[00:07:45] Let's start with a little bit about Old State Saloon. So what inspired you to transform the Old State Saloon into a venue?

[00:07:53] That talks about all of these taboo subjects, I think, just basically living through the last several years, I was already going into 2020, the type of person that would question everything; um, because I don't just take what they tell me as being true to actually be true. To actually be true, based off of all of the deceptions that I've kind of become aware of in the past. And so, after After I wound up buying this particular building and this bar and renaming it and remodeling it, I just kind of at the point in my life where I just let it all out there. I just throw it out there; who I am and what I believe in. This bar is going to have the take on the character of kind of my family and our values. And we decided just to be conservative Christian bar and restaurant. And to basically have people realize that as soon as they walk in the door, yeah.

[00:08:52] So you've received some international attention. How has this affected your life, your personal life, your ability to raise money?

Mark Fitzpatrick

[00:09:03] So it's interesting because there are people when we first opened, came and they would be frequent patrons. And then as we had more and more things happen, where it caught attention. Those, a lot of those people disappeared and never came back, but then a whole new group of people came. And I like to say that people will drive past three or four bars, you know, to get to our bar or three or four coffee shops. Cause we also serve coffee to get to our coffee shop because it means so much with that to them, knowing that we're aligned. With you know our beliefs and that you know we attract kind of that truth-seeking kind of person that knows the mainstream media is feeding you a bunch of lies and deceptions, and we're going to be done the conservative Christian side of things so they know that they're gathering with like-minded people. So in one instance we lost a lot of support and we get a lot of hate that comes in, but we are replaced with an overwhelming,

you know, amount of support from like-minded friends.

[00:10:09] Isn't it funny how that works out? When I started this, people were like, 'You're never going to be able to get a real job.' I'm like, 'Yeah, but all these other opportunities will arise and then they did. They really came to fruition. And you can speak freely, which is such a gift in life, yeah. My friends with normie jobs they are so paranoid, oh, and neurotic.

[00:10:30] And yeah, there's very few things as enriching to your life as being able to speak your mind whenever and not have to worry about like this, like debt structure grinding down on you, whether it's like You know, uh, school loans, car loans, house payment mortgage. And then it's like, Oh, now I've got to go to the LGBT sensitivity training work. And if I say the wrong pronouns, then I'm going to be screwed.

[00:10:59] Or if I look at a woman sideways, I'll get written up and have some HR meeting, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah. It's funny, yeah. You can't destroy somebody's reputation if they've already destroyed their own reputation. Joke's on you guys. So you have some long-term plans for the saloon. You're doing a kitchen and steakhouse expansion, I read?

[00:11:23] Yeah, I don't know if I'd call it a steakhouse. But we're going to do a kitchen expansion. We're going to go on the upper deck on the backside. And then even a deck above that's going to have two condos above it. And those condos, there's going to be food elevators that go from the kitchen straight up to the condos. So whoever lives in those is going to be able to order yummy, delicious, local, grass-fed, you know, chemical-free, seed oil-free food that comes right up the elevator to their residence, which is really cool.

[00:12:31] That's always a mixed bag. Like when people come around to the right idea, you're like, okay, like I'm glad the Overton window is shifting and everything, but I was saying this. So long ago. And I want the credit because my ego needs to be satisfied. That's how I feel with everybody talking about Israel. I'm like, how long have I been doing this? How many people have been canceled that are not properly getting the credit that they deserve?

[00:12:54] True. It's not about ego. You can't be egotistical. It's about the truth. Yeah. Spreading the truth, spreading love, love speech.

[00:13:01] You're asking a woman to put her ego aside. I spent 20 minutes putting on false eyelashes before the, like there's just no world in which I'm going to be able to do that. Okay. Oh man. Um, let's talk about heterosexual awesomeness month. That is what it's called, right? Because I feel like I was going to screw that up before this. I was like, I know I'm going to call him Mike and I know that I'm going to mess up hetero. I know. I know when you get into your mindset and you're like, don't say the thing, don't say the thing. You always say the thing. True. So I blame myself. So let's talk about this. What prompted you to launch hetero awesomeness month in June? And were you surprised by the massive international attention that you received?

