Let's set up the clips! I did. I did. I did the thing.

[00:09:35] The tragic shooting of two Idaho firefighters on Sunday has left many questioning what could possibly be the motive for such a heinous act. But one theory has gripped the internet. In the afternoon on June 29th, first responders were called to a small but active brush fire on the east side of Canfield Mountain near Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. As fire crews moved in to tackle the blaze around 2 p. m., bullets suddenly rained down, in the woods, officials said. The grisly scene was captured in harrowing 911 audio as firefighters were pinned down by the crazed shooter. The horrific ordeal ended about five hours later when SWAT teams discovered the lifeless body of the shooter next to his firearm on a popular tourist trail, according to police. On June 30th, the shooter was ID'd by police as Wes Rowley. And a Kootenai County Fire and Rescue member lost their lives in the sudden strike, while a third firefighter was left fighting for life after surgery, but is now in stable condition. Kootenai County Sheriff Robert Norris said in a news conference: 'Why are you booing him? We'll talk about it.

[00:11:12] While police have yet to release any conclusions on Rowley's motive, internet sleuths discovered a shocking coincidence concerning the town's fire department. Ah, that must be it. Oh, my God. In 1998. Keenan bought the dilapidated compound for \$95,000 and sold it to a local philanthropist who let the local Coeur d'Alene fire department burn it down as part of a training exercise. On June 28th and 29th of 2001, the Coeur d'Alene fire department conducted the training exercise, sending the compound into a furious blaze. Now, conspiracy theorists and locals are questioning whether Sunday's incident may have been a revenge attack for the fire department's deliberate burning down of the compound. So far, there is no indication that Rowley had any political motivation or ties to neo-Nazis.

for my neighborhood. So I know that there's a fire burning uncontrollably because there is smoke rolling down my street, passing my house. And at this point in time, we had been issued a shelter-in-place order because they told us that there may be up to four shooters. Right, just crawling that mountain. We were worried they were going to break into the house. But I also didn't want to get burned to death. And so when I found out that it was one emo, like, mixed-race, bronie teenager, I was like, '300 officers let my mountain burn down because they couldn't kill this one guy? Are you f**king serious?' And I really turned on the police after that. It was overwhelming resources against one guy. And people might say, well, he had the tactical advantage. He was in camo. He had a sniper rifle. A non-military, basically a kid. Like, what's going on, you guys?

[00:15:12] Well, so Man, I didn't know that this was gonna be Am I wrong here? I didn't know this was the take you were going to be. I would have had slides prepared because, okay, so first of all, his father on the one side was a like former army guy, Jason Rowley, the one that owns the tree service or whatever. He is apparently a member of, like, a biker gang.

was I was leaving a parish picnic, actually, uh, and I was like, 'Oh, that's interesting.' Looks like there's a fire. And then immediately people are texting me, 'Active shooter,' 'Active shooter and I'm like, 'What do you know, uh.' And so I started looking into this thing, and there's some interesting timelines. So, I guess the fire got called in at about 1: 30 by two o'clock, there was like shots being fired. Now, let me pull up my notes; I did speak to somebody in the fire department um, who was there on the scene at the time. And so he said that this kid's car was blocking a gate. Now, let me pull up a map. See, I should have prepped.

[00:17:21] Yes, there is like a part of the road that turns into a dirt road, right?

[00:17:36] True. So let's see here. Canfield Mountain. This is the parking lot right here. Let's see if we can kind of get in here. Okay, so this is around the area where it happened, right? You can kind of see that there's this parking area, and then the road goes from being paved to it being this dirt logging road. And his car was parked somewhere around here by the gate that prevents the people from continuing up, right? Now, what I was told by my contact is that Two firefighters went up there, saw the kid's car blocking the gate. He was there. And they said, 'Hey, you need to move this car.' And this kid, the suspect, says, 'Fuck off' basically and acts like a punk teenager. At that point, two fire crews somehow get past the gate. At that point the battalion chiefs show up and those are the guys that died. So a lot of people kind of had it in their minds that this kid lit a fire and then was perched up in the woods. Like waiting for them. That's not what happened; he came and started picking them off. Right. And, and that's not exactly what happened. There was some sort of interaction with him before shots started getting fired. Now, another thing that's like really weird about this is they were, they were saying that there's three, four different shooters. They were saying that they were pinned down by sniper fire, but then there was a photo. Let me see if I can pull that up, kind of doing this on the fly. Dave? Sorry. Relax. It's okay. We got plenty of time. We just started the show. We've got plenty of time here. Come on. Media. I want media. Because he posted a picture of himself. Before going up on the mountain. Yeah, here it is. And the picture that he posted of himself shows that he had shotgun shells around his waist. And from what I've heard anyway, is that he was found dead with the shotgun near him, but he

