

Transcript: Clews Interview with Hargraves

David Clews is a British controversial political activist and media figure best known as the head of Unity News Network (UNN), a UK-based online outlet that spreads conspiracy theories, nationalist talking points, and far-right-leaning content.

[00:00] David Clews: Rebecca Hargraves, Rebecca, how are you, madam?

[00:02] Rebecca Hargraves: Good, I'm so sorry. I thought this was at one o'clock. We just wrapped an interview with Zach Kidd.

[00:07] David Clews: So no problem. How about in the world are you?

[00:11] Rebecca Hargraves: I'm in North Idaho.

[00:13] David Clews: North Idaho, brilliant. Rebecca, for anyone that doesn't know, you please introduce yourself to the UNN audience.

[00:19] Rebecca Hargraves: Sure. My name is **Rebecca Hargraves**. I have a YouTube channel. It was Blonde in the belly of the beast, which I regret every day naming my channel something so long, but, you know, branded for better or worse. I am the host of a podcast called The Backlash. I do it with Dave Riley and Cameron McGregor. We air on Wednesdays at 4 p.m. Pacific Standard Time. If you want to check that out, you can check it out on my YouTube channel, on our YouTube channel at Real Backlash. So much. Thank you so much for joining me today for having me on. I really appreciate it.

[00:51] David Clews: No, it's fantastic. I'm sure many of our audience will be will be delighted. Roshna Wickey describes you as a reactionary anti-feminist. Would that be fair enough?

[01:02] Rebecca Hargraves: I guess. I mean, I started with anti-feminism as most of us did. I started in 2016, and that was kind of my introduction into the dissident right. And then, you know what happened? I just became increasingly radical. It just just catapulted me into a stratosphere of JQ talk. And that is where I am right now. I just can't stop talking about it. It's like loggeria, word vomit. We just talk about it constantly. I don't know what's wrong with me.

[01:34] David Clews: Once you notice, you just can't stop noticing, I'm afraid.

[01:38] Rebecca Hargraves: There's no unnoticing, is there?

[01:40] David Clews: No.

[01:41] Rebecca Hargraves: There's no going back, no taking the blue pill again. And so now I just talk about the Jews ad nauseam if you want to listen to the backlash.

[01:50] David Clews: Yes. It's interesting, though, because you guys are much more advanced over in America than we are here. I am so frustrated in this country because everybody is still in the ninth. 2003, George W. Bush, you're either with us or you're with the terrorist mindset. I don't know if you saw today.

Today was the anniversary of 7-7, which was the suppose of London bombings.

[02:22] David Clews: And as we've been clearly pointing out, I don't know if you knew this story. Benjamin Netanyahu was in London that day. He stayed in his hotel room with a group of Mossad agents. And he was lucky enough to not go to a conference that day. And he could have died if he'd gone out apparently.

[02:44] Rebecca Hargraves: He does have a lot of luck following him, that man.

[02:49] David Clews: It's like lucky, lucky Larry Silverstein as well, another famous man over in 9-11. Yes.

[02:54] Rebecca Hargraves: Yeah, I think he was warned by his brother.

[02:58] David Clews: Well, so Rebecca, what was your political journey been then? Were you like a trumpet at one point? Were you part of MAGA?

[03:06] Rebecca Hargraves: I was in 2016. If you remember the Peter Strock-Fiesa situation in 2016, 2017, at that point in time, I still had a lot of faith that people would experience some degree of justice. Like I still believed in the Constitution and the judicial system. And I really thought that justice was going to be achieved somehow. And then that I just became so disillusioned after that. I was immediately off the Trump train. I don't know, I think it happened 2017, 2018. I did not vote in 2020 or 2024 because I was like voting is fake and gay. I'm not doing this anymore. I don't believe that women should vote. And I was like, I should just practice what I preach here and not vote. And so I saw a lot of hopeum coming through, especially in 2024, where people were like, you know, Trump's, he's not part of the swamp. He's going to do everything. And I was like, we have been down this road before. I'm not going to partake in this system anymore. And I won't not even at a local level much to my podcast co-hosts. Shagren, he's looking at me like, but I listen is, listen, is, is, is, is brilliant, Rebecca.

[04:21] David Clews: I mean, we totally agree. And you're your mom as well. How many kids you got?

