New South Suburban Regional Recreation Center

South Suburban is building a new facility near the intersection of County Line Road and South Holly St. This will be a 206,000 square-foot facility.

This facility will offer the opportunity for drop-in sports, including Pickleball, basketball, volleyball, soccer, lacrosse and field hockey.

It will have three sheets of ice and multiple locker rooms. Included in the facility will be a Gymnasium that can be divided into 2 full size basketball courts, 4 junior courts, 4 volleyball courts or 8 pickleball courts.

There will also be a restaurant and bar with views overlooking the ice sheets. Concession stands, skate rental and a pro shop will also be included in the facility.

There will be a figure skating room, a dryland training room (off-ice training area), springboard floor, mirrors and ballet bar.

Also, in the design are administrative offices and a board room that will also serve as a rental space for parties and other activities.

The entrance on East County Line Road will have a signal and an additional entrance without a signal off County Line Road to the east of the main entrance. There will be parking for about 530 vehicles.

The expected completion date is Dec. 2020.

The South Suburban Ice Arena will be repurposed for SSPR use. The South Suburban administration building will be sold with revenue going back into the general operating fund.

Update on the Proposed Hospital

Ron and I along with several other folks from Acres Green and Lone Tree attended Lone Tree Planning Commission meeting regarding the rezoning proposal for the hospital. It was a long and drawn out meeting which I am convinced is designed to discourage residents from participation, as several people did leave before the vote. That is just one reason why voicing concerns over these things is so important especially in writing.

The Planning Commission and SCL health did read the objections from mostly Acres Green residents and as a result did make some changes to the proposal before the vote.

We found it interesting that only about two people spoke in favor of the rezoning. Even most people from Lone Tree objected to the rezoning. A representative from Skyridge was also in attendance and opposed the rezoning. Three of the Planning Commission also opposed the rezoning. The vote was 4 to 3 in favor of the rezoning. The proposal was then set to go before the City Council.

Having been through many of these rezoning requests with Lone Tree we were amazed and relieved when SCL health dropped their request for rezoning and will look for other locations for a hospital.

Clearly SCL health listened to all the objections and thought better of continuing with this project.

AGHOA Meeting Minutes

On Oct. 17th, the AGHOA meeting was held via e-mail due to the fact that not enough of the officers were able to attend. The following are the contributions from officers and directors.

Sandy reported that we had \$2,724.94 in deposits, \$2,738.08 in withdrawals, leaving \$2,336.89 in available funds. We have 3 CD's totaling \$4122.82, two matured in Oct. and one maturing in April of 2020

At this writing neither the membership information nor were crime statistics available.

Ron has been talking to the Douglas County School District Rep. regarding the lack of maintenance on the school grounds and trails around the school. Since the district no longer has an agreement with South Suburban for maintenance of the trails and fields, they have fallen into disrepair.

He met with the official and they walked the trails together. He received some assurance that the trails would be better maintained.

Ron has also been working with South Suburban on a proposal for a matching gifts idea to improve the plantings around the two entrance signs. He received a proposed design for plantings that would not obstruct the signage. That of course can be discussed at an upcoming meeting.

Jean mentioned that she'd like to schedule future gardening days (Spring and Fall) to coincide with dumpster day. It was great to be able to get rid of the garden trash that same day and not haul it back to the house. Also, if the trash companies begin limiting the amount of trash a household can get rid of, having to haul front garden trash to the house could create a problem.

Jean also wanted to mention that she heard from a resident who lives on Maximus Dr. regarding the speeding along that street. This resident would like to see the traffic trailer placed there again if we can get it.

This resident also suggested a traffic circle at Maximus and Mercury Circle - Jean agreed that would help. Jean said she is especially concerned now that we've been through the recent rezoning proposal for a hospital.

Jean foresees one of the unintended consequences resulting from additional traffic from any more businesses built along Park Meadows Dr., to be people trying to get around the traffic by cutting through Acres Green using Maximus Dr. to Acres Green Dr. This already happens to some extent. But as one Lone Tree resident put it at the Planning Commission Meeting, "From Thanksgiving through Christmas it is impossible to drive down Yosemite."

A traffic circle would at least slow people down who would come through the neighborhood. This is especially concerning due to the fact that those who cut through have to go right by Acres Green Elementary school. And with many children walking to and from school increased traffic on those roadways should be a concern to all of us.

Jean said she thinks this needs to be addressed to the Douglas County Commissioners and we would need to probably talk to Public Works. She was not sure how to proceed exactly.

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Updates from the Architectural Control Committee

Construction in Acres Green has been slower this year than in the past. Very few permits have been pulled, or at least few needed ACC approval. There has been an extraordinary amount of roofing and as I mentioned in the last article, a permit is supposed to be pulled, then again it doesn't require a letter from the ACC.

For those of you that don't know, I'm reaching a significant milestone in my life. I will be turning 70 later this year. So, I will no longer be on the ACC after the first of the year. With that said, I'm looking for someone to take my place. The time involved

It is an interesting position in that you get to meet new or old neighbors and find out firsthand what construction is going on in Acres Green. You would be interacting with the Douglas County Building Department as well. They will send you an email letting you know that a permit request has been made for say an addition and you'll meet with the homeowner and then provide DCBD with ACC approval.

I just checked them this past week and the box that most of the honey production is in, I estimate it to be between 80 and 100 pounds of honey. Select 'Driver Education Schools'. Many offer a specific Senior Driving Re-Exam Classes.

7 Simple Tips to Keep you Warm and Safe:

- 1. Set your heat to a minimum of 68 to 70 degrees. Turn off the vents in rooms that you don't use and close the doors. Keep a rolled towel in front of all doors that open to cold areas, like the basement, garage or outside, to keep out drafts.
- 2. When the sun isn't shining, keep your blinds and curtains closed to avoid losing heat through your windows.
- 3. Dress warmly even if you are staying in the house. Wear socks and slippers or shoes. Layer clothing inside and out for warmth and protection.
- 4. Make sure you are eating to keep your "body engine" running and so you don't lose the body fat that keeps you warm.
- 5. Watch your alcohol intake. Alcohol can make you lose body heat.
- 6. Ask a family member, friend or neighbor to check on you during cold spells. If your heat goes out, stay with a neighbor or friend don't tough it out as your body may not be able to handle the lower air temperature for an extended time. Space heaters can be fire hazards and some produce carbon monoxide, so they shouldn't be used without fully investigating whether or not they are safe. And they require outside air to operate safely.
- 7. Simple things can keep you warm and safe, but if you or someone you know is experiencing some signs and symptoms of hypothermia, call 911. Stay warm inside and out, carry that extra sweater with you, always keep a hat and gloves in your coat pockets and remember that scarf to cover your face. It's also time to make your shoe fashion statement with some warm boots with good treads on their soles. It is winter in Colorado and the weather can change quickly!
