

Period of Disaffiliation Discernment Ends; Church Conference Next

The third and final disaffiliation related "Listening Session" was held on Sunday, August 20, with 146 members and 12 non-members in attendance. This session featured a report on disaffiliation financial obligations and a proposal on how to meet them, a recommendation from the Administrative Council for post-disaffiliation, and the opportunity for members to share their views on disaffiliation.

At the end of the session, a straw poll was taken asking members if they were in favor of asking that a Church Conference be called to hold a formal vote on disaffiliation. Of the 145 votes cast, 121 (83.4%) were in favor and 24 (16.6%) were against.

In response to the results of the straw poll, the Administrative Council made a formal request to our District Superintendent, Rev. Ann Ferris, to call a Church Conference. Members must be present at the Church Conference to vote, and a two-thirds majority is required for the congregation to disaffiliate from the United Methodist Church.

Rev. Ferris has scheduled the Church Conference for 4:00 pm on Sunday, September 10, 2023.

Pastor's Pen by Rev. Robert Cloninger

It's back to school time and I know there's so much excitement, but for me it was always my least favorite time of year. I never cared much for school and frankly, I don't think school ever cared much for me. Growing up, I remember everyone continually telling me I needed to get an education and I never seemed to be able to convince them that I didn't. In fact, I was a bit of a Puritan, because I really only saw the religion class at my Christian school as necessary education. And while that might be strange to think at such a young age, here I am now.

When I went to a public high school, we didn't have religion class so as you can imagine, I really didn't see a point in being there. I went so far as to try and drop out of high school. My parents thought when I said that I was dropping out that I was joking with them or trying to rebel and irritate them. They soon found out I wasn't joking when my principal informed my mother than I had indeed tried to drop out and that he wasn't going to sign the paperwork. After a long talk with my parents (mostly me listening) it seemed a lot easier to go along with the program,



but that didn't mean I had to like it. When I got out of high school my plan was to drag my feet in college long enough to frustrate my parents into getting their blessing to drop out. That didn't work out either. After all the complaining and class skipping that I did, I figured my grade point average would be too low to get into a semi-nary graduate program, but much to my surprise, annoyance, and relief, my GPA was actually good.

When I sat down with my advisor in seminary I noticed that all they offered were classes I wanted to take which lead to a strangely fast and smooth path to graduation. I actually kind of wanted to stay longer.

Why am I sharing this with you? Because to me, all of what you just read is a profound story. It's a story of rebellion, not thinking things through, and being just plain stubborn. I look back on my life and all that I tried to throw away and I realize there was only one factor that got me through. God. I can't justify it any other way. Sure I had supportive parents. Sure I had a lot of great things in place, but I tried to undo all the good things that I had been given to get my own way. It really was only God that got me through. It really was only God that held everything together and got me to the other side.

So what's your story? What's your version of school? What are the events in your life that you look at and realize that it was only God that got you through? Knowing and being able to verbalize those periods of time are more important than you might think, because those stories become the stories that give muscle and bone to confidence in God. Those stories give courage and allow trust.

There are countless events in my life where I didn't feel like God was anywhere around at the time, but as I look back on those stories I realize that there wasn't anywhere in them that God wasn't present. I would encourage you to start writing out those tales of times when God got you through or at least rehearse them in your mind. Reflect on them as much as you can, because by recognizing and affirming God's faithfulness in the past, we become much less scared of the future.

- Snack Packs for Kids has furnished food packs for almost 150 food insecure students to take home each Friday during the school year to make sure they don't go hungry that weekend.
- Samaritan's Feet has provided approximately 200 new pairs of shoes and socks each year to qualifying students.
- Bright Futures works to make sure students are able to attend school by; providing school supplies, don't go hungry, are healthy and have clean clothes. They have helped families with emergency expenses, holiday snack packs, school supplies, clothing, emergency dental work, medication expense and much more.

Over the last 5 years, due to the continued support and participation of this congregation, the Highlands Church Car Show & Cruise-In has been able to distribute over\$73,000 to these three local charities that help children in the Gravette School District.
