News from Vice-Chairman of the Administrative Council, Jean Galloway

As we continue to work our way through the Discernment Process toward possible disaffiliation, we want to keep you informed as to where we are now and our plans for the near future.

In July, we will begin the three-month Discernment period where we will engage in a time of prayer and study while encouraging honest and open conversation to determine whether God is leading our congregation to remain in the United Methodist Church or to consider disaffiliation from the denomination. To begin, the Discernment Process requires us to hold a total of three Listening Sessions which must be scheduled 3-4 weeks apart.

The first Listening Session (Session One) is scheduled on Sunday, July 9, at 2:30 pm and will be held in our Sanctuary. Session One will be led by presiding elder Rev. Dr. Ann Ferris. You will receive more information on Session One as it becomes available. We are still in the process of scheduling Sessions Two and Three and you will be notified when the schedule has been confirmed. Church members will be given the opportunity to ask questions or make comments at each of the Listening Sessions and members are always welcome to submit questions, concerns, and/or comments to any member of our Administrative Council.

As we know, the United Methodist Church (UMC) is deeply divided on issues regarding human sexuality and Highlands Church, for matters of conscience, cannot condone some of the decisions being made by our denomination. Listed on page 2 are the Reasons of Conscience relating to these issues and are reasons why Highlands Church is seeking to disaffiliate from the UMC.

REASONS OF CONSCIENCE

In accordance with paragraph 2553, we list the following actions and inactions of the Arkansas Conference to give examples of why we feel we are no longer operating in accordance with the United Methodist Book of Discipline:

- The UMC Book of Discipline prohibits the ordination of self-avowed, practicing homosexuals as pastors. Yet, despite the wishes and decisions of the majority of elected delegates to the General Conference found in the provisions of the Book of Discipline, our denomination has two self-avowed, practicing homosexuals currently serving as bishops. The Arkansas Conference sends portions of our tithes to support UMC bishops, which means we are giving money to support a stance on human sexuality that we, for matters of conscience, cannot support.
- Many bishops, who are supported by Arkansas Conference tithes, despite being charged with maintaining order and discipline in their respective episcopal areas or jurisdictions, are unwilling to enforce biblical and doctrinal standards in many matters, including matters relating to the practice of homosexuality or the ordination or marriage of self-avowed practicing homosexuals. Again, because our apportionment dollars go to the Episcopal Fund, we find it a violation of conscience to support the continued allowance of expressions of human sexuality to which we are morally opposed.
- Some of our denominational seminaries, supported by our tithes paid through the Arkansas Conference, have been permitting events that violate our moral conscience. For example, in a worship service at Duke Divinity School, the Almighty was referred to as a "queer God" who is also a "drag queen, a trans man, and gender fluid."
- Through our tithes, the Arkansas Conference forces Highlands UMC to actively support and fund personnel, practices, and teachings that are contrary both to our agreed upon doctrine and polity as defined by the 2016 Book of Discipline, and to the plain teaching of Scripture. This is a violation of our moral conscience.

Summer Choir in June, July & August!



The Highlands Summer Choir Program begins on May 31 at 2:30 pm, with the rehearsal for the June anthems. The Summer Choir Program is a way for those interested in trying out the Chancel Choir to come and sing during the months of June, July and August. It is also a way for family members who are visiting, or who don't regularly sing in the choir, to join us, too. The music will be familiar and not very

difficult. Besides, you'll have our wonderful choir members to lean upon if needed. The music is such that if you miss the rehearsal, you'll be able to sing the anthem each Sunday with just the short rehearsal on Sunday mornings. Don't miss a Sunday because you weren't at the rehearsal. We want you to share your gift of music!

The choir meets each Sunday at 9:40 in the choir room behind the Sanctuary. There are entrance doors from each parking lot closest to Glasgow Rd. We will keep to the tradition of no choir robes and leaving after the anthem to join loved ones in the congregation for the remaining portion of the worship service. Our rehearsal schedule for the Summer Choir Program is as follows: May 31 at 2:30, for June anthems; June 28 at 2:30, for July anthems; and July 26 at 2:30, for the August anthems.

This is a great opportunity for anyone and everyone to come and make a joyful noise to the Lord. Teenagers will be most welcome if interested. Pastor's Pen by Rev. Robert Cloninger

On July 3, I'll be having bariatric surgery. The procedure will not be a gastric bypass, but will be very much like it and is called a modified duodenal switch (if you want to look it up). I have tried the vast majority of my life to lose weight and keep it off. I was put on my first diet as a child and it has been a series of workouts and diets ever since. I look back at all the diets I have tried or "lifestyle changes," and it is absurd! I mean, I even got staples in my ears on pressure points when that was the thing. Ridiculous!

It's the usual song and dance, I know. You go to school and gain weight. You get a fulltime job and gain weight. You get married and gain weight. Get settled into parenthood and gain weight. Then there's the emotional eating and so on and so forth. So many excuses, but over the course of two days recently I put all the excuses in the trash can. I was diagnosed with



diabetes one day (to go with my other health problems), and then on the very next night I was asked an intense question about death by my daughter. That sealed the deal. I was tired of being overweight, putting my body in a bad situation. And I was tired of living with the thought of being dead early or limited. I got my daughter to bed after her question and I started looking up weight loss surgery. I had already thought about it for 10 years so I knew what to look for. I made a request for information from a surgeon's office that night and had an appointment set up the following day. I knew I needed help, meaning I needed the medical doctors, a team of nutritionists, and surgery. And by the grace of God, I'm getting that help.

Lastly, this is not to condemn a single person, but frankly, I was tired of gluttony. I will admit that I have a genetic issue to some extent. Yet, it is a lie to say that genetics were the biggest piece of my problem. It would be a lie to say it all came down to emotional eating. A lot of it was just straight up gluttony. Now understand something about gluttony, because of hormones and a host of other factors we know you can be overweight and not be an overeater. I know that, but it is not my case. In my case, I overate. And what I understood after talking to my daughter in her question about death is that my sin wasn't just about me, my sin could visit my whole family with consequences if I died young. Sin is a killer. And in the case of gluttony, it literally kills day by day, minute by minute. The Bible can be rough on that particular sin, too, and rightly so. God does not want to see His children destroying themselves.

It makes me sad when people say they left the faith because they only grew up hearing about sin. I don't always know what they've been through, but I do know this: in the Methodist tradition we view the recognition of sin not as something to hate people about, not as something to make people feel horrible about, not something to make people feel guilty about, not as something to beat ourselves up about, but as a name for something that is hurting us that we need to part with. Jesus wants to save our earthly and eternal life and give us an abundant life. Thank God for his gracious care, and in not sparing our feelings for our needs. For without the goodness of God and the path he lays for me to follow, I would be lost.


Muffins for Missions
