Nick Fuentes is, which is absolutely insane. He's like competing up there with, and that's without getting the love from Rumble. Like, you know, Dan Bongino and all these people, they get the love. Tim Pool, which that means is that when a stream ends on Rumble. If you're watching anybody stream, what they do is they redirect you to whoever's on their featured page. So that's why Charlie Kirk looks like he's got a million people, but half that audience could be sleeping and just left their computer on, and they get automatically transferred into his feed. Nick Fuentes is getting that by himself, \$20,000 to \$30,000. So she's saying that they were bots, that a Republican wrote this long expose on it, but no facts. But there was nothing in it that backed up what Sarah was claiming. Sarah was claiming that he's getting all these bots and he's paid for by, like, who is it, like the Islamic Brotherhood or something?

[00:14:36] This Israeli penal colony basically, uh, any, any thoughts you know that's it's gonna be very interesting to see how that plays out because I just read, uh, an article by a gentleman, uh, Ben gave me this article that went really deep into all the way back to like, the, like, the 75 when I, I just did a documentary on it and how and I broke down exactly how the United States government, USAID, and all these organizations were funding the government, and then arming the cartels, right? They were funneling both sides of it. We went and rounded up every MS-13 gang member, and then we just went and released them back into El Salvador in 87, right after they had a civil war, which turned their country basically into a powder keg. And then I just got this article that said that actually Israel was the one that was actually supplying a majority of the weapons. Israel was the one that was training the Colombian cartels. Israel was the one who was dissolving bodies in sulfuric acid in Mexico, right? It's like everywhere you turn at the root cause of the evil. or somehow Israel has a role in it, AIPAC has a role in it. So the Bukele situation, it's difficult because, you know, It's hard to say when you're in a position in a country that that that's that corrupt and you

have nobody willing to help you You know trying to come to Biden and get help after 2020 would have been impossible I heard that he's had help from the Chinese Communist Party We heard that Trump sent in some Navy SEAL Team Six to protect him during his campaign. We've heard a bunch of different things What is actually true? I'm not sure but I can tell you the results are the results are he has taken the deadliest country in the world in Latin America and turned it into the safest country in Latin America in two and a half years. Every citizen you walk by, whether it's the girl that's making your burgers at Wendy's or taking your order at Pizza Hut, or it's the guy that's pumping your gas, he couldn't be more proud or she couldn't be more proud to provide whatever service. They're so happy to have a job. And going from where my assistant couldn't even get off the bus with her head, she couldn't even wear headphones on the bus because the cartels would see that as a sign of wealth. So she'd get on a bus, hands in her lap, heads down, no headphones, and sit there and just stare at the ground until her stop was up because she was so afraid to even make eye contact with anybody. Going from that to watching five-year-old or seven-year-old girls walk their fiveyear-old brother to school in a town that's as busy as like a Times Square. Adults, cars running around, and there's kids walking themselves to school. I got dropped off in the worst neighborhood. Bullet holes in a stucco, razor wire around the 12-foot cement walls at 11 o'clock because I got an Uber to the wrong area. And within like three seconds, I got scared when I got in the car left and I realized I was in the wrong spot. And I started to look around and go, dude, this is not a good neighborhood. You don't want to be here. And all of a sudden I hear kids. And then I hear footsteps. And it's a girl and a boy, 13 and 14, kicking a soccer ball down the street at like 11:30 at night. It once would have been unimaginable. So what he's done for that country has an 87% approval rating. And by the worst polls, in a 93% at the best, which is number one in the world, he's more loved by his people than any president that you'll ever meet. And you can see it. So their citizens are thriving. Their country is thriving. China just is building a port the size or helping them build a port the size of Singapore. They're going to be the Singapore of the West. China put a \$1. 1 billion water filtration system in their country. China sent their own citizens or soldiers to build his library. So, in the town where you couldn't even go, the murder rate was like 10 a day or something in this town. They now have a ginormous public library. It's all free with computers for their citizens. The kids are thriving. I mean, it's a true miracle. And it started when he cut off USAID. That was the first thing he did. Cut off USAID, got that money coming out into the corporations that were destroying his country. Then he built the mega prisons. He started arresting the cartels. Then he was able to, when the cartels retaliated, they killed 63 innocent people in a day. And that got him to force the vote on the left. I don't want a ticket by some robot camera right because you go into Australia and it's the worst man I've never felt something so eerie, I mean I'm watching the highest standard of living that I've ever seen in the world. Like their public transportation, I went to a 100, 000 person football, they like an actual rugby football game there, it's called Australian Football. 100, 000 people leave this stadium and within seven minutes, there wasn't a soul in sight, not a car, not a traffic jam, not a person waiting in line, nothing because the public transportation, the road system, six lanes everywhere. It's just, there's no traffic everywhere. There's public transportation everywhere. The cost of living wasn't too crazy. But he was the guy was telling me, oh, yeah, we got street cameras everywhere. And tells me if you live, if there's 10 different roads that you take to get to work in 10 minutes and you're running late, so you do five over on every road. It's a ticket on every single road all the way to get to work. It'd be like \$2,000 or \$3,000 just because you had to speed to get to work or you lose your job.

