You don't necessarily fit a label. You want to deal with reality and you want to help others to do so no matter how painful it may be for all of us. I heard you speak a little bit about your previous belief system. I also started off as a libertarian than a constitutional conservative. Now I don't know what I am, but could you talk a little bit about your political genesis and what specific events led you to being a Black Pilt? |
| 0:01:30 | DEVON: You know, it was just, I think it was just a series of events that were kind of tied to the Trump election and the events that happened afterwards. I worked in politics or in news for, for several years. And so I'd been watching news because I worked in broadcast and worked for news stations and stuff like that. So I'd been following news for a long time. And politically, you know, as you said, I was libertarian. In fact, I used to make libertarian materials, if you will, media for billionaires that were funding it. And I saw nothing wrong with that. I was like, oh, you know, why would I get mad at someone who is very successful in the free market? And it never occurred to me like, why are they trying so hard to keep this, keep this libertarian thing going? And I remember thinking, the only time, see, I'll tell you what though, even while I was doing that, I still disagreed with them privately when it came to immigration and stuff like that. Because I'd lived in states like New Mexico. And, you know, I knew what that looked like upfront, you know, up close and personal. And a lot of these guys were, you know, instead of limousine liberals, they were limousine libertarians. And they had never, they had never been exposed to, you know, just let alone a blue collar neighborhood, let alone a diverse blue collar neighborhood. And so I get into these big debates with some of these guys privately. And then I remember they were shelling tons of money into a program that was, it was Hispanic outreach. Because just like the Republicans who decided rather than try to fight immigration, they were going to just, you know, we're going to assimilate these new Americans, you know, they're natural conservatives. And so they were |

putting millions and millions of dollars, they found like this, this handsome young Hispanic guy that would go around and he spoke Spanish. And I forget his name, but he was like, we'd go to towns in Texas and try to, you know, red pill the the immigrants on libertarianism. And I knew from the start, like this is doomed, you know, this is never going to work. But I didn't quite have the whole, I was still, I guess, a little hopeful, like I still thought like, oh, it's still, it's a cultural thing, right? Like, so there's still, there's still some hope, maybe it'll just take a few generations, you know, some Cubans seem to get it now. And then after a while, it just became apparent that honestly, you know, for all his faults, you know, stuff them all knew with the data that he was presenting on a regular basis, I was like, Oh, God, it's, it's, it's what I always feared it was, it's what I always didn't want to believe. And, you know, once you see that there is a biological element to it, that that that was, that was a big black pill, I guess you could say. But then also just, you know, that was just in terms of like the bigger picture, but understanding how much money played a role in this and the established, you know, ruling class, like we're talking like, you know, generational power, not just wealth. And so when Trump came along, I was like, Yeah, you know, this guy, he's gonna, you know, he's gonna shake things up, they seem genuinely afraid of him. And I mean that, like, I had to go to this, I was still tired of these libertarians during the election. And they were flying me out to DC for like this think tank thing. And I was, I got off the plane in Dulles, and I was walking through the airport. And there were people, I mean, I was overhearing people all over the airport, like ringing their hands like, Oh, Trump, like terrified. And I was like, Oh, this is great. I hate these fucking people. I hate all these, you know, political consultants and like all these, you know, contractors and stuff that I used to, I used to live in DC. And I fucking hated those people. And I was like, All right, well, if these people who I hate more than anyone, you know, in the whole world, if they hate him, he's got to be kind of good. And so I remember still sitting in this roundtable meeting with these libertarians. And we were going around, they were basically just trying to brain rape us. Like they picked a bunch of talent that they'd worked with. And they were having us, I don't know, kind of like getting pigs in a weird way. And so one of the questions they were asking us, well, you know, what do you think about the election? And me and out of like the whole room, I was the only guy that said, No, Trump's going to win. And everyone else was was like, I mean, it was kind of like that everyone's seen that clip of Ann Kulture on Bill Marshall and they all laugh. It was basically like a less mean version of that. And I, I saw had I'd seen one of his rallies on YouTube in the hotel the night before that meeting, just watching it. And I knew just there was he had he had the I saw the crowd's reaction to him. And it was like, I've, I've been watching politics my whole life. I've never seen anything like this, except for maybe Obama, you know, but in terms of the right, I've never seen people get excited like this at a rally. And he's, you know, he's sharp. He's funny. This guy's going to win. Like there's no way. And, and then so, you know, everyone knows, obviously he won. And then immediately, the big a big black pill was, and a lot of people think this is insignificant, but it was super telling was that by law, because they kept delaying it, the documents tied to the JFK assassination had to be released. Only a couple

