



The local and national press has articles almost weekly regarding athletes suffering from the long-term effects of having played football and other contact sports. Come hear a discussion of the legal and medical aspects of escalating concussion litigation against sports organiza-

tions. Included will be a discussion of





the cases against the National Football League, United States Soccer Federation, the National Hockey League, World Wrestling Entertainment, U.S. Water Polo Association, and many individual suits against sports organizations including schools, athletic conferences and high school activities associations. To place the litigation in context, the speech will include a quick overview of the historical treatment of concussions by sports leagues and conferences and the evolving recommendations from international concussion conferences regarding the treatment of head injuries. Sports organizations are changing how they handle dissemination of concussion information to the players. There is an ongoing debate concerning the proper approach of the care and treatment of concussions in both adults and youth individuals. Highlighted will be the conflicting recommendations concerning the long-term impact of repetitive concussions and subconcussive blows sustained by participants in sporting activities including football, soccer, hockey, and other sports.



A MOTHER'S RECKONING LIVING IN THE AFTERMATH OF TRAGEDY: PRESENTED BY SUE KLEBOLD.

On April 20, 1999, Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold walked into Columbine High School in Littleton, Colorado. Over the course of minutes, they would kill twelve students and a teacher and wound twenty-four others before taking their own lives. For the last sixteen years, Sue Klebold, Dylan's mother, has lived with the indescribable grief and shame of that day. How could her child, the promising young man she had loved and raised, be responsible for such horror? And how, as his mother, had she not known something was wrong? Were there subtle signs she had missed? What, if anything, could she have done differently?



These are questions that Klebold has grappled with every day since the Columbine tragedy. In A Mother's Reckoning, she chronicles with unflinching honesty her journey as a mother trying to come to terms with the incomprehensible. THE SPLENDOR OF ANCIENT CHINESE JADES: NEW ARCHAEOLOGICAL DISCOVERIES: PRESENTED BY TIANLONG JIAO.

Jade has been highly valued throughout Chinese history. Deeply connected with Chinese aesthetic taste and philosophy, the relevance of jade to Chinese culture has exceeded far beyond any other kinds of materials. When did this cultural tradition start in China? How did jade become such an important symbol in Chinese culture? Recent archaeological discoveries have

HOW THE 1859 GOLD RUSH PUT COLORADO ON THE MAP: PRESENTED BY WESLEY BROWN.

In the spring of 1858, Colorado's Front Range area was uncharted and inhabited only by natives. But by the close of 1859, 100,000 fortune seekers had thoroughly explored the Front Range, north of Pueblo to the Wyoming border. In their quest for gold, they left their footprints on the landscape, establishing dozens of settlements and blazing numerous

trails. This slide show and lecture will teach you about Colorado's gold rush and how this important chapter of histo-

ry influenced Colorado maps of today. Wesley Brown has been a collector, student, and author of old maps for forty years. He confines his map collecting to two areas (1) the earliest world maps up to the year 1540 and (2) the exploration and settlement of Colorado from the 16th through 20th centuries. A Denver resident, he co-founded the Rocky Mountain Map Society in 1990 and served as its President for its first seven years.



This evening's presentation takes as its point of Jenkins bio-pic he departure a comparison of three recent transformations of the Florence Foster Jenkins saga. Jenkins, a would-be opera diva of the 1920's-1940's, is usually remembered as a delusional, self-indulgent soprano of little-to-no musical ability, a source of arch, comic amusement among the cognoscenti of her day. In 2004-5, she was the subject of a well-received, twoperson, off-Broadway play, Souvenir, written by Stephen Temperly. Jenkins was also at the heart of Xavier Giannoli's 2015 feature-length film, Marguerite. Stephen Frears, Academy Award™winning director of The Crying Game, cast the irrepressible Meryl Streep in the title role of a

made in 2016. Frears' film is more than an updated, comic remake. Albeit sidesplittingly funny, as



it could not help but be, his is a more reverent treatment. Early on, Frears exposes Jenkins' struggle with syphilis, a malady that links her to the dark underbelly of the Romantic era. Jenkins was an extraordinarily generous patron of the musical arts. Despite her limitations as a performer, hers was a sacred quest; she sought self-transcendence.