[00:19:18] So it's like, at what point do you draw the line? He goes, well, you know, 300 people died in Australia last year because of somebody who was doing more than five over. And I go, I don't care. Accidents happen. People die. It's life. Like, I don't want a ticket. So you get to a point where it's like, is this all a setup? Is B. Kelly going to be the first? 15-minute city and controlled by the IMF in Israel? Right. Or is he really this freedom-loving individual in which he paints himself out to be? Because if he is, he's going to be the example for the rest of the world. Right.

Fascist means like something I don't like. It means bully. You know, because like when you talk about, The Biden administration, if fascism is the cooperation of corporations in league in bed with the government, well, what did we see during Biden? We saw Google, YouTube, all of these big tech companies taking orders directly from the government to censor speech, which is against the First Amendment. So, like, isn't that fascism? But not really. It's communism, too, right? Like, the communists are just as anti-free speech. I guess

the difference would be, like, you— The ability to censor untrue speech would be a good thing, right? Like, you should not have the ability to tell lies that everyone knows are lies. You know what I mean?

Look at all these European countries with stupid forms of government that were totally functional when they were white, homogeneous societies. You really can pretty much do anything, and it'll work out.

[00:21:22] Very true. We need to signal to Mark at some point to get over here. Yeah, he was just over here a minute ago. Yeah, he was. He just went and sat down. But we're going to have, like, a rotating. We've got a fourth microphone, and so it's going to be fun.

[00:21:34] You know, the problem with our government is how corrupt it is and how obvious and how easy it could be to fix. Like, let's just so use, like, I specialize in child trafficking, right? Like, that's my number one thing. And you start digging into it and going, okay, America's the number one consumer of child porn. We're the number one consumer of all hard narcotics. Is that true? We're the number one consumer of child rape and we're the number one consumer of child ritual sacrifice in the world. America's the number one consumer of child porn. The FBI needed a \$450 million new FBI warehouse. And child porn is the lowest priority for the FBI. It is the lowest banded threat. So, banded threats, you have different categories in the FBI: Domestic terrorism, counterterrorism, domestic extremist. You have this category, this category. At the very bottom and banded means they have certain categories and each one of those categories has a certain amount of criteria. So at each Washington, Washington DC field office, the Florida field office, the Miami field office, each field office has a quota. And this is why you've seen them going after January Sixers and targeting January Sixers. But at specific periods of time, right, there would be like a sixmonth window where no January Sixers got arrested. And then all of a sudden, the last three months or right after that, that, that quarter ended, all of a sudden it was like; we had thousands of January Sixers getting arrested because the FBI had to hit that quota. That is why they divide it up domestic terrorism. That's why they didn't try January 6th as one case, because by dividing it up into all the field offices, each director of every field office now hits his quota. And what is his quota? Well, we hear it's between a five and six-figure annual bonus at the end of the year. So if you're the director of that FBI field office, the executive managers there are getting massive bonuses by hitting these quotas.