of months after Trump was sworn in, like by law, they had to be released. Like if you didn't, if Trump did nothing, they would just get released into the public, because the I think Bush or someone had kicked the can down the road that far into the future to where they figured it would, you know, or maybe they could kick it down, you know, some more, which is essentially what happened. And Trump, you know, like I said, if he had done nothing, they would just get released. He had a meeting with some people from the intelligence community. And he blocked some key documents. And that not only did he do that, he then went to Twitter, told everyone he just solved JFK and saved the day. And I was like, okay, so this guy's full of shit then. Yeah, because this guy is hiding. Yeah, if he if he can't tell the truth about what happened 50, 60 years ago, he's not going to, you know, reveal, do a big reveal about what's going on right now in the deep state. And then it was just, you know, downhill from there.

So I think it's important that no matter the course of their political transformation, that the ultimate conclusion that people must come to is that we can't use the system to change the system. And this is why you're so great, why legal man is so great. Government is our enemy. And we have nearly as little in common with these so-called based right-leaning conservatives, you know, the Bruce Jenner. This is so ridiculous. As we do with people like AOC and Jeremy Nadler, what can we do once we come to the conclusion that even founding principles, unpopular opinion, will not save us?

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DEVON: Well, you know, in terms of like, I think there's going to be some, it's inevitable that this comes to a head, right? Or it doesn't. Like, that's the problem is there's two options. One, either enough people get fed up or something happens where, you know, for example, I think CRP was saying, not, well, actually, it's been a while now that as they disenfranchise us and attack us more and more, like right now it's like, oh, you can't fly on planes, use banks or whatever. But eventually, it's going to be, oh, you can't be alive, right? And there might come a point where they are kicking down doors or, or, you know, maybe the kinds of, you know, overweight, low IQ military guys that are occupying DC are asked to fire upon someone in the same way that they shot Ashley Babbitt, only in maybe a larger number, because apparently, murdering one person on a video is not enough to

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REBECCA: get the right mad. And so nobody gives a shit. Nobody even knows who this guy is.

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DEVON: Right. Yeah. And no one's, no one's trying to find out. And so it's like, that's, that's, that's why I think there's the other option where it just gets really shitty and slowly shitty and, and turns into Brazil. And maybe we just become some second rate super power, where, you know, that's, that's basically being led by another larger, more competent country, like, say, China, while we just sit there and, and our government essentially does what, you know, North Korea does where they tell their people, oh, no, we're great. We're the best, you know, like, don't, don't watch TV. You don't believe that's all those are all lies from the capitalists. Like, I honestly think that if, if, you know, we get knocked off the number one spot, they'll just, you know, they'll just run propaganda and we can see how, you know, smart the normies are. So they'll just laugh at them like, oh yeah, America number one. And things will just get shitty or the economy will get worse. It'll just be crap. And so it's like, either scenario though, it's, you don't want to live in the cities. And you don't want to live off of the system that's collapsing, because either it's going to collapse really epically in a way that you're going to get hit by falling debris, or it's going to just become a decrepit and awful to live in. So my, my suggestion to people is, is look, try to, and plus, we've all seen, you can't, we apparently have not even a national elections don't even matter at this point, right? So it's like, you know, why, why try to play that game when you can at least, you can play the local politics game and have at least better results. I mean, there's always going to be, you know, fraud and dirty tricks and

