VILLAGE HAPPENINGS

The Woodstock village has continued to show strong community spirit and steady progress since October 2025, with several local initiatives and events marking an active period for the village.

Community fundraising and social connection were boosted through catering activities at the “Hermes” clearing sale, which attracted locals and visitors and contributed to ongoing village projects. These events reinforced the importance of volunteer effort and local enterprises in supporting Woodstock’s future.

The community also farewelled long term rural residents Sandy Morrison, former President of the Progress Association, and his wife Judi Smith, former Deputy Mayor of Cowra Shire Council and Council representative for the Woodstock community. We would like to acknowledge their leadership and long-standing contribution to the Woodstock & District Progress Association. Their dedication has helped shape many of the village’s recent improvements.

A new storyboard installation at the Woodstock Community Post Office has added to the village’s sense of place, highlighting local history and stories. A small gathering was held on the 6th January to unveil the completed storyboard. HELLO DAISY COFFEE CART FINDING A HOME IN WOODSTOCK

Hello and greetings from Hello Daisy Coffee Cart.

We'd like to share a little about our journey—how two people from different backgrounds and different parts of the world found their way to Australia, and eventually to Woodstock, which we're now proud to call home.

Despite growing up worlds apart, Dylan and I have always shared similar views on life. We were both searching for a sense of community—somewhere we felt connected, supported, and part of something bigger. Many of our conversations over the years revolved around slowing down, living closer to nature, and becoming part of a small community. We feel incredibly lucky to have found all of that in Woodstock.

Our ideas of community were shaped early in life. Dylan grew up in a small town in Montana, USA, where everyone knew everyone and neighbours felt like extended family. I grew up in Suva, Fiji—a city, but one deeply rooted in family, friendships, and togetherness. Although our upbringings were different, the values were much the same.

After spending 10 years living in Bathurst, we started to feel worn down by the 9-to-5, sedentary lifestyle. We began asking ourselves how we wanted the rest of our lives to look. When COVID hit, it really brought things into focus—we didn't want to spend our days stuck behind a desk, feeling disconnected from our time, our work, and each other.

So in 2025, we took a leap of faith. We sold our home and moved to Woodstock. Stepping away from the “normal” life plan isn't always encouraged, but we had a clear goal: to be financially stable while living a meaningful life—one that allowed us to do work we enjoy, contribute to our community, and spend more time with our cats.

Dylan enjoys farm work and initially planned to focus on that. I, on the other hand, had always been interested in becoming a barista. Of course, I wasn't going to do it alone, so I convinced Dylan to take a short barista course with me. To our surprise, we both really enjoyed it.

Since moving here, Dylan has also started volunteering at the Bowling Club and now works as the barman once or twice a week. I've helped out a few times as well, cooking Indian meals for the bowling club. These small acts of involvement have been such a lovely way to meet people and experience the strong sense of community we were hoping to find.

Noticing that Woodstock didn't have a dedicated coffee spot—and knowing how much Australians love their coffee—we felt that opening a coffee cart could be a great way to give something back. We chose a coffee trailer because it was easier to set up and gain approvals, and it also gives us the flexibility to attend nearby shows and events if needed. But more than anything, the coffee cart was about creating a welcoming space to socialise, share good coffee and hot chocolates, and bring people together.

We took our idea to Meg and Adam at the post

office, who—as many of you know—are incredibly welcoming and supportive. With their help, we set up the Hello Daisy Coffee Cart in front of the post office. Katie Green from the pub has been sending guests our way for morning coffees and has shared some great ideas for the future, and the Bowling Club has been advertising the coffee cart as well, and to those that have shared our presence through social media platforms we are extremely grateful.

The support from local businesses and the wider community has been overwhelming in the best possible way. We're so grateful for the encouragement, the conversations, and the word of mouth—truly the best kind of advertising.

People have shared how much they appreciate being able to get barista coffee locally, and for us simply “having a go” at bringing something new to town. For us, the greatest joy has been meeting everyone, swapping stories, and slowly building connections. It hasn't taken long at all for Woodstock to start feeling like home.



REFLECTING ON A BUSY FIRE SEASON AND PREPARING FOR THE NEXT

It is summer and it has been a particularly busy fire season across our district. Local fire brigades and rural volunteers responded to several fires over the past few months, often under challenging conditions of high temperatures, dry vegetation, and strong winds.

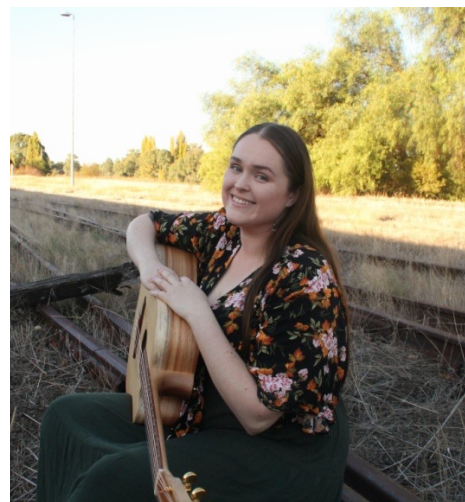
These incidents placed significant demands on our volunteer fire fighters, who gave countless hours protecting lives, homes, stock, and property. Their commitment, professionalism, and willingness to respond at all hours is something our whole community can be proud of. Thanks also go to supporting agencies and neighbours who assisted during emergencies.