was killed by a 9mm.

An Idaho neo-Nazi group claimed responsibility for the terrorist attack that killed two firemen. This came out before they even found the body of the shooter. So this narrative was being seeded by Jewish accounts on Twitter before the situation was even over.

[00:24:14] Wes Rowley. I've heard that he was into Nazi imagery, but he was just a disaffected youth. Let's pull up this B article. Yes. He was a weird Brony. He was an outcast.

[00:24:31] It's somebody obsessed with My Little Pony and there's like a furry element. And if anybody's been to a Pride parade, you know that there's this massive overlap between like sexual degeneracy and furry stuff. True. Like I don't really understand it because this is not my world, but there's something going on here. So like it is a matter of time before we hear some gender dysphoria stuff on this guy. But from all accounts, people in the school said he was a psycho. He was a loner. Everybody was afraid of him. Constantly issuing threats. He was not a resident of Idaho. He lived in Arizona. I think he was born in Russia.

[00:25:05] No, no, no. That was disinformation. Was that disinformation? I heard that he was born in California.

And we know that there is a significant overrepresentation of trannies in mass shooting events. I think it reflects on broader society. I talk about my niece and nephew sometimes. They told me that half of the kids in their class in Seattle are some kind of LGBTQ. And I think 10% in each of their class are transgender on hormones. There was like a 13-year-old girl that's post-op top surgery. Yeah, like this is a serious problem. Yeah. And they are more violent. And so we're going to talk about that. What were you going to say?

So, in this Reuters article, they say the Gun Violence Archives, which began collecting data on gun violence in the U. S. in 2013, recorded more than 4,400 mass shootings in the last decade, it was told by Executive Director Mark Bryant told Reuters via email. The definition of a mass shooting is four or more people shot resulting in injury or death, excluding the perpetrator. And so I was thinking that there's no way there's absolutely no way. So I looked into this. This next link is a better representation of mass shootings in America. Rock Institute. The Rock Institute. Yeah. So what Reuters had done was they

counted each death. And injury as a separate mass shooting. What? Yeah. Reuters totally cooked the books on this one. So this is a better representation. So roughly 1,700 people were killed and 2,600 people injured in public mass shootings. Now, how many of these are inner city nonsense or minority crime? 54% of the perpetrators were white. So this is actually 493 shootings total. That's including all the inner city stuff.

Rebecca Hargraves

[00:31:22] That's including inner cities? Yeah. And so if you reduce that, reduce it to the number of white crimes, we're talking about 266 shootings. Now, nine of those have been perpetrated by transgenders. Ten, if you include this guy, I didn't include him because we haven't heard any transgender stuff, but clearly something weird is going on. That's 3.4%. 0.6% of adults in the United States identify as transgender. So that means if you're transgender, times more likely to be shooters than non-transgender individuals.

[00:31:59] It is crazy, right? And nobody ever talks about this. And so I wanted to think, I was thinking about why, like my first thought is that there's a component to this, like that they were molested, right? But let's remove that. Let's just talk about confounding mental health issues. Do you have this, what I asked Grok?