[00:13:47] Well, I knew it would get some attention because it's an issue and it has been for years. And I think most people. Who, you know, has a moral compass they don't really want to have anything to do with it um but they're not like we kind of discussed already they're not willing to stand up and do anything about it they're you know so this was kind of a way to say hey let's look at a different thing to celebrate during June. And, you know, it kind of was spurred on by a conversation about our daughter's birthday in June. And what are we going to do when we have to stay away from downtown Boise and all these things? And because I don't want her seeing all that stuff and my kids seeing it. So and then I thought, well, what do people do that don't want to celebrate Pride during June? And I thought, well, we should celebrate God's design for sexuality. I mean, if it's sex month, why don't we celebrate, you know, God's design? And then I started thinking about it and that design is pretty awesome. So heterosexual awesomeness was born. I'm a bit of a marketer. So going online and looking at that term, I mean, it's pretty much non-existent other than, you know, for what we've done. So as far as like a search on Google or whatever, it's just going to pop

up. I didn't want to use Pride in the name or straight. They're just kind of people have tried straight pride. Things and parades before and they never really uh amounted to much, although I do commend them for trying um, but heterosexual awesomeness it truly is an awesome gift from God um, ultimately I don't know that we should really be publicly celebrating any sexuality. It'd be nice to live in a world where that wasn't the case. But if we're going to be celebrating sexuality, we ought to be celebrating this sexuality of all other sexualities.

[00:15:37] That's absolutely true. And I think that there is a thirst for this. We've talked about, I don't want to liken your event to Hawk to a girl. I don't want to do that. However, however, hear me out. Last year was the Hawk to a girl and everybody was like, why did she achieve viral fame? Why? She's mid blah, dah, dah, dah. And I was like, People are trying to celebrate normal heterosexual sexuality, even if that means upholding sluts, even if that's the case. So I think that that is actually why she went viral. So this is just a much more wholesome way to capture the audience, a much more appropriate way to capture the audience that is really sick of dealing with June. Every June, I'm like, ugh. Even in Coeur d'Alene, we have pride celebrations.

[00:16:20] Yeah, we've got. And it's so funny because I saw there was a headline. I show prep should have brought it up. But let's see. Boise cancels Pride kickoff. Right. And so I know that the yeah, here it is. The Pride kickoff got canceled due to low attendance. Despite strong online support. Right, okay, so the online people are very strongly supportive. Plus bots. But the issue that we're also running into here in North Idaho, where we don't have anybody nearly as bold as you, as fearless as you, as trusting in God, the marketing genius. Well, I'm just saying, like, there isn't one business up here that would put their you know, money where their mouth is and support the truth, right? Like we were run by SPLCconnected mafia up here. And we've got, I'm going to pull it up. I think we've got our little Pride in the Park event, which is happening again this year. Let's see. I've got it here. CDA for Pride is happening next Saturday in the park. You'll remember three, four years ago, they had a bunch of children watching some adult dancers on stage as they were shaking their bits and receiving dollar tips like strippers. And, you know, this has not stopped. They've steamrolled everybody that stood up to it. They sued an independent journalist for like a million dollars for saying the truth. And there's no organized resistance in North Idaho to this. So it's so nice to see somebody. In Boise, which is, you know, it is much worse in Boise than it is up north. I mean, I don't want to overstate the problem up here. It's like one or two businesses that are into this. But down south, you've got the Balcony Club. I mean, you go downtown and it feels like you're in D. C. or something.

[00:18:19] Except it is cleaner. It is cleaner, though. That's true. Very clean.