whatever, but you don't have the same control over that that you do someone, you know, a place where you can actually go to their office, you know, you live a few blocks away from the government office or, you know, however far away, but you can actually just drive up, knock on the door of someone and say, look, you know, you're, you this, this thing you're considering this legislation, you're considering that's going to directly affect me and I and bring your friends with you, you know, you can, you can intimidate local politicians a lot easier than you can intimidate, you know, people on the national level, because apparently we're not intimidating. And that's the bottom line. We don't scare them, you know, like despite what they say on Twitter, they're not, they don't seem that afraid of us. So I think that if you're going to get involved, get involved at the local level. And the other thing too is just everyone's talking about like, oh, I want to live in these communities like the 1950s, you know, with the, you know, the, the, the Tread wife and all this other stuff, it's like, okay, well, those communities don't exist. So you can make one, but no one else is going to make one for you. So that's the other side of it is like, you know, yeah, maybe you have to be the one that sucks it up and sacrifices so your kid can live in that community. Right? You know, like, like my ancestors had to go, you know, whatever they had to get go through it, when they crossed the ocean to come to America, you know, and, and literally in some cases walk across what are now states and, you know, build cabins out of trees they chopped down. And like there was no awesome community there when they did that. And that's, but that's what builds communities like that. And so there's still enough open space in America and enough opportunity to do that. And yeah, you could say, well, they're just going to come after you anyway. And like everyone always says like, oh, it'll be like, wait, go if you do that. And it's like, you know, or so what, you know, it's like, so you do nothing. So that's, that's what I recommend people. And then obviously you pay attention to what's going on because it does affect you. And I don't get mad at people that do want to try to participate on the local or on the national level and try to make sure that, you know, there that are our desires are at least talked about on the national stage as much as you possibly can get them talked about with all the censorship censorship going on. But for me, it's just it's more productive to worry about your immediate family and to focus on even just creating a family. So that's, yeah, that's definitely true. Do you think that Balkanization

Well, I mean, look, so the two ways they could go after you right is they could try to pass legislation that makes it damn near impossible to live where you're living, you know, like the Agenda 21 type stuff, right, where they make it so you can't use well water anymore, or you can, you know, whatever, right, like and try to regulate you out of your community. Or at the national level, like at the federal level, right, because if you if you take care of your local community, you don't have to worry about that stuff. Or they can use force. And so I would, like I said,

you prepare for those two things, you prepare for, you know, you make sure you get involved with the local government, your local community, so that you know that they're not some Rothschild funded dipshit that moves into town isn't the one that's getting elected to, you know, as mayor or whatever, you know, rubber stamping all this globalist garbage. But then you also prepare for the possibility of force, you know, and I think that's a responsible thing to do. And I think more and more people are realizing that that's that the Second Amendment doesn't exist in case someone wants to steal your the car out of your garage, you know, and so that's that's, you know, those are things that you can't, I mean, you can't prevent, but it's things that you can prepare for. And so I just recommend people do that.

Gosh, I mean, like we were talking about earlier, I think about what my ancestors that came here in 1607, what they had to go through. And I'm still on the internet like, oh, people don't like me. And it actually

hurts my feelings. I'm like, all right, okay, I got to get it together. And I feel like I'm more courageous than most Americans. So you made this video about an experiment where the subject was told to identify a line out of three lines that's equal in length to a control line. And when the other subjects in the group who were actually experimenters, right, yeah, they deliberately answered the question incorrectly. Many of the subjects gave an answer that they knew was incorrect in order to conform. Or because they didn't trust their own perception, they didn't trust what they could see in front of their phases. But interestingly, when one person gave the correct answer, one of the other experimenters, then the subject was they would build their confidence and they would be like, no, no, like this is the correct answer. So do you think that this can be extrapolated to society as a whole? Because I'm growing increasingly unforgiving of those that refuse to speak obvious truths for fear of social or financial repercussions. I'm like, all right, like we're in the 11th hour here. And you're like, oh, my job and I've got a blah, blah, blah. It's like, we have to be talking about this openly at our jobs, right?