[04:25] Rebecca Hargraves: I have two daughters. So I have a five year old and a 16 month old. And that keeps me very occupied. But now I'm so invested in their future. I don't know what's wrong with boomers. My parents excluded, but they seem totally unconcerned that they're handing a worse world to their children. And I'm just freaking out all the time. You know, I'm trying to arrange their marriages already and I'm making sure that they're safe. And I'm trying to hand them a better world to the point of obsession.

[04:56] David Clews: You should you should be come on, Rebecca, you should be going around the world cruises instead and enjoying yourself.

[05:01] Rebecca Hargraves: You should be refinancing your home and just going on a cruise.

[05:05] David Clews: Come on.

[05:05] Rebecca Hargraves: I'm thinking about that reverse mortgage already and how I can go on many cruises, not carnival cruises, though. Those are the black ones, right?

[05:14] David Clews: Well, I've been seeing some of the footage from them. They look, they look quite interesting to say the least. I know, right?

[05:20] Rebecca Hargraves: I just expect the next carnival cruise video that I see that the put pops up to be some sort of, you know, drive by cruise shooting to carnival cruises, pass each other. And it's just pew, pew, pew.

[05:32] David Clews: It's just it is. I mean, it's so funny you say that, like, and I am the same kind of, so is most of my audience. There's an asteroid approaching, right? It's a huge asteroid. Everyone's like, look, 20 years, even less, like, white people are now 7% of the world. We used to be 30%. The cities are no go areas. You know, you've got rampant crime. You've got these forever words. The debt is completely out of control. I mean, why do you think so many people are just living in La La Land?

And when you talk about, like, the boomer generation, I've got, I actually call it boomer brain.

[06:12] David Clews: Because it's effect just, I mean, it does affect a certain age group, but it seems to affect everyone. I think a lot of it is to do with just Hollywood, like the watch Schindler's List, the watch saving private Ryan, the watch band of brothers.

They're just incapable of thinking beyond what has been programmed.

[06:34] Rebecca Hargraves: Yeah. I mean, I do kind of extend a little bit of forgiveness to the boomers because they were probably the most heavily propagandized generation in human history. They had the sexual revolution and Jews, I mean, taking control of Hollywood and promoting a secular society and atomizing communities, destroying the nuclear family. They just created this perfect climate to breed their propaganda. And boomers fell for it hook, line and sinker to the point that they are just hyper focused on the accumulation of wealth, but don't care about subsequent generations. And I think that the Jews have been absolutely successful in terms of propagandizing boomers. I am very excited about the developments in Gen Z and Gen Alpha, though. I think that they are really resisting. I've read some studies on Gen Z and 30 percent don't believe that the Holocaust happened. 30 percent. I read that and I was like, that is astounding and promising. That means that they are not going to be propagandized in the same way that every generation was. I don't know how your education was, but every year we had to learn about the Holocaust. I didn't learn anything about the Hall of Demor, how Christians have been persecuted, nothing like that. But we were reading Eli Weasel's Night every year instead of

Shakespeare or anything from classical Western literature. So I actually experienced a lot of this propaganda as well. But luckily, these younger generations, they're like, this is gay and they're just not doing it. They're just resisting it.

[08:11] David Clews: Yeah, I mean, I think there is a lot. I think a lot of it is also because of what's happened in Gaza. I think a lot of young people, like they may not approach it from our perspective, but they're maybe looking at it and thinking, look, even if this did happen, it was nearly 100 years ago and look at what's been done in Gaza. And I think it is interesting that that is definitely happening. And I do not think that is why they're having such a meltdown.

Like you see the likes of Mark Levin, Ben Shapiro, I mean, they are clearly losing it in real time because

[08:47] David Clews: they were all powerful 10, 15 years ago and the wheels are coming off very, very quickly.

[08:55] Rebecca Hargraves: Yeah, I think that that is something to do with it. We are strange bedfellows, though, with the pro-Palestinian movement, which I'm kind of fine with at this point. I'm just at this point where I'm like, we can make alliances with people that we have ideological issues with. I think that's what the left does. They do a much better job than we do. And we kind of need to be doing that. We need to be not so concerned with our sense of morality.

[09:23] David Clews: It's a pragmatism that's required.

I mean, as I say, like clearly, I don't agree with these peoples.

