# Highlights of Holy Week

PALM SUNDAY, April 5, 9:30 and 11:15 am (Saturday, April 4, 5:30 pm) As we commemorate the last week of Jesus' earthly life, we celebrate his triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday weekend. Again this year we will wave palm branches during the congregational singing at each worship service. At the Sunday Traditional 9:30 am service, we begin with a Palm Parade led by the children. The celebratory music sung by the congregation and choir herald the arrival of Jesus, but gently foreshadow the events to come.

#### MAUNDY THURSDAY, April 9, 6:00 pm

This service honors the "Last Supper" of Jesus with a service of Holy Communion. The Chancel Choir will incorporate communion in their presentation of a new cantata by Joseph Martin entitled "The Colors of Grace." This soulful presentation depicts the events leading up to the crucifixion of Jesus, beginning with the Upper Room. Members of our Drama Ministry will aid the beautiful music using the "Colors of Grace."

#### GOOD FRIDAY, APRIL 10, 6:00 pm

The Stations of the Cross Service is a powerful way to contemplate, and enter into, the mystery of Jesus' gift of Himself to us. The service involves our senses and our emotions as we experience the love of Jesus in a new and deep way. The Stations Service will be in the Sanctuary and does not require walking.

EASTER WEEKEND SERVICES: The entire Church will be celebrating Easter together on Sunday morning, April 12, at 9:30 and 11:15 am; therefore, there will be no Saturday Service April 11.

<u>Easter Continental Breakfast</u> will be available before each service. Please sign up to bring muffins, pastries, sweet breads, or fruit. Sign up sheets are in the Gathering Area.

Bring a Flower for the Cross. Before the services, we will be adorning the cross near the Sanctuary entrance with live flowers as we experience the "Cross Coming to Life."

# **Pastor's Pen**

I love to research. It is one of my greatest passions in life because I have a deep desire to know things. I want to know the intricacies of the world and what makes people act the way they do. Something dawned on me recently in the midst of my current research during these ongoing political debates and the increasing polarization within society. That is the fact that it does not make much sense that most of us should not logically exist within the family trees we have. Think about the numerous wars over religion, politics, and power in the world over the centuries. Now think about the countries involved. Combine those two things with your own genealogy and you will most likely question how you even came to exist.


I look at my own family tree, which is pretty average for Americans of European descent. On one side of my family tree people came from strong Protestant countries that actively fought Catholicism, and yet there would be a marriage between a Catholic and Protestant, thus producing a distant family member of mine. In some cases, it was the exact opposite situation; but, here I am.

When our ancestors arrived on the shores of America, they continued to find reasons to dislike each other. They found reasons to fight and wage against each other; but once again, here we are. The big reason for this is that our great great-great-grandparents were unwilling to be controlled by passing trends and hatred. Grievances, discrimination, and hate were not going to completely rule their lives. Our ancestors knew something that we, as a nation, need to learn: at the end of the day, people are people.

I see Jesus and His hand in the middle of all the stories about love bringing us together and producing the people of today. I see Jesus giving courage for centuries to see others as they are, made in the image of God. And I see Jesus encouraging us to find that place again. We need to find a place where we can break away from the opinions of the media and the loud voices that seem to be everywhere. We need to find a place where we can be people again. We lose our humanity because of division by forgetting how connected we all are and how the vast majority of the time our differences are so minor.

Years ago, I had a horrible asthma attack. My airways started spasming, things got really bad and I was rushed to the hospital. Until that point, I had never felt vulnerability like that. When I was in the emergency room being worked on, I saw the faces of many compassionate nurses, two doctors, and a respiratory therapist. I remember thinking that I did not even know these people, but they were concerned about me and my life. The spiritual exercise that came to me after that experience was visualizing myself in a state of danger and going to people that I thought were, to some extent, not my biggest fans and asking them to help me. I reflected on what I really thought they would do. Would they let me be or would they help me? Of course, we can never truly know during that visualization, but I think if you'll try it out, what you will realize is that the vast majority of people you can imagine would help you.

At this point within the denomination, within the country, and within the world, it sure seems like a good idea to take a deep breath and remember that even these divisions we think are so major do not separate us fully from one another.

'Religion's for old people', my buddy declared as we drove through the countryside. I found his comment a little insulting: I was a churchgoer, age nineteen. Was that so wrong? I lost touch with him; now it's been been twenty-five years since we've spoken. But he was on to something. At twenty, the road looks clear all the way to forever. We arrogantly waste time, try a hundred new jobs or relationships or ideologies, believe any fool thing. The heart is not yet broken, not in the way it is when time crashes down on it—soured dreams, career missteps, divorce, illness, the death of loved ones, the passing of so much we love. By old age the ghostly procession of the once-was can be unbearable.

My heroes include any elderly persons who keep the flame lit, who still feel the inspiration and outrage at ideas, current events, history, movies, books, national tragedies, spring flowers, the passing parade. Somehow they take it all in. Life enlarges their spirit, becomes fuel for the remaining journey, seasoned with humor not bitterness. They age with dignity. Part of the dignity is keeping the inevitable heartbreak framed by larger perspectives and by going deeper into the grief, not denying it.