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DEVON: Well, it's there's a number of things going on here. Like not only is it just, oh, my job, it's like you can't even ask them to not give Netflix money, you know, or to not, you know, pay for their stuff on Amazon and stuff like that. But I think what's going on is one, you have just humans are evolved. You can't have, we wouldn't have made it very far if everyone had the temperament and the desires of a leader, right? Like there's a lot of people have to be followers. And all so you're naturally going to be wired to want to follow who you perceive as having the most strength, the most power. And so that that's another thing I think that's that's going on. But then you also just have a lot like the society now is so comfort driven. Everyone's so comfort driven that the very little amount, it's not that much like the small amount of discomfort that's required. I mean, aside from obviously, if you're if you're really tied to the wage slave system, where you're like really in debt, and you're living paycheck to paycheck and a lot of Americans are. And, you know, you view, you know, getting fired from your job is like a threat to your survival. You know, so that's going to be that's going to be a huge ask to say, Hey, do this thing that might get you to you're fired from your job when you and that you could ultimately become homeless if you go down that path and especially if you have a family or something like that. And so I think that you got all those things going on and and then just the one of the biggest things is you have just a dysgenic effect going on in the populations. It's not and it's not just demographic. You have IQs among white populations going down to and, you know, you can argue about as to what that why that is, but then that's just a fact. So you just have people getting dumber and lazier and, you know, too afraid to get fired from their job. I mean, to I mean, everyone's like so many people are in debt, like especially if they go to college, they start out in debt and then they get alone for their house, they get alone for their car or worse yet, they lease a car or something like that. And so they're always tied to payments and they don't have any kind of savings and they don't have any kind of wealth power. You know, they don't have any kind of I mean, they couldn't make it. Look at look at all these stimulus checks that are going out. And people are getting

addicted to that money now to to the extent where that could become like a permanent thing to make them even more dependent on the system because this this totally works for the ruling class, obviously, like to have you have you dependent on the system. The last thing you're going to want to do is to do something that's going to fight this the thing that keeps you alive, you know, you're not going to bite the hand that feeds. And so I think that's that's what's going on. And so that's another reason why it's so important to get people to become self sufficient because then you have that that fear is lifted from you, you know, you don't have because not everyone has the balls to just say, All right, whatever, I'll get fired. I'm competent. Or not even has the competency like a lot of people. I mean, there I if I get before I started doing what I'm doing now or even now, like if I needed to get a new job tomorrow, a I wouldn't I wouldn't be like a lot of these people that are too good. I'd go work at like a dish, I'd do a dish washing job or you know, whatever shitty job that I could get. Right. And a lot of people aren't willing to do that. But the other side of it is I'm competent enough to wear that I wouldn't have to do something like that, right. And there's just a lot of people that they're just not competent people or flexible people, they're not nimble, right. And so I think that that's that's part of it too. So I think promoting people, you know, getting them to have skills to have confidence and to peel away any kind of tentacles that the globalists have on them is a good thing to focus on because you'll never you're never going to get get to people as long as they they're reliant on the system just for basic survival. I mean, you're fighting basic instincts at that point.

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REBECCA: Maybe I'm just projecting my own competence on stupid people because I think that if you just quit your job, wouldn't you be like, All right, well, I'm going to find a job that better suits my lifestyle. I'm going to try to think outside of the box, I'm going to reduce my debt. Or if I were like a college age student, I'd be like, Why would I why would I go to college right now? I'm just going to become a welder or something, not me, but if I were a dude. So so I don't know, I just you're a kinder soul than I am. I just lack sympathy for people in this end civilization that are like, Oh, I'm going to go get my MBA. It's like, What are you doing? Are you doing, you know, do a job that people need right now? It's not going to help you when we're like stripping Walmart for from it, you know, copper from a Walmart in 10 years or whatever we're doing. You know, it's nobody's going to give a shit that you have your MBA. Like we need to be thinking bigger. So I don't know, you're probably right, though. That's a scary thing to do if you have kids, especially to be like, All right, I'm just going to just quit my job. But outside of inspiring people by destroying our own lives by saying whatever we want on the internet, is there anything that can be done to rouse their courage? Or is it just