[09:29] Rebecca Hargraves: I mean, they see Israel as a white supremacist settler state, which we know isn't true, but

[09:36] David Clews: they are pushing an anti-Zionist agenda. And what's very interesting is I've actually got a lot of people who initially were part of that, but then they've heard me, they've maybe heard other people and they're now seeing the bigger picture. But it's not Zionism that's the problem. It is Jewish supremacism that is the problem. And that is the only logic that we... It's the end road. That's the end point that you come to. And a lot of people are reaching that. And do you think, Rebecca, as well, like in America, can you overcome just the structural problems that you guys have? Because the immigration there is just so out of control, illegal and legal.

I mean, is it possible that it can be brought back together or do you see separatism?

[10:31] David Clews: Do you see... What's the word for it? It's not seditions. I can't remember all of it. What's the word about a state breaks off? Secession. You see that happening?

[10:42] Rebecca Hargraves: I think that that's kind of a best case scenario. I mean, one of the advantages that America has over European nations is that we have this massive landmass. It's just incredible how much space we have here. You can drive for 10 hours and see just like two tiny towns. So we have a lot of places to go. In terms of leaving America, we

had an episode in the backlash about this last week. I just don't think it's feasible. We're going to have to have some kind of separatist societies where we resist the government. Luckily, there are massive systemic failures in our federal government and our state government. In terms of being oppressed by the system, I'm not sure how much longer the system is going to last. We are entering an era of financial issues that may be unprecedented. People are like, it's going to be like the Great Depression. I'm like, I think it's going to be worse than that. How many trillion dollars in debt are we? We have these social programs that are supporting non-citizens. What are we doing here? I think the only way to combat this is to have separatist societies where there is some element to the best of our ability of self-governance, of taking care of ourselves in terms of the food supply, the grid. That really is the only way that we're going to be able to deal with this.

[12:04] David Clews: I personally think there is one last hurrah about to take place. I reckon what will happen is they'll cut interest rates to like one or two percent. They'll print a whole tonne of money. Then that will take us up to maybe 2029. Then it's 100 years since the Great Depression.

[12:21] Rebecca Hargraves: Then as you say, after that, they won't be able to print again.

[12:25] David Clews: They won't be able to cut again.

I just think everything will collapse in the 2030s.

[12:32] Rebecca Hargraves: I absolutely agree. I don't know what kind of timeline we're on. My podcast co-host, Cameron McGregor, thinks that we might be five to nine years out from a major financial issue, but we are experiencing that now. I mean, it's being covered up by money printing, by inflation, but the average individual is experiencing the effects of this. I mean, how much money do any of us spend when we go to the grocery store? Like if you're not buying Zogslap, every time you go to the grocery store, you're spending \$200, \$300. The groceries last you maybe a week. It's just such a struggle for the average family that I find it hard to believe that people aren't really experiencing the backlash, the bad guys.

The reality is born out in the birth rates.

[13:19] David Clews: Society has always been reliant on people being able to have a home and to procreate. What's happening is birth rates have just totally collapsed. You've now got a stage where the average white woman is probably at 0.80, 0.7. Again, people might not see it right in front of their face, but that's the reality. It's interesting when you say that as well about the cost of living.

I watched a really interesting thing about Greece.

[13:43] David Clews: Greece has just knackered. I mean, they've built their whole country. I know this is a bit of a segue, but they had 9 million tourists in 2008. Last year, they had 41 million tourists.

But what that means is just entire suburbs of Athens and Thessalonica are all like Airbnbs.

[14:03] David Clews: Young people cannot afford to rent or afford to buy a house. I don't know how it is where you are, Rebecca, but I see all these young people

and their lives are just so shallow.

[14:15] David Clews: And all these young girls, they've got all the nose rings, the tats are everywhere. And it's this horrible nihilistic lifestyle they're living. Is that the same in America and the big cities?

[14:27] Rebecca Hargraves: Oh, yes. Absolutely. But I think that we will see Gen Z rage against this because they've been stripped of their identity. I mean, to the most basic level, they've been stripped of their gender identity. What's more basic to a concept of self than like, I am a man or I am a woman. And you can't really carry these identities through life. Like, I'm sure you follow people on Twitter that are detransitioners. And I follow some of those people too, and they are pissed. They are so pissed. They're like, why did my idiot mom and my school counselor and my therapist allow me to cut my boobs off when I was 13?