[00:18:23] Did you have vendor refusals? Have you dealt with the backlash? Have you dealt with that? In a way that's been really meaningful to your financial situation, like what kind of financial repercussions have you had for lunches?

Mark Fitzpatrick

00:18:38] I think there's a lot of people who won't step foot or deal with us. They won't step foot inside our place, even though they don't disagree with it and they like it. They don't want to be associated because they're out of fear. Uh, there's musicians most of the musicians in Boise won't play or associate themselves with us and that's because not because they disagree with us because I've talked to many of them. However, they don't want to deal with the attack on LGBTQ+ Pride. I went through that attack and I know how it goes, so I don't I can understand their concern that you know they're trying to make it in the music world or someone's trying to make it in the baking world or whatever, and suddenly everybody comes and attacks you, comes and attacks your tallow soap company because you're associated with Old State Saloon, and it starts to really frighten an entrepreneur and all of the work that they've done to maintain a good reputation and everything. So I get it. But it is massive. They're very good at making it seem like they're bigger than they are. And their attack isn't like a normal boycott like we would do it, of course, with ethics by simply stating that this doesn't align with our beliefs. And we encourage people to think twice about where you spend your money. You know, when I talk about Albertsons, that's what I would say. I don't get 5,000 people to send Albertson's naked photos of Jesus doing pornographic things.

Mark Fitzpatrick

[00:20:19] Yes. I get those every day. I get stuff like that. And I've been getting that for a year now. And so it's that or it's phone calls. I have people call me and they say, 'I hope you die tomorrow.' I do get actual death threats.

[00:20:35] That's what love is love means. Just death threats constantly.

Mark Fitzpatrick

[00:20:39] Feeling the love. So, yeah, I mean, it's significant because it's not a sexuality. It's an ideology. It's a religion. It's a fanatical religion. And it's demonic. And so I've experienced that. Now, are there people in that community who are relatively ethical, hardworking, you know, productive Americans? Heck yeah, there are and I've made friends with a lot of them and I had somebody reach out yesterday online, it says they're just basically like got divorced from you know their gay marriage and they're trying to get out of

the whole community and because of the wickedness that's involved with it and all of the people that are surrounding them all the time are just completely wicked. And they want out and they really appreciate it like I really appreciate what you're doing, I'm still gay but I really appreciate what you're doing because you're right, it is God, it's gone way too far, it is wicked and I think there's a lot of people who are old school LBGT people who they have they just don't even know like like you know there's a lot of people in the church that don't know how wicked pride movement is. And there's a lot of people that are in the LGBT community that don't know how wicked it is. A big chunk of it is so wicked. And we'll get into that. I mean, it's basically directed at targeting children. That's the wickedness. And it targets them and it preys upon them, especially the weak ones, especially the ones that have a bad family life at home, especially the ones that are on the spectrum of autism. It targets them and then slowly rolls. pressures them or lures them into considering the fact that they may be something different than god created them to be and now all of a sudden you have classmates affirming that and they're like oh maybe i am a girl or maybe i am a boy or whatever and then everybody labels them once you get labeled it's almost impossible to you know back out of that and that for the first time in their life they are feeling like uh they're they're feeling like uh Let me turn that off.

[00:22:48] Sorry. I'm like, I'm like trying to pull up some like B roll here. I don't mean to be distracting you.

[00:22:55] Yeah. So their, their first time in their life, when the people come around and support them and affirm them, they're like, Oh, I feel loved. Okay. And when they feel loved, they want to keep going. So they keep getting that affirmation.

[00:23:08] They go too far into it. They realize that's not who they are. And then a great depression comes into their life. A lot of times there's like attempts at suicide and everything else, which of course they blame on people like me, which is ridiculous. But that's the pattern of it. And it's complete wickedness.