[00:23:08] So, child porn is the lowest priority because nobody wants to do it. It's one of the

only jobs in the FBI where, if they assign you, and say, 'Hey, you're going to work child pornography.' porn you can say no i'm not comfortable with it and they say can you have to take any other job but child porn so it's hard to get people to work at number one which is crazy why would you get in the fbi and want to not do the most rewarding job as a man you're put on this earth for one purpose and that's to protect women and children at the end of the day you have one mission in life and if you're not willing to do that and get paid handsomely to do it you're just soft like why are you even in the fbi but it's the lowest banded threat because nobody wants to take it on top of that once they take them a lot of times they can't get somebody to prosecute it which is absolutely insane. It's child porn. You catch somebody with it, they have it or they don't have it. And if they have it, how are you not putting this person in jail? Because when you talk about, there's three types of criminals. You have murderers, you have rapists. Pedophiles, rapists, same thing. Murderers, and you have arsonists, right? A murderer can go to prison for a long enough period of time. Specific serial killers, once they hit a certain age, they lose this incentive, this eagerness, this almost need to murder. They can be rehabilitated and introduced back into society. A serial arsonist, the guy that goes and burns down houses and literally jerks off outside the house and that's how he gets his rocks off, he can be rehabilitated with enough time in prison and get reintroduced back into society. A child rapist, a female rapist, a Child predator, a sexual predator, will repeat offend 100% of the time. And every doctor, every specialist out there will agree with me on this. And they tell you that is an absolute fact. It doesn't matter how old they are. Look at Joe Biden. Even in his dementia, brain-ridden, that's what a pedophile looks like. I bet you could analyze Joe Biden and go to nursing homes and solve unsolved pedophile cases just by letting AI watch how Joe Biden acts around people and then watch how the old people in the nursing home act. You're going to be like, 'oh, yeah, that dude.' Let's check his stuff. Oh, pedophile. That's how obvious and easy this could be. And I just want to just drive that fact home. Like the FBI, the lowest priority for our FBI, the Cash Patel, the Dan Bongino, they're going to come in and save America. We have 350,000 migrant children that just vanished, that our government took physical possession of. 452,121 migrant children ages 0 to 17 arrived at our southern border without a parent. Our government took physical custody of them. We then put them into this system while we vetted the adult. And the adult is some illegal immigrant who just invaded our country and decided to go on and fill out one of these FRA applications and apply to get a child. Or they called HHS and said, hey, I'm looking for Jamie. And they go, oh, what's Jamie's birthday? You go, oh, 10-10-20/21. Congratulations, Jamie so-and-so. Yeah, fill out this FRA application. They filled out this application. We vetted it. We took their IDs. We were supposed to do background checks. And we authorized the delivery of this child, the said adult. And now our government can't find 350,000 of them as of December 14, 2025.

[00:25:45] Were they incorporated into the foster care system?

Ryan Matta

[00:25:47] No, that's even another animal. So you have CPS. This is HHS, which is you wonder how this operation was running so efficiently and smoothly. It's because they

literally replicated what CPS did. So HHS and ORR, the Office of Refugee Resettlement, created these long-term care facilities for migrant children. They basically took what the prison industrial complex had created here, a way to profit off humans in cells, and they replicated it for these children, but it would never fly with American children, right? But it did with migrant children. And you've seen them converting facilities like Fort, not Fort Bragg, I forget what the one, Fort Worth, Dallas-Fort Worth. They had a giant child facility on one of the bases or whatever, on one of their bases that had 4,000 children. I went to a Walmart in Brownsville, Texas.

Rebecca Hargraves

[00:26:30] It was temporary. wasn't it?

Ryan Matta

[00:26:31] They're always temporary because then they're considered emergency influx shelters and then they get \$675 to \$775 per day per child. What? Versus like \$250 to \$400.

