Pastor's Pen by Rev. Robert Cloninger

The idea of a "New Year" has fascinated cultures for more years than we can count. There is some part of us that needs to mark time to have something to move forward from so that our lives are not just a blur. My best guess as to why, is that life is overwhelming and we need to break it up somehow to make it more manageable. To give an example of the need for breaks of time: some of the most important advice you can give any Christian is just to take it one day at a time. All you have to do is live one day as a Christian and then the next and the next, but you deal with those days on their own and not life as a long chunk. So then I go back to my original topic; how do you live life? One day at a time and then one year at a time.

When my grandfather (father's father) had his first major stroke, he applied the lessons of his life to recovering. My grandfather had one of the hardest lives of anyone I have ever known, but he was tenacious. Nobody could surpass my



grandfather in dogged determination. The way he did it, from what we all observed, was to set his mind to the fact that there was no other option. The second thing he did was to celebrate every victory, no matter how small. So when he had his stroke and was undergoing rehab, he put those tools into play.

In our years on this earth we need to say some things and really accept them. We need to say we have to live life; this is a given. We need to say we have to live life as Christians; another given. We need to say these things can only be done on a day by day basis. And lastly, we need to say that we will celebrate victories along the way. That's a steady and doable plan for living the Christian life.

So with 2021 coming to a close, think of everything you can celebrate. Maybe it doesn't feel like much. However, I would argue that we have made it through the continuation of having our world flipped upside down by Covid. Further, we have had many opportunities in various parts of the year to quit the faith out of frustration or hurt, but we've dug in even deeper. So if you've lived a year through Covid's changes and you're continuing to keep the faith, then the reality is that you've achieved quite a bit. Tell yourself that though. Don't let the little wins pass you by, because in the grand scheme of life those are the biggest wins.

HUMMERS Outreach Highlights for 2021

Your Highlands United Methodist Men, the HUMMERS, increased and added to their Outreach efforts in 2021. Working with a record final gifting amount of \$22,300.00, we re-introduced gifting to the BV Courtesy Van, Micah House, and "Bella Vista specific" Meals on Wheels. We significantly increased our gifting to HUMC's Angel Tree, Gravette School System's "Bright Futures" program, Care and Share, NW Arkansas Abused Women, and the Salvation Army. We added new beneficiaries including Bella Vista Police Department's "Shop with a Cop", and a similar program within the Bella Vista Fire Department. We recognize that 2021, and the generous work efforts of a few of our members, presented us with an abundance to administer. Our objectives were to put that abundance to work, as locally as reasonably possible, impacting organizations that could be understood and supported church-wide, with open, questioning, and creative minds as we made the recommendations that allowed our members to approve these selections.

Outreach/Missions 2021

I would like to thank everyone who donated their time & guidance to Outreach and Missions during 2021. We took in \$14,802 from the car show, \$1,378 from the power of one and \$4,950 from other donations for a total of \$24,574. We also were able to donate \$22,575 to local charities this year. Below is a breakdown of our charity donations.

HUMW Outreach Highlights for 2021

Highlands United Methodist Woman (HUMW) had a very busy, but fruitful, year with our fundraising efforts that support our 10 women and children's charities in Northwest Arkansas (Benton County Single Parent Scholarship, Children's Advocacy Center, Havenwood, Hub of Hope, Nicole's House, Into the Light, NWA Children's Shelter, Restoration Village, Saving Grace, and Sunshine School and Development Center).

Due to the Pandemic, we weren't sure that we would be able to hold our two major fundraisers in our building so we started the "Change for Change" program, the concept being that all change can help bring change in an individual's life. We simply asked the congregation to drop loose change in our container each week. This quickly became a fun way to collect funds for our charities, with many of us participating.

Then, it was approved that we would be able to host our first major fundraising event of the year, the Flea, which was held in Fellowship Hall in April. This event kicked-off our year and helped us set our goal of giving at \$1,500 to each of our 10 charities in 2021.

We also had great success with Muffins for Missions sales on Mother's Day, Father's Day, and Halloween. All of the money raised from muffins sold on Mother's Day was given to Samaritan's Feet with the remainder going into the general fund to be paid out to the our 10 charities listed above at the end of our year.

Another fundraiser, Desserts for a Year, added to the general fund with the money from ticket sales for the drawing. Donna and Van VanderSchaff were the lucky winners and will be presented with a yummy dessert each month for a year. The drawing was held on Mother's Day and desserts will continue to be delivered by each preparer through April, 2022.

This year, HUMW assumed responsibility for the Cookie Walk and Angel Tree. The Cookie Walk was held the first Saturday in December and funds for the event will give us a great start going into 2022. The Angel Tree brought in gifts for 5 Gravette families with a total of 24 children. The bigheartedness of this congregation is overwhelming, and I promise that each child /family was blessed by your generosity this Christmas.

I want to say a special Thank You to the many wonderful leaders and volunteers that made all of this happen! Our tremendous success this year couldn't have happened without YOU! Your efforts made a huge impact into the lives of others as we work together for the Glory of God.
