



THE MYTHIC CITY: ART DECO NEW YORK: PRESENTED BY, DONALD ALBRECHT.

The Empire State and Chrysler buildings, Rockefeller Center, Beekman Place, and the Queesboro Bridge—these are the sites that conjure up New York in its golden age, a mythic round-theclock city in which night was as charismatic as day. This is how Samuel. H. Gottscho, the preeminent architectural photographer of his genera-

tion, captured it in the 1930s. Rigorously editing out the Depression-weary city's more seamy aspects—its tenement slums, breadlines, and soup kitchens—Gottscho presented a dreamlike Gotham. Through his lens, skyscrapers became embodiments of forward-thinking urbanism. The sparkling plateglass windows of the city's fashionable businesses framed and reflected streetscapes of streamlined cars and stylish pedestrians. Rooms were bathed in natural light which passed through glass block facades and shimmered off walls of mirror and metal. Gottscho's gimlet eye dramatized Art Deco New York City, bringing it to sparkling life.