David J. Reilly

[00:26:41] Oh my gosh. So this is institutionalized child trafficking.

Ryan Matta

[00:26:45] It is at its core. It is a well-funded, full-scale military operation being carried out by every level of our government firing on all cylinders.

David J. Reilly

[00:26:53] And has anything changed with the new administration?

Ryan Matta

[00:26:58] So, yes, the thing that's changed is the system that was allowing the border to be wide open and the cartels trafficking the system. So when you talk about child trafficking, there's two really dangerous parts of the journey for the trafficker. The second most dangerous is bringing the merchandise across the border, meaning smuggling the child across the border. And the first most dangerous is delivering that merchandise to a buyer in America. Those are the two legs of the journey that our government took over for the cartels. Because what the cartel did is they would all they had to do was put a name, an address, and a phone number on a kid's shirt and they would literally safety pin it on a piece of paper. They would write on permanent marker on their arms. They would put it in a back pocket or in a backpack. And if you just Google on your audience can Google a cartel drops child over a border wall on YouTube and you'll see CCTV one after another, cartel literally bringing children being smuggled from 180 different nations into Mexico. And once they touch Mexico soil, they're not making it through Mexico. 100,000%, maybe less than 0.000001% of these children made it through Mexico without paying a cartel or being indebted to the cartel. So the cartel smuggles these children all the way through Mexico and they're just going to, what, hand their merchandise over to Border Patrol? By the hundreds of thousands? Hell no. Cartels won't even get you. You couldn't even get a ride on a boat if you were drowning in a river if you're not paying a cartel member and they had an extra seat in that boat. They don't care. These people murder, they traffic, they kill for a living. They have no emotional connection to a child that's suffering. So they all made it through. Why would a cartel just hand them over? Oh, they wouldn't, because they were branding them, they were labeling their merchandise, and they were handing it to Border Patrol because they knew that once the Border Patrol got that child, they had to do an initial intake, and they would go, 'Oh, do you have a sponsor?' Yeah, here. And they would put that information in the child's file as a sponsor. Now another government agency, being HHS, completely decompartmentalized, didn't see the child come across the border, didn't see the Border Patrol agent, didn't see that the child had that written on his arm in permanent marker, just opens up the kid's file unknowingly and goes, oh, he has a sponsor. My job as a reunification specialist is to reunify that child. So Susie at HHS or Karen at HHS goes, oh, yeah, back, oh, yeah. Oh, the number she calls, she goes, hey, Dave, are you expecting a child? You go, I am. What's his name? You go, oh, it's Ryan. Oh, what's his birthday? It's 10-10-21. Oh, congratulations, Dave, fill out this FRA application, which is like a half-assed job resume. And then you submit that job resume. And then after they, it's literally like you're filing a job resume. And then after they look at it and review it and they go, it's good, they go, oh, Dave, I need you to submit your ID. And you go, okay. And you pull out an ID like this, which is the New York ID. I bought off a Venezuelan gangbanger. It took me 15 minutes to go to New York City. And you can see my fingers behind it. Yeah, it's even got the hologram in it and everything. Wow. Yeah, barcode on the back. It won't scan. But I can go to a bar with it when they ask. I've been carded at bars and it worked. They look at it and they go, yeah, okay. That's incredible. 15 minutes to get that. So I could take this now and all I would have to do is communicate with the cartel and have them put John Smith and this address onto a shirt and then onto a kid's arm and then. I could go and apply. If that kid was in HHS, I would call up and say, hey, you got my kid? That's incredible. So that's how our government lost \$350,000.

David J. Reilly

[00:29:51] And you'd go, okay, if it was like— They just took over the delivery aspect of this.

Ryan Matta

[00:29:56] The most dangerous legs of the journey for the cartel, our government took it over.

David J. Reilly

[00:29:59] That is fucked up. How much, like, are they getting paid? Is it because there's just cartel members infested in our government agencies? How did this happen?