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DEVON: part of the American or Western spirit that's dead? Well, you got to remember too, a lot of the reason. See, look, you and I, we both have ancestors that that went that took that leap and came across before there was an America, right? They weren't going to America because of the fancy shopping malls, you know, like they were coming to America, because it was this big, scary place. But like the, you know, you had a chance, you know, to do something with it, like you

could go out there and, you know, maybe wipe out some Indians and have some land, you know. Like that that was, you know, that was the that's what you could do. And a lot of people, you got to remember a lot of the people, a lot of white people that live in America today, that's not their background. You know, a lot of their families came here when there was, you know, everything was established, you know, like a lot of families like, say Ben Shapiro's family, you know, they came here well after everything was established, you know, and so a lot of these people came around the turn of the century. After, you know, there was already industry, there was always you could already be comfortable. And a lot of times they came with money, you know, they came here. And so they don't have like, I think what unfortunately, a lot of founding stock Americans, we project, speaking of, you know, talking about projecting qualities on people, we project this, you know, this, what we feel is, oh, this is the American way of this is the American spirit, the pioneering spirit. Yeah, right. It's really not. It's just it's the founding stock spirit. It's the people that came here. And because there was a think about there, that was a selection event, right? Like you're right, you had a very, very eugenic thing happen because you got a very specific kind of, you know, risk taking competency level, you know, high level, I just saw in the live chat,

And he was getting really pissed off. And he, I knew that he knew, but he wouldn't say it. And, and then he, it's because he was a big enough cattle rancher to where he relied on illegal immigrant labor. And he was paying and he was a very, he was super libertarian. And, you know, he was like, based like the base boomer libertarian, right? And, but then I, I, you know, talked about his, his background, he'd only been here two generations, you know, his, his family had come here from, like, I think it was like Denmark or something

like that. And with money already, and they bought up a ranch and, you know, the way they go. So it was like, totally different background. And I just, for whatever, until he mentioned that, I thought, oh, you must have, you know, you must have lived in the, in the, the old West a long time, you know, and because you're a cattle rancher and you're, you know, nope. So it's, I think that that has a big, big, or that's a big part of it. And, and I also think that, you know, it's greed, like in his case, it's greed, you know, he didn't want to have to feel, you know, and shame, like he's been paying illegal immigrants for however long, next to nothing, and not hiring people, you know, his people to do the jobs that he had available, so that he can make a few extra bucks. And so I think that that's just part of it. And so they're willing to let the, the ship, you know, I think that some libertarians, they're just having to face reality a little more these days just because of how bad it's gotten. But I mean, that's, that's a lot of money went into brainwashing the, the conservative right into being libertarian right, you know, for the last 20, 30 years. I mean, that's because it was like that you can have your cake and eat it too, kind of a thing for the ruling class. It's like, okay, well, we can have this free market stuff, but you also have to be accepting of trans and gay and all this other stuff because, you know, whatever, what people do in the privacy, you know, it's freedom, the Americans, you know, we like freedom, you know. So it's, it's, it's a big thing to overcome too, just the fact that there's, there is an education problem with some of this stuff too, you know, like, I think that, that, and they know that, you know, that's why they banned everyone off of YouTube and all these in Twitter and stuff like that. And they try to get rid of these conversations because if allowed to compete with their arguments, our arguments always win. And so they, they have to shut it down.

And a lot of these guys, I mean, look, the, not, not everyone's audience is huge and a lot of them are inflated, right? So like the people that, you know, like, like the Ben Shapiro is the world who, who get funding from billionaires to steer people away from, you know, more radical ideas. You know, I think a lot of their numbers are inflated, but they're, they're, if you add them all up and you add, you know, the Jordan Peterson's of the world and stuff like that, they, they, they're, or Joe Rogan, you