[15:05] David Clews: I don't know.

[15:06] Rebecca Hargraves: Like, what do you know when you're 13? And so they become adults and we have social media. And so they have a platform to talk about what was really done to them. And that is going to make huge waves when people don't have an identity and they don't have financial security, when they don't have family, they realize that they are totally uprooted and they become resentful. Now, who do they become resentful to? They're looking for people to blame, which is good. I mean, you can't lay the blame on a child for the things that have been done. They are looking towards the government. They're looking towards the schools. They're looking towards their parents. And I think they're furious at what has been done to them, what has been taken from them. And it remains to be seen how this will play out. But I cannot imagine that it's not going to cause destruction within the realms that I just discussed.

[15:57] David Clews: There's so many people on social media whose big thing is, let's all laugh at like trannies. Let's all, let's pick a fight with trannies. I say every one of these people is a victim of the Talmudic global order. They have fallen for, these people are victims. We should sympathize with them. They have fallen for the lies and the propaganda. And they've gone and as you say, jet, they have mutilated their bodies.

But not only that, someone has been paid to mutilate these poor people's bodies for them.

[16:29] David Clews: And as I say, these people are victims and we should regard them as victims. And we need to label and destroy the people who created this culture to happen.

[16:39] Rebecca Hargraves: I mostly agree with you, although I'm going to push back on this, because we're never going to have any data on how many of these people are autogonophiles and how many of these people are pedophiles and that their transition is representative of a larger movement to remove consent from children. So I see, I see trannies and they're like 30s and 40s post op and it's all about appearing as a woman for their own sexual gratification. Now these people, they're opportunists and I don't know what percentage of the trans movement this is, but they should be mocked and ridiculed endlessly. I don't like the idea that they should be allotted victimhood because a lot of them are pedophiles, like a lot.

[17:23] David Clews: Yeah, I mean, this is an issue that a lot of people do like this sick world we live in. I mean, that is a problem that we face. People have taken the poison that has been offered to them. And as you say, there are a lot of perverts out there that are all as sickos who are jumping on this and clearly we cannot tolerate that whatsoever.

So Rebecca, just again, I'm really interested in what you see going forward.

[17:50] David Clews: You've got Trump in just now, he's draining the swamp, everyone thinks it's great. We all know it's going to collapse. What do you hope happens in either in the next few years or in the 2030s? What do you think needs to happen?

[18:06] Rebecca Hargraves: Well, I mean, we're 100 years late on turning this ship around. I don't think it's really possible. I think that Americans need to abandon the American experiment, the concept of the American experiment, the idea that our Constitution is going to provide protection for individual liberties. And I think with that, with that emptiness that they feel, I want them to develop white consciousness. I want them to develop a fierce loyalty to ethnos. And I think if that happens, then we can begin to resurrect some of the culture that came from the greats in Western history. And we just talked about this with Zach Kidd. But if you develop culture, if you develop that concept of stability and creativity and have a moral framework for people, they will revert to that because that is the natural state of the white racial spirit, stability and order and creativity and acceptance within our own communities. And I think that these are all good things, but they've been outsourced in this pathological way to minority groups. So if we can get people to abandon these ideologies that I really think are imprisoning them. And one of those is the concept of Americanism. Like I have as little in common with a pro-Trump megatard that believes in America and the concept of a melting pot as I do with a trans-leftist that believes in open borders. I'm like, people are worthless to me. And until you develop this concept of white consciousness, and that's where your loyalties lie, you're worthless.

[19:45] David Clews: Rebecca, I always tell my audience not to listen to women because women are on the whole talk. I think we've all, you've come on, you're looking blonde, you're looking great. And we're all salivating here at this, Rebecca. We're loving this. We're loving it.

[20:01] Rebecca Hargraves: I agree with you. I mean, I think that there should be no female leaders within the movement. Like that is not, I am a single voice and I'm putting it out there. And really I'm doing this so that I don't have guilt later in life that I didn't do what I could do for my girls. I don't want them to grow up and be like, mom, like what the f- what did you do that happened? Like I did everything I could. I did everything I could. And that's what I want to know, that I did everything that I could. As far as being a leader in this movement, I have no interest in that.

