I hope this helps those who call requesting the cutting of the median at inappropriate times. Please be patient and enjoy the return of those grasses.
