Pastor's Portion

²⁵ I lie in the dust;

revive me by your word.

²⁶ I told you my plans, and you answered.

Now teach me your decrees.

²⁷ Help me understand the meaning of your commandments,

and I will meditate on your wonderful deeds.

²⁸ I weep with sorrow;

encourage me by your word. ²⁹ Keep me from lying to myself;

give me the privilege of knowing your instructions.

30 I have chosen to be faithful;

I have determined to live by your regulations.

(Psalm 119:25-30 NLT)

Can you believe that Thanksgiving and Christmas are just around the corner? Shortly, we'll feel the pressure of the season to buy the best gifts, to travel at the busiest times, and to put on the fanciest shindigs. Is it any wonder that we get worn down...worn out...and depressed. Have you ever head the expression, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure"? Before the rush of the holiday season, we could all benefit from the preventive "medicine" of Psalm 119 to ward off the depression that often strikes at this time of year.

Cultivate an Attitude of Gratitude

The Psalmist writes: "I will meditate on your wonderful deeds" (v. 27). We can't slow down time, but we can ignore consumer pressures and celebrate Thanksgiving, no matter what the ads tell us.

For what can we be thankful? Besides all the material blessings we enjoy (everything included in the petition of the Lord's Prayer, "Give us this day our daily bread"), there are the spiritual blessings we have in Jesus, which we acknowledge every time we say the Apostles' Creed: "I believe in...the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting."

Sorrow Is Real...But the Promises of the Word Are True

The Psalmist doesn't sugar-coat reality. He freely admits "weep[ing] with sorrow (v. 28). Yet He doesn't give up on God, whose shoulders have proven broad enough to take his lament. At our lowest points in life, we are probably less inclined to read the word, when that is really what we need the most. "Encourage me by your word" (v. 28), pleads the Psalmist. We need promises such as 2 Corinthians 4:17: "For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all." Or again, Psalm 30:5: "For his anger lasts only a moment, but his favor lasts a lifetime; weeping may stay for the night, but rejoicing comes in the morning."

Avoid Self-Deception

Finally, the Psalmist knows all too well the power of self-deception. He prays to God: "Keep me from lying to myself" (v. 29). What are some of the lies we tell ourselves: "I'm so busy I don't have time to pray. I can go it alone in life. I don't need worship. There are so many demands on my life that I don't have time to exercise or take care of my body as well as my soul." You can't take care of anyone else if you don't take care of vourself.

I admit it: Sometimes I like to sit and stew, so to speak, in my own juices. I'd be much better off to "take it to the Lord in prayer" or to seek a session of private confession. If you need someone to listen so you can unburden yourself, my office door is open and my phone is seldom off.

November Newsletter Food Shelf Ministry Report

Psalms 145:9 "The Lord is good to all; he has compassion on all he has made."

In partnership with DHSS and Love In the Name of Christ, we were able to assist our neighbors with electric bills, emergency hotel stays while more permanent housing arrangements could be made, and with prescription medication expenses.

Two hundred forty-three (243) non perishable items, 3 cases of water and 2 blankets were delivered to Love INC's Cross Building. Luncheon meats, cheese and bread were also provided for the "Grab and Go" lunch ministry.

Two emergency food boxes were replenished with non perishable food items. These boxes are distributed at the discretion of Pastor Ray.

As the weather becomes colder, we plan to support Love INC's Code Purple efforts. This program runs from December 1 through March 15 and provides over-night accommodations for our homeless neighbors.