Ryan Matta

[00:30:11] Do we know? It gets deep and it gets dark to where you get into like OMI and IOM. What is that? These are non-governmental organizations, like the UNICEF, UNHCR. These are the migrant helpers or whatever you want to call them, migrant NGOs. These are the NGOs that were in the middle of, like, right at a border crossing point. And they were basically giving out water, giving out shelter, helping the migrants that lost documents get

new documents, communicate with governments. They created a loan program, which I'm just now starting to dig into, where it was migrants were getting 0% interest loans and penalty-free loans. So it's basically like if you wanted to migrate and you were stuck in Africa and it was going to cost you \$20,000 to get to America, you could basically go to this organization. You go online, you apply, and once you get accepted, you show up at this airport or at the closest OMI or a partner NGO, and they would give you cash currency so you could pay off the cartels on your way here. That's what I think I'm working on. working on right now. I know the loan program was there. Nobody's been able to explain how it works. They gave over 125,000 individual loans in 2023. And I think it totaled between \$7 and \$15 billion, which if you just did that, actually, okay, nobody skimmed any off the top that all went to the migrants. You're talking about a loan for between \$120,000 and \$56,000. And then even if I was 25% of that, you're still talking about a \$25,000 loan. So that's where I think. The average loan I bet you went out for was probably \$25,000, if I had to take a guess. Our government was literally paying migrants so that they could get trafficked here. And then you have organizations that help these caravans. So it's one thing to tell five migrants no. It's one thing to tell 100 no. It's very hard to tell 15,000 to stop, unless you're going to shoot. And they're not coming to your country. They're coming to America. So are you really going to create this humanitarian crisis and start firing on unarmed refugees that are claiming asylum? Because they're not going to stay in your country, they're going to go to America. But what's crazy right now is with the Trump administration, what they've done, and you asked about that, is they stopped this. Because of their ability to close this border, and because RFK has now taken over HHS, and RFK, everything I'm telling your audience, you can just Google, RFK said it in a Trump cabinet meeting last week, that HHS was literally the conduit for running the world's largest child trafficking ring through HHS and ORR. Trump's closed the border. So now he's also re-implemented DNA testing. That was one of the things that the Biden administration to carry out, and just keep these kids moving. The DNA was slowing up the process because we were flagging and catching so many people that were claiming to be their adult, claiming to be their brother, their cousin, and have no blood relation to them, which then would kick them down to like another tier. So you had three different tiers, category one, category two, category three. Category one was if you were a parent or I think a grandparent. And that means that the person that was applying to get the child, I only had to do a background check on that person. Not everybody at their address, even CPS. Like if you wanted to adopt a child and you live with your brother, your cousin, your son, or somebody lived there, every single person in that home has to have a background check before CPS can approve the delivery of a child to your house. With these migrant children, if it was a Category One, they weren't. And our government was literally using like, you know, those family tree things you made in first grade where you're like, 'grandma,' Poland, you know, like they were doing that with birth certificates, trying to figure out. And they were taking this when I when I applied with this ID at i use the bartend so you go into a bar, you try to buy a drink, the bartender has a phone book of every ID that was made from every state for like the last 20 years, they can go oh New York ID made 20-22, legit. Our HHS case managers having access to I don't know, interpol the FBI the DOI could easily just scan this barcode with the barcode scanner right? They didn't; they were taking this on Google and going, 'New York ID issued 2022. What is it, Google? Tell me, New York.' And they were holding it up to a computer and trying to go. And this is a picture that I sent them on WhatsApp, by the way. I didn't have to. Yeah, the migrants were taking photos and sending a photo of their ID laying down and sending it via WhatsApp to them. And they were taking their phone and holding it up to Google and going, 'oh, that's a good ID.' Then they were taking the address from here, and they were using Google Earth, and they were taking a little spinny wheel on Google Earth to determine if that looked like a safe environment to deliver a child to.

[00:34:16] That's it. That's how, so we got eight; the whistleblower came forward and got with like 8,000 addresses, right? Like this was early on in this. And the first like hundred they went through, they found that there was men that put the address of a strip club. Our government vetted that four children were technically delivered.