Rebecca Hargraves

[00:23:25] Yep. I totally agree. And I think that we can all reflect on the trends in transgenderism over the last five to 10 years and see that that really was just a Trojan horse for pedophilia in the gay community. Because they're saying that if children can consent to these massive changes in their bodies that are irreparable in many cases, that they can also consent to sex because that seems like the lesser thing. And if I were a lesbian, if I were a gay man, I would look at the transgender community and be like, 'We are not the same. We are not the same.' I think that the LGBTQ community has just picked up. QIA 2S plus. I'm not

doing all that. I think that they've picked up too many causes and it is just fracturing. It's fracturing their movement.

To him, the whole gay thing was about being anti-establishment, about being punk rock, about being like 'F you' to the system.

[00:24:49] And in like 2016, I remember going into the bar and he gives me the Elon salute. And I'm like, 'yo', what? And he's like, 'yeah', since they started this gay pride thing, I'm fascist now. I don't like this. I was into this to be a rebel. And now we've got gay Oreos. Uh, this isn't for me anymore, is he back to women? No, he's, he's still like, he's just alone; he's just like you know old and alone, but love him, uh, but you know there is something to that where it's like it was kind of like the punk rock movement, it was anti-establishment, then it gets co-opted and now it's turned into this kind of like sick eugenics program, almost, and it's bizarro where like the democrats are pushing it, and it's like I don't know if they've thought this through but like you are convincing these people to remove themselves from the gene pool, uh. And, you know, hey, whatever. But at the same time, that's what's going on. It is like a eugenics movement that is crippling people's ability to reproduce and the species itself. And children. So these big things that hit you, this onslaught of hate online. It's not real. And if you step out of the mold, it's not going to ruin you. It didn't ruin you. It hasn't ruined us. It can open up opportunities. So what advice would you give to entrepreneurs that are considering similar initiatives to the Old State Saloon?

right; you have to be bold and step forward and say 'I'm this', I'm leaning fully into this thing, yeah! And people will come along and support you because there's a lot of people who come up to me and they basically say, 'Thank you for saying everything that I want to say but I can't and And we kind of touched on that. They have a job where if they did say something, they would lose that job and that job provides for their family. And so I'm not here to like judge any individual and whether or not they're like basically selling out to the system or not, because sometimes it can certainly be easy to do that. But it's that's the reality of the situation. So for me, like I'm my own boss, you know, I don't have to report to anybody. um other than god and i all i want to be able to do is stand before god and said hey look you gave me this and this is what i did with it and i'm not afraid of losing everything because it's all god's anyways right so um i whatever he wants me to be a steward of i'll be a steward of it and i'm going to use it for trying to get as much truth out there as possible when you i always tell people at old state saloon we're here at this event whatever event it is that we have and we're seeking truth and uh jesus is the way the truth and the life and it that the more that we seek truth the more we're gonna see christ and uh that's you know i always tell people hey look if you want to meet and know what that means i'm all about that people that see this show if you reach out and email me i'll gladly jump on a video call and tell you what that means and hopefully it can change your Life, yeah!

You just don't like the truth that I'm telling. And it's not nice. You're saying it's not nice. And nice is a word I tell my kids and my family. We don't want to use that word unless we're using it properly. But nice is essentially coupled with deception. When you're nice to somebody, you're essentially, in some way, you're deceiving them about something. You're

not telling them the exact truth or bringing truth to them. When you're kind, love is patient and kind. When you're kind, you're bringing truth. And when I tell people the truth, whether it's LGBTQ or somebody in big evangelical church who's bending over backwards to make excuses for everything that Israel does, That's kindness. And he's obviously is going to have a way more people seeing it than we have seen it because we don't have that many followers yet. But when you have that team of people and they're all going to agree to push this out, that means we're going to get a big audience on all of the content we're creating. All the funds come in like they do to Daily Wire because people are going to stop sending their money there and they're going to start sending it to heteroawesome. org. We're not afraid to go and report and dig information. We'll be pushing it out and we'll be pushing it out to a huge audience because we're talking to more and we're going to be adding more to both that and then our events.