[00:32:17] So why are trans individuals more likely to commit shootings? So trans people, they have depression and anxiety. Almost 60% of trans patients have one psychiatric diagnosis. Their suicidality, 44% of transgender adults report suicidal ideations. The substance abuse is significantly higher. And then they also have a higher rate of PTSD, bipolar, schizophrenia, eating disorders. So when you look at those things and how they're related to violent crime, can you go to the next one? Substance use disorders, you are two to three times more likely to engage in violent behavior. PTSD, two to three times more likely to engage in violent behavior in the general population. Bipolar is the same, three to five times higher. Schizophrenia, four to six times higher, surprisingly, eating disorders. And then suicidality, two to three times higher risk of violence. Depression and anxiety, the risk was negligible, 1.5 to two times higher. So what is this? Is it this confounding mental health diagnosis? Is this an environment thing? This kid, you know, he's biracial. He's being raised by a stepfather. And you're seeing broken homes. You're seeing major substance use disorders. And gender dysphoria in and of itself is a psychiatric diagnosis. I don't care what

anybody says. So what is really going on here? Cameron, can you talk a little bit about the reasons that you think that trans people, and individuals kind of on the fringe are more prone to violence?

Cameron MacGregor

[00:33:57] You know, I don't know. I often ask, is the transgender component, is that a cause or is that simply a trigger? Because obviously a lot of the folks, and I'm speaking anecdotally to some degree, a lot of the people that I've personally encountered that are in that sphere, and there's a lot of them in D. C. I'll just state that outright. They tend to be already disturbed or they have some kind of pre-existing condition. So, in other words, is it simply weaponized by transgenderism because there's already some kind of underlying condition or does the underlying condition that's there, you know, the insecurity, the depression, whatever, is that then intensified to the point where they go out and shoot? I really don't know. What I do know is that if you look globally, Japan. For example, they have this group. I think they're called Hikikomori. These folks are and they have basically an extreme form of social anxiety disorder. They're basically shut-ins. They don't interact with anybody. And I say that I mentioned that in part because every society has some segment of the population that psychologically or otherwise just sort of spins out of control. Intellectual pathogens like transgenderism, that exacerbates it. But I'm not sure it's creating something that isn't there.

Rebecca Hargraves

[00:35:30] Interesting. Yeah. What do you think, Dave?

David J. Reilly

[00:35:31] Well, I mean, I think that the trans ideology, which, by the way, we've got a little chart here. Granted it's old. But it's still pretty unbelievable. I mean, if you look at this chart, it shows different age groups with different colors over time. And it shows this absolute explosion starting around 2014 of people identifying as trans, as different gender identities, etc. And I mean, just blows out of proportion. And, I mean, we've seen other studies where the amount of youth that are identifying as LGBT, as trans, is just somewhere between 25% and 40% of, like, Generation Alpha or something like that.

[00:36:19] There's just no way. I mean, obviously it is some kind of propaganda because even environmental concerns, we would have been able to hammer down what had been introduced between those years.

[00:36:56] So like that's like this kind of emotional blackmail that the post-operative suicidality rates.

David J. Reilly

[00:37:06] Which is like 40%.

Rebecca Hargraves

[00:37:07] It's higher than that to justify that. Even though a lot of the reason transgender people are suicidal is that they are post-op. Yes. And there are major hormonal problems that come with that. I mean, and then of course the physical problems, which I won't get into because everybody's talked about it. But you know, this is a major problem. We're going to have an entire generation of people that are. that are going to be suing doctors, that are going to not be able to procreate because their parents, like, didn't want to make their neighbors and friends mad. It's just unbelievable to me that this is happening. I went to a high school. There were, I think, 2,500 people. We had zero transgender people. There were, like, five closeted gay guys. No one talked about it. I remember kicking this girl out. She had her head shaved. Her name was Lainey. And she was in the girls' bathroom. and she was dressed like a boy and everything like that, head-shaped. And I was like, if you're going to dress like that, get out of our bathroom. Like, get out of our bathroom. And that was the attitude.

