



Beth McCann was elected District Attorney of Denver in November 2016 and was sworn into office on January 10, 2017. She is the first female District Attorney in Denver's history. Immediately prior to becoming District Attorney, Beth was the four-term state representative for House District 8 in central and northeast Denver. McCann was a leader in criminal justice matters and health care re-

form throughout her legislative career. Beth McCann began her legal career as a law clerk for Colorado's U.S. District Court Judge Sherman G. Finesilver. She then served almost eight years as a deputy and then Chief Deputy District Attorney in Denver, prosecuting hundreds of cases, including child abuse and murders. Beth McCann is a founding member and former president of the Colorado Women's Bar Association, served as first Vice-President of the Denver Bar Association and was on the Board of Governors of the Colorado Bar Association. She also served on the Colorado Supreme Court/Court of Appeals Nominating Commission, and was a member of the Colorado Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice. She was chair of the Safety and Security Committee at Denver East High School and a coach of East's Constitutional Scholars team. McCann also served on Governor John Hickenlooper's transition team as a member of his public safety committee and on Denver Mayor Michael Hancock's search committee for a new chief of police.

We will learn about his fascinating journey from growing up in Seattle in the '90s where the primary mu-

sical topic of conversation were "grunge" groups like Nirvana and Pearl Jam—to his appointment as Music Director of a major symphony orchestra at the age of 37. Brett will also discuss the Colorado Symphony's unique business model and its day-to-day workings. Brett's approachable, informative, and entertaining presentation is one you do not want to miss. Hailed for presenting engaging, in-depth explorations of thoughtfully curated programs, Brett Mitchell has served as Music Director of the Colorado Symphony since July 2017. Prior to this appointment, he served as the orchestra's Music Director Designate during the 2016-17 Season. Mr. Mitchell is also in consistent demand as a quest conductor. He made his debut with the San Francisco Symphony in July 2019 and will be with the Los Angeles Philharmonic at the Hollywood Bowl in September 2019. Highlights of his 2018-19 season included subscription debuts with the Minnesota Orchestra and Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, and return appearances with the orchestras of Cleveland, Dallas, and Indianapolis. Other upcoming and recent guest engagements include the Detroit, Houston, Milwaukee, National, Oregon, and San Antonio symphonies, the Grant Park Festival Orchestra,

the Rochester Philharmonic, the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, and the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra. Mr. Mitchell also regularly collaborates with the world's leading soloists, including Yo-Yo Ma, Renée Fleming, Itzhak Perlman, Rudolf Buchbinder, Kirill Gerstein, James Ehnes, Augusn Hadelich, Leila Josefowicz and Alisa Weilerstein. In addition to his work with professional orchestras, Mr. Mitchell is also well known for his affinity for working with and mentoring young musicians aspiring to be professional orchestral players. His tenure as Music Director of the Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra from 2013 to 2017 was highly praised and included a four-city tour of China in June 2015, marking the orchestra's second international tour and its first to Asia. Mr. Mitchell is regularly invited to work with the highly talented musicians at the Cleveland Institute of Music and the orchestras at this country's high-level training programs, such as the National Repertory Orchestra, Texas Music Festival, Sarasota Music Festival, and Interlochen Center for the Arts.



AN EVENING WITH MONET AT THE DENVER ART MUSEUM

The Denver Art Museum will be home to the most comprehensive U.S. exhibition of Monet paintings in more than two decades. The exhibition will feature more than 120 paintings spanning Monet's entire career and will focus on the celebrated French impressionist artist's enduring relationship with nature and his response to the varied and distinct places in which he worked. Monet traveled more extensively than any other impressionist artist in search of new motifs. Monet's journeys to various places around the world included the rugged Normandy coast, the sunny Mediterranean, London, the Netherlands, and Norway, which inspired artworks that will be featured in the exhibit. The exhibition will uncover Monet's continuous dialogue with nature and its places through a thematic and chron-

ological arrangement, from the first examples of artworks still indebted to to the revolutionary com-

positions and series of his late years. The presentation of Claude Monet: The Truth of Nature will explore Monet's continuous interest in capturing the quickly changing atmospheres, the reflective qualities of water and the effects of light, aspects that increasingly led him to work on multiple canvases at once. Additionally, the exhibition will examine the critical shift in Monet's painting when he began to focus on series of the same subject, including artworks from his series of Haystacks, Poplars, Waterloo Bridge, and Waterlilies.

Unfortunately, scams that have been around for years are becoming more complex. Such con games leave too many victims, especially elders, depleted of their life savings and self-respect. Attendees will learn how to recognize behaviors associated with con artists, and simple but effective ways to protect themselves. All attendees receive a free Stand Up Against Fraud handbook full of helpful prevention tips and resources, as well as fraud alerts that are sent out electronically once a



month. Maro Casparian is the Director Community Outreach and Engagement for the Den-District Attorney's Office. She is responsible for establishing the Denver District Attorney's Of-



fice as a community partner for crime prevention through our Education Initiative. The initiative provides programing to middle and high schoolers as well as other organizations and associations. Earlier at the DA's office, Maro managed the elder abuse unit's community outreach, advocacy and the Denver Forensic Collaborative for At-Risk Adults, a program that brings together multidisciplinary partners working to better identify abuse of at-risk and/ or elder victims. Maro trains and speaks throughout Denver and nationally on topics including: Scams, Caregiver Neglect and Exploitation, Cybercrimes, Healthcare Fraud, Identity Theft, Aging and Ageism, the Mandatory Reporting Law surrounding crimes against At-Risk Adults.