Ryan Matta

[00:34:32] To a man that had an address living as a strip club.

Rebecca Hargraves

[00:34:34] That is unbelievable.

Ryan Matta

[00:34:35] It gets worse. My buddy Carlos was; he was the whistleblower that came forward on this. He was able to get, after being a whistleblower, there were so many of these new NGOs that were moving these children that were opening up. They sending them like applications to apply. And he's like, dude, I think I can get a job back there. He takes a job, gets a job back, goes undercover. After a month, was able to get the lead on where they were going to be delivering children to. So their job was to pick up a kid in Texas and take him to California, drop one off in California, one off in Oklahoma, maybe two off in Arkansas. And then the last one, he would drop off in Virginia or wherever, right? Never would we have a coordinated schedule in advance because I think they did it on purpose. But every once in a while, if they're moving a lot of kids, they would know in advance. So like the last day he gives a call, like, hey, can you meet me in New York? In, I don't know, 24 hours. And I'm like, no, I can't. Our buddy Muckrakers could. Muckrakers met him, was able to get into these situations four different times. Three out of the four houses that he followed, a person that was actually taking the child back to the house, they had a man living at that house that currently had or had pending charges for aggravated sexual assault. So our government was authorizing the delivery to a random adult who either just invaded our country or had been in our country for over the last three years that came in, had charges for aggravated sexual assault or had pending aggravated sexual assault charges. It sounds so crazy, and I have put out three documentaries on this now with all of the receipts.

And those are the first two ones. And then my website is operationamberalert. com. We put those behind a paywall, but they didn't have the impact that we thought they were going to have, right? They didn't reach the audience. And that's when I was like, okay, like I watched the reaction that Sound of Freedom got. It was the, you know, human trafficking, child trafficking, the topic at every dinner table across America for, you know, a week until it fizzled out. And that's what I was hoping our films were going to do. So I put them out for free, which has allowed me to make so many a lot cheaper because I'm just light on my feet. I'm just running and gunning. I've been doing the child trafficking for so long, I could talk on it for hours.

I want to see this happening in states across the country with, like, you know, something that normal people can go to and meet other normal people as opposed to, like, having to avoid the city to avoid the freaks. Because that's what it has ultimately turned into. It's just, like, freak central whenever these pride events go on. It's just, you know, it's not a nice place to be. You don't want to take your kids out. It's like, I remember when we had the pride thing up in Coeur d'Alene, like, two, three weeks ago. You know, my daughter was like, let's go to the beach.

And this was in 1918, I believe, was the first year of a sex change surgery that took place and it wasn't just that they were like kidnapping little kids and doing unspeakable things with them.

Again, I'm putting you on the spot. This is not planned or staged or anything. But there was an event in 1955, October 1955, showing it on the screen. The Boise homosexuality scandal refers to a sweeping investigation of a homosexual underground in Boise, Idaho that started in 1955, beginning with the arrest of three men. It eventually led to the investigation of over 1,500 people involved. 16 men faced charges and 15 of them were sentenced to terms ranging from probation to life in prison. Good Lord. It led to a moral panic. There were headlines from the once-based Idaho Statesman calling for this homosexual underground to be stamped out. Front-page headline news. And now here we are. So what were the charges?

[00:56:19] Oh, yeah. Yeah, sodomy, trafficking, solicitation of minors, all kinds of stuff. I mean, the print's a little too small for me to read. I tried, there is a book by John Garassi called The Boys of Boise.

And he was around here in 1955 at the time that this homosexuality scandal was taking off. And he kept very close ties with the community here in Boise. He's buried right over in the cemetery on the other side of the river.

[00:58:09] Chef's kiss in a city. I do. I like my cities like 10% Mormon. That's not bad. That's not bad.

I got an ad on Twitter this morning that was like touting their new app. The Mormons have a new app that you can download on your phone that'll track your whereabouts.