[00:38:08] How old do you think I am? I don't know. I'm 37. Oh, you're as old as me. So the early, the odds. This was in 2004. Five, four, yeah, okay. 2004. [00:38:27] a fag was still like terrible acceptable and connotated with being a bad thing now we've got people that are like i'm a faggot and i'm proud yeah yeah really what is wrong yeah but what you know i just wonder i mean look a lot of a lot of this there's no question is being conditioned in the school systems we know that that's going on at the university level there's a lot of health care professionals that are advocating this but i do wonder to what extent will people revert back I say that in part because there was a book, you guys probably know more about it than I do, frankly. It was called As Nature Made Him, which was about David Reimer.

And David Reimer, when he was born, I think they botched his circumcision. Oh, great. So he had an obliterated penis and the doctor told his parents, and I think the doctor was Jewish, if memory serves, told his parents, look, gender is a social construct. So just raise your boy as a girl. And they did. But by the time he was 14 or 15 and he had other emotional problems, he was a schizophrenic, I think he rejected it and eventually went back to being a boy. And I think he actually married and had children. So, there's no question that this sort of social pressure has done real damage to people. But I do I do wonder how much of it is like trendy. A lot of kids like to sort of jump on the train and they like to be some kind of psychologicalism.

But that seems to be particularly pronounced among females, right? So some of that is just the abundance or the false abundance that everybody perceives in life. And again, that is a very feminine trait, I think, Masculinity is about limitations. It's about truth. It's about constructing things in the real world. Femininity lends itself to the abstract, the ethereal. True. We're flowers.

One is that you're more representative of the broad swath of the population. Both of you are married. Both of you have children. Both of you are invested in the locality that you're in, whether that's politically, whether that's in the community, the churches that you take your kids to, the schools, the camps, the friends that you have. Go into all of this, the first question that you have to ask yourself is what is a nation, right? And Andrew Henderson, who's the founder of Nomad Capitalism, who's sort of like George Gammon and Doug Casey, there's a whole movement of these folks. The first thing that you need to understand, setting aside the ethics of the question, is who are these people? Well, most of them tend to be men. Most of them tend to be single. Most of them tend to be very, very wealthy. Things, the logistics of going to another country are still difficult. Because when you go to another country, at a minimum, it's going to cost you. You're going to have to acquire a visa. You're going to have to understand the local terrain, the local regulations, et cetera, et cetera, to set up shop. All of that is going to cost you time and money. In addition to that, there's a capacity problem. How are you going to sustain yourself? A lot of the folks that do this are what we call digital nomads. People that are making money working for Western countries or Western companies that permit them to generate revenue abroad. Would you two be able to do that? Well, maybe the two of you could, but the vast majority of people out there could not. Another question is legality. A lot of these countries, and I'm going to expand on this a little bit later, but a lot of these countries have strict quotas. They actually have something called border control, which we do not. So that filters people accordingly, right? It's not as if a mass horde of people from Coeur d'Alene, Idaho can simply uproot themselves and fly en masse the way a lot of people do in the United States. Their laws are different. In addition to that, there's this thing called assimilation. Now, assimilation is a uniquely Western idea. It does not exist in the rest of the world. And what you saw in that clip featuring Jim Rogers, who's another very famous investor, I think he lives in Singapore with his family. He's a well-heeled individual. So his his daughters learn Mandarin in a private school. Maybe they go to a Chinese school. I'm not sure. But they're not Chinese. OK. And just to illustrate this point, I used to live in Hong Kong. And when I was in I was in Hong Kong in 2019. And this is back when there were massive protests because the Chinese on the mainland governed by Beijing, they were trying to re-assimilate or reintegrate Hong Kong, which was a British protectorate for about 100 years. Years back into China. And when I was over there, there were a number of Brits, among other Europeans, who had lived there for 50 years, in some cases longer. And I remember talking to one woman in particular, and she was there with her two kids. She was white. Her two kids were white. And I asked her, I said, you know, what are your thoughts on what's happening in China, the mainland Chinese that are moving in, suppressing English, taking control of the local government, I'm a honky. I am

