Pastor's Portion

"Making Spirits Bright"

Do your eyes glaze over when I hear the kind of astronomical numbers I heard on CBS Mornings earlier today? If estimates are correct, American shoppers are projected to spend between \$1.01 trillion and \$1.02 trillion during the holiday season. This amounts to a 3.7% to 4.2% increase from last year, when holiday sales reached \$976 billion. Consumers seem to have mixed feelings about this holiday shopping season. In one survey, 77% of shoppers said they expected to pay more this holiday season for their purchases. Fifty-seven percent of responders to the survey expect the economy to weaken during the next six months. Yet on average, consumers will spend \$890 on gifts and seasonal items. Should these facts and figures about our national spending patterns at Christmas dampen our celebrations this December? By no means! There's nothing wrong with gift-giving, decorating our homes, or getting together with friends and family for holiday parties. But as God's people, we have long known the true meaning of Christmas: that God sent His Son to be conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. As true man and true God, Jesus "tabernacled" among us in the flesh, so that ultimately He might offer up His life on the cross in atonement for the sins of the whole world. He alone lives up to His name Jesus, for He alone can save us from our sins. He rose again on the third day, so that He might be with us always, for He is our Emmanuel, which means "God with us." This Advent season, we not only remember Jesus' first coming

This Advent season, we not only remember Jesus' first coming in humility and vulnerability. We also remember His presence now, wherever two or three are gathered in His name. We also look forward to Jesus' Second Coming in power and great glory, to take us home to our heavenly Father. "Salvation is nearer now than when we first believed" (Romans 13:11). Rather than fearing the end of the world, we are "looking for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be dissolved, being on fire, and the elements will melt with fervent heat...According to His promise, [we] look for new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells" (2 Peter 3:12-13). What a day that will be, for "we shall always be with the Lord" (1 Thessalonians 4:17).

Our country may be in the economic doldrums this Christmas but as fellow believers who know "the true reason for the season." Nothing can prevent our gathering in God's house and our full-throated singing of praise to God this holy season. There will be tears mixed in with those praises as I prepare to step down from both full-time and part-time service here at Christ Church. You all have been truly wonderful to Linda and me during our time together with you. Anything good that has come from our sharing in the Gospel ministry here is truly owing to the grace and mercy of God in Jesus Christ. As for the rest, I trust in Jesus' forgiveness and yours. Linda and I may not be with you as frequently as we have been, but we will continue to remember all of you in our prayers. And our daily petitions will be for God's blessings upon Pastor Kevin or whoever serves you in the pulpit; for God's blessings on the Church Council and Call Committee; and for God's blessings upon the next full-time pastor whom God will send to Christ Church. Nothing will change about our friendship with all of you.

Church Council Members and CLC Congregation Members: During the month of October, Call Committee members interviewed a pastoral candidate on October 18th. Though he enjoyed our conversation, he withdrew from our call process because of current Divine calling activities and family obligations. As a result, the Call Committee contacted our District Office and requested that additional names of pastoral candidates be added to our call list. Following our 70th anniversary celebration, the Committee received three nominations from congregational members. Each LCMS pastor was contacted but declined. Two pastors were previously associated with CLC. Vicor Doug Hudson served CLC during our last pastoral vacancy and was ordained in 2017 at a Florida church. Though now in an Emeritus status he was "humbled beyond measure" to be nominated but declined due to family and personal commitments. Pastor Andy Watkins, now the Rev. Dr. Andrew Watkins is committed to his current Divine callings in Iowa. He is revitalizing two churches which faced closing, is serving as a missionary to a black urban mission in Davenport, as well as teaching online courses for Concordia University - Nebraska. Due to the national shortage of pastoral candidates, Committee

members are also gathering information regarding the process for calling a seminarian student and will report to the congregation accordingly.


Cornhole

LWML National Grant #5 – 2025-2027 Biennium

Growing Together to Share Braille and Large Print - Lutheran Braille Workers, U.S. - \$100,000

Millions of people around the world are blind or visually impaired and are seeking to strengthen their Christian faith but find it difficult to access scripture-based reading materials. Lutheran Braille Workers (LBW) is committed to providing Christian materials in braille and specialized large print worldwide at no cost. With a part of the grant funds, LBW will establish five new Ministry Production Centers in the United States. LBW will hold five related servant events at LWML conventions, Lutheran universities and schools, and district youth gatherings. Service opportunities provide young people with the chance to grow in their God-given gifts and share the Gospel. This grant will allow LBW to produce and freely distribute approximately 10,000 additional volumes of Bibles and other Christian materials. This grant will be used to purchase specialized paper, card stock, braille plates and equipment, and for training and shipping costs.

<u>Chesapeake District LWML Grant #7 – 2024-2026 Biennium</u>
Life Changing Care for People in Dominican Republic Living with Intellectual & Developmental Disabilities - \$5,000

This grant will cover the cost of clothing, medical needs, rehabilitation, education, and spiritual life programs for the residents of Good Shepherd Lutheran Group Home in the Dominican Republic.