[20:30] David Clews: I have a lot of respect for you seeing that. And the reality is it is up to men to sort this out. And I see so many men on social media, they love to hide behind pretty women. And they love to, they love to, it is such a weak thing to do. Allow them to say what they can't. I mean,

there is this other thing as well, people just love it when a foreigner speak. They hide behind

[20:56] David Clews: instead of saying, look, I am a white man. This is what I believe. This is what we need to do.

[21:02] Rebecca Hargraves: And we need men to do it. Because that's the natural order of society. Society is hierarchical. Society is also patriarchal as well. And that's what, it's not to say that women

[21:17] David Clews: will be fully burkered up and they're not allowed to take part in politics or have a voice. But clearly, when they are allowed in positions of leadership on mass, it just doesn't work.

[21:29] Rebecca Hargraves: And it's proven that. And even if these based women are leaders of the movement, it will descend into catty rivalry and in fighting and things like that. We just cannot be past the torch in that way. It would just be a disaster. The matriarchy will come out even if it's conservative women. I say the same as well about homosexuals and conservatism. You cannot

[21:56] David Clews: be an out homosexual and have a position in this field because you have chosen your life, your sexual proclivities. You have prioritized that over your nation, over your people. You just can't have it. Again, people have been doing that for a long time. I would rather they didn't, but it is what it is. You can then take a leadership role and your behavior leaves you open to black

[22:25] Rebecca Hargraves: male. Exactly. It leaves you open to compromise. Yes, that's absolutely true. And I think that we need to resist this urge as a movement. I saw this a lot with the Vekram Swami. Everybody's like, yeah, I know he's brown, but he's saying what I want him to say. I'm like, who gives a shit? He's brown. Like, no, it doesn't matter. And then it turns out that he was immersed in some sort of massive scandal that led to his billionaire. You used to be pumped and dumped people and I think pharmaceutical is just a typical Indian scammer. The thing is, he was still doing the Indian scam, except he was doing it on white people. It was just the same scam. People wanted to act like because he's Brahmin that he's not Indian. It's like, okay, this is bread and butter Indian stuff. We need to establish this and we do it with gay people all the time. We do it with women. Everyone wants to talk about Christie, Nome and blah. I'm like, no, we need a man that is a leader that's like absolutely unapologetic about being white positive and that he doesn't apologize and he doesn't suffer fools. And I'm waiting for that kind of individual to emerge within the movement. I mean, I like Nick Fuentes and I love the Gropers. That guy is the best that we've got right now. That's the best we've got. We need more people like Nick Fuentes.

[23:51] David Clews: I think that a lot of my, again, I was still listening to Nick Fuentes back in 2018. That's when I started listening to him. I think Nick Fuentes on the Jewish question is the best. He's easily the best there is. He's outstanding. The only thing is, I think he is still a bit

immature and he's still young and that is a problem. And I do think in an ideal world, they would get married or whatever. I think that will maybe come eventually. But as you say, Nick Fuentes is, he has revolutionized so much of young MAGA, which just cannot be taken away

[24:28] Rebecca Hargraves: from him. Yeah. He is a natural order that is unparalleled within the movement. And so I do, I love it when people listen to him, but we do need something like Nick Fuentes with this, the same skill level, a man that is married and has children and talks about the role of fatherhood and the nuclear family within society, because there is this grouper element of just hating women. And I understand that. It is, it's too, it's too, it's, yeah, it is actually, it's quite,

[24:58] David Clews: that is my downside about it is a bit unhealthy. Like, as I said, you should love women, women. Every man is born of a mother. Every man is born of a woman. I think some of it does stem, though,

just from society. But as you say, it does go a wee bit too far. And that is a failing. And I

[25:17] Rebecca Hargraves: think he probably knows that deep down. Well, I'm not saying that he's incorrect about women. I've helped some of my friends in the dating pool and the quality of women in the Western world is so abysmal that men are making concessions that would be unthinkable 30 years ago, even 30 years ago. So, so he's got a point, you know, he's got a point. However, it is a hindrance to family formation. And we're trying to get that birth rate up. So the solution is to, you know, to have a man that's like, I know it's harder to date right now, much harder, it's more competitive. The sexual marketplace is absolutely asymmetric. But you only need to find one good woman, only one. I know that that you're going to go through hundreds that are not good women, but you just need to find one. And that will help you form a white family. It is very sad when you hear from