indigenous because my family's been here. I sort of responded to her and I said, listen, lady, you're not Chinese. This is not your country. And when I travel, when I've lived overseas and I've lived in a lot of countries, I've been to over 30, I never lose sight of that fact. And a lot of Americans and other Europeans do. What they do is effectively they go into these areas like Matt Henderson and they carve out a little space where they interact with people who are like themselves. Are sort of fenced away from them well, history shows that's not really a good idea; remember, the logistics, the capacity-all of that requires the wealth to do that. The final point I would say is that you know, what's happening right now in the world, whether it's this war in Eastern Europe, in Ukraine, that we're fighting by proxy against Russia, the conflict with Iran in the Middle East, this sort of burgeoning of conflict between the United States and China-what is all of this really about? Well, a lot of this is about globalism. A lot of this is about the world that has been dominated by Jewish power and capital, been dominated. What that means is that, yeah, this Scotsman who moved to Russia, he may think that he's safe, but his country, Russia, is now engaged in fighting a war against the globalized, socialized West. In other words, he's still part of this fight, whether he's in Russia or he's in the United States. So what I'm saying about all of this is it's an illusion. And when you think through the details and you actually go to this part of the world, No, your identity becomes flagrant. You can't escape it. You can't put mascara over your racial type, especially as a white person. And so there's no meaningful, there's no philosophical or metaphysical way. You could just sort of immerse yourself into a foreign country. And the second and related parts of that is sort of what you said, Rebecca. These parts of the world are extremely volatile. They're tribal. They're dynamic. They are not in any way, shape or form like the West. And the mistake that Henderson and his ilk have made is that they think they can manipulate that. They think they can sort of massage that. Well, the Chinese have been doing this for a long time. There's Chinese that live all over South Asia, in the Philippines, in Indonesia. There are Indian migrants that work all over the Middle East. There are Filipinos. There's like maybe 800,000 Filipinos that work in Hong Kong. They cause backlash because the indigenous population eventually wakes up and then you're shown the door or worse. So I guess all I'm saying is it's just not feasible. It's an illusion. It's not reality.

Rebecca Hargraves

[01:07:37] Yeah, I totally agree. I mean, I understand. Doing this as a plan B, you mentioned logistical concerns so something else that Nomad Capital talks about this is six. Um, he talks about free residency permits via financial institutions and I actually laughed out loud when I heard this because of all the things that you just mentioned like you can buy your way into residency but that doesn't make you a protected class if you're not part of the racial group of the given country. He literally says

You go and open a bank account In Turkey, with half a million dollars they'll give you citizenship. Talk about if you're a Westerner, a good plan B. Talk about a good backup. You want more global South in your life. Bruh.

I like the idea, which is why I wish they would do some kind of return to your homeland ancestry test. I like this if you had one grandmother born somewhere that you can get citizenship. Those are the three things that George and I talked about. At least have your residence permit. At least have a second citizenship and at least preferably have a home somewhere where you can go to where everything's ready for you. Like the old Chinese saying of having a second set of papers and some gold bars and a fast boat down by the harbor. Just be able to get out, and be able, as Robert Kiyosaki said at our Nomad Capitalist Live conference, 'you've got three days, where are you going to go?' And I think in some of these situations, whether it's tax, whether it's freedom, It could be as little as you've got three days. I saw that in March of 2020 when I was in Myanmar and they said you probably want to come back to Malaysia because everything in Asia is shutting the borders and if you don't, you'll be stuck in Myanmar. I did have like two days to get back and I had to change my flight and do it, and I'm glad that I did-I spent in the next six weeks in relative comfort versus in a hotel in Myanmar where God knows what would have happened. So anyway, back to the story. Draw a line in the sand and stick to it. Better to be years too early than a day too late.