know, they're reaching way more people than, than we, now if we were, now this would all change if we were allowed to be like, if there weren't algorithmic obstacles and there weren't a tribe of people that didn't like us and used all of their influence and, and reach to shut us up. If, you know, you didn't have that kind of stuff going on, then who knows, right? But we do have all that stuff going on and it's effective. If it wasn't effective, they wouldn't do it. And so it's kind of like, well, we'll reach some people and we can work with what we got, but there's never going to be like this. And so I think that when we see stuff like this, it's, it's getting to people that, that really enjoy engaging in these past times and, and the escapism of it because they're like, the one thing that I had, had left that I could escape into is now, you know, fully political. So maybe it would just take that, but I think you're probably right, it's going to take some kind of catastrophic, catastrophic event. I mean, I, I can't even watch, yeah, yeah, I did want to talk a little bit about your, your movie reviews because it's been some of your most influential content for me. Your video on American American beauty was fantastic. It was one of your finest videos. And every time I watched one of your reviews, I realized that even now, I don't pick up on all the propaganda that's being spewed at me, which makes me really disappointed in myself. Some stuff really does still get in there. So aside

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from just being discerning about the nature of the content we consume, what can we do to recognize propaganda that's just around us, not necessarily only in **DEVON:** film? Well, I think the first thing you got to realize is everyone, everyone, whether it's nefarious or not, everyone who makes art has an agenda. And in fact, art without an agenda is kind of boring, you know, and so there has to be like anything you're watching, it has an agenda. And so it's all you have to do is look at who's making this stuff or who's funding it or whatever to realize who's going to be setting that agenda. Now, again, it's not always going to be something nefarious or bad, but there's always going to be an agenda there. Even positive art or positive propaganda has a positive agenda, but it's still there, right? And a perfect example, I did that other video about John Wayne funded that movie or that video series, Warning Young Boys, about the dangerous homosexuals and stuff like that. And so it was, you make like any kind of film or music or even, I wouldn't say like paintings to a lesser degree, you have something, you have something you're trying to make the audience feel. And so as someone who, you know, that's kind of the field that I was in, I studied that a lot and I watched lots of movies sometimes repeatedly until I just studied them very closely. Because as someone that was writing my own scripts and things like that, I wanted to understand like, okay, well, how is this done? And it got to the level now, I can't, it's hard for me to get lost in a movie because I'm so, you know, I'm just, I'm always just looking at it like, oh, even if it's not like a bad thing where I'm being critical, it's just like, oh, that shot, I wonder how that was accomplished or you know, stuff like that. So it's hard for me to just, I can't just watch something and zone out. I mean, maybe everyone's well happens, but it's hard to do. But I would say just realize that anything you watch, that's what it's for. And especially if it's for mass consumption, like if you have anything that is, if it's on television, well, I mean, now it's, you know, I guess streaming services is more relevant. And so I think that just understanding that and you'll start to, you'll just start to see, and the other thing is too, I see a lot of people, they think that if they enjoy something, if they like it, if like they think the jokes are funny, then it can't possibly be bad, right. And I'm telling like, no, it couldn't possibly be good propaganda if you didn't like it, you know, like if you didn't like it, it would be like the most, it'd be the worst propaganda ever made because no one would be watching it. And I'm, that's the one thing I experienced the most in terms of people getting pissed off is I'll dissect one of their favorite movies or their favorite shows and they never have an argument, they just get, they just lash out emotionally because I'm attacking something that made them feel emotional because that's the whole point of propaganda, gets you to think

emotionally. And then, you know, so if it's something that you love and because of the emotions that you were feeling as you watched it, you know, you are going to lash out like, you know, like a teenager who gets mad when you criticize their favorite band or something like that. Right, right. So that's, I just think, you got to realize, what do they just think to yourself when you're watching something, what are they trying to not necessarily even think, what are they trying to make me feel? Because they're always trying to make you feel something. And that's a good starting point.

Do you do you consume any media?

Because before I, as much as I knew, I mean, I knew nothing was going to happen. I was kind of hoping that Trump would, even if he wasn't our guy, that maybe, maybe he would just, even if it was to satisfy his own ego, you know, would would would cross the Rubicon or do something that would maybe spark, because look, he has enough influence on normies and magaboomers to our, if anyone was going to get the party started, it would, it would be like he would, he had the ability to do it. And so I was kind of hoping that something would get squirrely and you know, whatever. But yeah, I knew I ultimately knew like nothing was going to happen. But I was kind of still hoping. And but now it's kind of like, well, you know, I have to pay attention because you have to see like it's like a thermometer, right?
