MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends

In recent weeks I have had several conversations about angels. Not usually a subject which crops up in conversation but for some reason the subject has been on more than one mind recently. Michael, Gabriel and Raphael are the three named biblical angels, depicted as messengers of God. Michael, which means "Who is like God?" is the protector of Israel and leader of the armies of God so Michael came to be regarded as the protector of Christians from the devil. Gabriel, which means "The strength of God" is, according to the Gospel of Luke the one who was sent by God to Mary to announce the birth of Jesus. Raphael, which means "The healing of God" is depicted in the book of Tobit as the one who restores sight to Tobit's eyes.

A basilica near Rome was dedicated in the fifth century in honour of Michael on September 30th with celebrations beginning on the eve of that day, with the result that September 29th came to be observed as a feast in honour of Michael and all angels. Throughout the Middle Ages many churches were dedicated to St Michael and All Angels including Ashton-under-Lyne and Mottram.

At first you may wonder what relevance all this can possibly have for rational Unitarians! Well, it obviously is of interest to some Unitarians but quite apart from that there is some real spiritual value in there as well. Just think for a while about the names of the three angels - "Who is like God?" "The strength of God" and "The healing of God." Also think about God's messengers today. We would not expect Michael to show us that there is no other like God, Gabriel to inspire us with the strength of God or Raphael to bring us the healing touch of God. So, who are God's messengers today?