It's called Dead Souls, the denationalization of the American elite. And basically what he describes is what you're seeing from Andrew Henderson. He is a Davos man. He has effectively become a Jewish elite in practice. Years ago on The Daily Show, something to the effect that I'm a Jew, my bags are always packed, right? In other words, I'm not really part of the society. At any given time, my passport is what defines me, right? There is no national identity. There is no nation. There is no there there. These are denationalized dead souls, which is exactly what Samuel Huntington said. In addition to that, what Henderson is not telling you is that when you go to countries dictatorship. If you break the law inadvertently or otherwise, you're going to go inside and you may never come out of prison ever. When I was in Mexico, for example, you can live in one of the wealthiest neighborhoods in Mexico, and you have to pay. Personally, you have to find somebody to take care of your trash because the trash system is so screwed up in Mexico. And that's just one of a host of problems. What if there's an infraction with the police? What if you have issues with organized crime? Right. There's all kinds of problems in these parts of the world that he's not talking to you about, probably because in some sense he may not have experienced them directly or he can afford to graft his way around them. For most of the population. The final thing I'll say on this is that the most egregious failure of this idea I actually witnessed personally when I was in Portugal. So Portugal is ostensibly a European country. I lived in Lisbon for several months and there are tons of Americans who are living there. Brits too, but Americans in particular and a lot of females, a lot of digital nomads because it's the cheapest, one of the cheapest places to go in Europe and you basically get a European lifestyle. Well, part of that is because the Portuguese government has encouraged digital nomads to come into the country, has encouraged tech companies to come in. A lot of the poorer European countries have done this with the idea that it would somehow enrich the local population. Well, when I was in Lisbon, you would hear English more than Portuguese. A lot of the old sort of ethnically Portuguese neighborhoods were being transformed into Airbnb's. And guess who was buying up all the businesses and pushing out the locals? American or British companies and God knows who was behind

them. So the locals, when I was there, were already beginning to express frustration. They were beginning to protest. They were beginning to organize politically because they were being forced out of their own hometowns. In other words, this is an idea that sounds great. Maybe it works on an individual level if you're a young man in his 20s and you want to sort of go off the grid for a while. I'm a German living in Germany or I'm a Frenchman, it's just not going to work. We're going to have to fight this and we're going to have to stand up in our own homelands. If we do, we'll win. Fleeing the problem is only going to make it worse.

How are we going to be able to interact with each other in a meaningful way? We need to be doing this in the United States. Every time I travel or take a long road trip. It just becomes evident to me, like even when we were driving back from Boise, I was looking around and I was like, this country is empty. And I went through one state. I've driven through Wyoming and South Dakota. There is like nothing out there. We need to take advantage of the wealth of land that we have in this country. Like, I just don't believe that we can't find white communities in this country or that there's a better option.

Either we're going to kill all these people or they're going to kill us. My bet is that eventually you're going to see a reversion to the mean. So we are going to do likewise in the United States and Europe; there is this thing called a nation. It's real. It's not an economic zone. It's not a set of tax codes, et cetera, et cetera. Eventually, the population wakes up and they expel the immigrants, the foreigners, the ethnic minorities

that are essentially unwanted. And that's that's where we're headed.

And she told me in Spanish: 'Look, The cartels govern everything in Colombia. They run everything. It is at their will, at their discretion, that there is stability or safety or what have you.' What does that tell you about the nature of your time there, your investment, whatever? You are basically in the heart of darkness. And when I travel, I never, ever lose sight of that fact, ever. I maintain a low profile. I do my best to speak the local language, particularly when I'm outside of a European country. And so they fall victim to exactly what happened to Dave and what happened to this poor girl. This is what you experience in the non-white world. This is why we're going to have to fight to protect our country because there is no place for us to go. It's an illusion.

And Liz Truss more or less did exactly what Donald Trump just passed with the big, beautiful bill. Her Chancellor of Exchequer, the Secretary of Treasury in the UK, basically came out Bill and said, well, we're going to give you whatever benefits from the government that you want; the National Health Service, welfare. We're going to guarantee it all. Oh, and by the way, to stimulate economic growth, we're going to cut your taxes. What happened was a fiscal emergency that removed Liz's trust in less than 90 days as the prime minister. She was forced to resign. And then you got Rishi Sunak, and now you have Keir Starmer. So, you notice this pattern. These prime ministers are not lasting very long, in part because you're in the throes of a fiscal catastrophe. That is exactly the same bill, more or less, that Donald Trump passed and for the same justification. It's Reaganomics here, not Thatcherism, but it's the same thing.