[26:10] David Clews: young people and I've ever been anywhere and spoken to them just how horrific it is in the whole,

the whole Tinder scene. It's just, it's just, it's awful. I mean, it really is just, it's an awful

[26:23] Rebecca Hargraves: world. And again, only fans and we all know who's behind that. We all know who's pushing that hookup culture. It's gentle. Nope, I'm just kidding. No, I understand. I mean, I hear stories of people that are dating now. And one of the things that's happening is this forever girlfriend thing. And this is a huge problem too. Like I read stories and I have friends where it's like, I've been dating this guy for six years for eight years. And like, what are you doing? We can move back to courtship culture because dating culture inherently is gay. Like we should be like, people shouldn't be meeting online and then banging. Like what is everybody doing? This is insane. You should be in a relationship that is overseen by parents to make sure that no hanky-panky is going on. And then there is a decision where there's like a choice for the girl, but it's really a choice between five people that her parents have carefully cultivated. Right? It's the illusion of choice. And that's kind of what we need to move back to. And stoning if you don't accept those people. I hate to move back to the middle ages. The thing is as well, everything is just so unnatural. Everything has been turned on

[27:45] David Clews: its head. And it is amazing when like you had a situation like, I talk often about my grandfather,

my grandfather married my grandmother. I never met them. He was 18 and she was 20. They had their

[27:59] David Clews: first kid. They went on, they had 11 children. And they lived in a room and kitchen. I mean, it's just, and he worked on the cruise ships as a silver service waiter. And then he fought in

the war. And it's quite funny. He was always away for like a year or two years. And then every time he would come back, there'd be a baby born nine months later. I mean, but they were married. It

[28:26] David Clews: was an innocence to it. There was, you know, a niceness to it. And it's just, you want to, you want to kind of get back to that innocence of life because it's all been,

[28:35] Rebecca Hargraves: all that innocence has been destroyed, hasn't it? Yes, definitely. I think people should be marrying their high school speed hearts. That's the way to solve this. I think everybody is so obsessed with this idea that there's something better out there. There's nothing better out there. There isn't. There are a bunch of dudes that are going to pump and dump you. The dating field is just a nightmare. Yeah, that's the whole thing about Tinder as well. If you're dating a girl on

[29:03] David Clews: Tinder, you just need to know that she can go straight home and she'll go back on that app and she'll be swiping away and there'll be hundreds of people there. I mean, it is just, it's so, it's such a horrific, disgusting culture. And that is a very good point you make about something better when you really, what, why do you think that is for so many people? There's always this longing

[29:27] Rebecca Hargraves: for something to be better. Where does that come from? I think some of it's human nature, but it's just exposure to endless options. I mean, we weren't supposed to be living these lives. Our great grandparents, they never left their village. They didn't have all of this dopamine hits of world travel. They didn't have access to international news in the same way that we do. Like people kept their communities small. And a lot of that was because of the lack of social media and things like that and all this exposure to the outside world. But we didn't realize what we were going to lose when you bring the world into your own home. Like, I'm not supposed to know what's going on in Gaza right now. I mean, Idaho mom, I shouldn't be like on the internet talking about the Jews. No, I should be with my 11 kids happy in my own small world. But because of the access to, you know, seemingly better opportunities that we have, way too much information, way too many options. A lot of people feel like trapped in their lives, which they shouldn't be because, you know, home life, that is supposed to be freedom for women. And now it's been turned on its head and it's viewed as servitude.

[30:45] David Clews: It's interesting you talk about small worlds. Obviously, I'm in the UK, so you have to keep in mind we don't have your free speech laws, but there was a certain politician made a speech in

the 1930s to a group of women. And he spoke about the importance of small worlds and that you must

[31:02] David Clews: maintain these small worlds. But from your small worlds, it will provide into stability for the

[31:09] Rebecca Hargraves: wider nation. It's interesting you use that. Have you heard that speech before? I have.

[31:15] David Clews: You know the speech. Okay, so you know, and that that is a very interesting template for for that and how a wider society can be can be founded. And that's this thing as well. People

go on about how wonderful the modern world is. Why are so many people on anti-depressants?