Unfortunately, many of the fires attended this season were made worse by heavy fuel loads around homes, sheds, fence lines, and paddocks. Long grass, unmanaged scrub, wood piles, and accumulated rubbish can all allow fires to spread quickly and become far more dangerous than they need to be.

With this season still fresh in mind, now is the perfect time to prepare for next summer. Residents are strongly encouraged to clean up house blocks and rural properties well before the warmer months return. Simple actions such as clearing long grass, trimming trees away from buildings, removing debris, maintaining fire breaks, and safely storing flammable materials can significantly reduce fire risk.

Preparing early not only helps protect your own property, but also supports our local brigades by reducing the intensity and spread of fires when they do occur. Fire safety is a shared responsibility, and small efforts made now can make a big difference later.

Let's use the lessons from this busy season to be better prepared for the next. By working together and reducing fire hazards around our homes, on vacant blocks and across our district, we can help keep our community safer and support the volunteers who work so hard to protect it.

2026 ANZAC DAY SERVICE

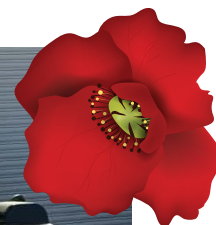
The Woodstock village will host its annual ANZAC Day March on Saturday, 25th April, a community event honouring the courage, sacrifice and service of Australia's and New Zealand's servicemen and women. ANZAC Day marks the anniversary of the landing of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZAC) at Gallipoli in 1915, a pivotal moment in both nations' histories and a cornerstone of national commemoration.

The march will begin at the top of Parkes St at approximately 2.30pm, gathering residents, veterans, current defence personnel, families and community groups to walk together through the village streets. Included in the march will be Michael Hunt with his newly acquired army artefact.

Participants and spectators are encouraged to wear poppies and, where appropriate, medals or service insignia, as a sign of respect and remembrance. The event typically follows Parkes and Rankin Streets stopping at the Sister Jenny Kerr Park for wreath laying and culminates at the local Woodstock Soldiers Memorial Hall, where a short service including speeches, wreath-laying

and moments of silence take place. Afternoon tea will follow and all are welcome and encouraged to attend.

The Woodstock Village ANZAC Day March is an opportunity for the local community to come together to remember the past while showing gratitude to present-day service members. Whether you join the march, observe from the roadside, or attend the memorial service, the day is a poignant reminder of the enduring bonds of service and community.



GRANT SUCCESS SUPPORTS RESTORATION OF WWI HONOUR ROLL

The Woodstock community is pleased to announce the success of a recent grant application to support the restoration of the World War I Honour Roll at the Woodstock Soldiers Memorial Hall.

The Honour Roll is an important part of the hall and a lasting tribute to local men and women who served during the First World War. Over time, age and wear have taken their toll, making restoration necessary to preserve this significant piece of local history for future generations.

Thanks to the successful grant essential conservation work can now proceed. The project will focus on carefully restoring the Honour Roll to its original condition; ensuring names, details, and craftsmanship are respectfully preserved. The restoration will be carried out with attention to

historical accuracy and heritage values. The restoration will be undertaken by specialists O'Sullivan Conservation of Sydney.

This funding represents a meaningful investment in remembering and honouring the service and sacrifice of those listed on the Honour Roll. It also reinforces the importance of the Woodstock Soldiers Memorial Hall as a central place of remembrance and community connection.

The community extends its sincere thanks to all those involved in preparing and supporting the grant application, as well as the funding body for recognising the significance of this project. Once completed, the restored Honour Roll will continue to stand as a proud reminder of Woodstock's history and the enduring legacy of its service personnel.

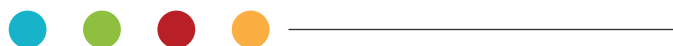
THE CATHOLIC CHURCH BELL OF WOODSTOCK

The Roman Catholic Church bell, has a history that reflects the movement, and resilience of the local Roman Catholic community over more than a century. The earliest known reference to the bell appears in the Cowra Free Press dated 26th July 1906, which included descriptive text. At that time, the bell was erected at the Roman Catholic Church in Carrington St (pictured), the original site of the Catholic Church, where it served as an important symbol of faith and community life.

Church bells played a central role in rural towns, calling parishioners to Mass, marking celebrations, and tolling during times of mourning. The article suggesting that prior to the bells installation it was necessary to look at your watch or ask someone the time to know when mass was to commence.

Between 1917 and 1918, the bell was recorded as being erected at Drumbane, for renewed use during this period. As settlement patterns and parish needs changed, the bell continued to move with the community it served. In 1956, the bell was relocated closer to the new church, ensuring it remained a functional and audible part of parish life. This relocation reflected both growth and change within the Catholic Church in the region, as older structures gave way to newer facilities better suited to the needs of parishioners.

After many decades, the bell was once again returned close to one of its original locations on the 29 December 2025, restoring a tangible link to the town's Catholic heritage.
