SUSTAINABLE TOURISM

Summer is right around the corner in Cambria. The days are becoming a little longer, the weather a little warmer, the poppies and lupine are in full bloom, and people from all over the country flock to Highway 1 as part of their summer getaway. Perhaps observing this pilgrimage inspires you to take a trip of your own this season.

And if you do find yourself bit by the travel bug, we urge you to ensure your good memories aren't at the expense of the natural resources and local community you are visiting. Whether it be a day trip to McWay falls up the coast or a two week sojourn to Southeast Asia, it is important to practice sustainable tourism when possible.

Sustainable tourism is often referred to as "ecotourism', 'nature-based tourism' or even 'cultural tourism', but they all are based on the same principles. The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) defines sustainable tourism as "tourism that respects both local people and the traveler, cultural heritage and the environment."

At home, we are often familiar with our natural resources and are motivated to protect them. It's hard not to roll your eyes when tourists get too close to the elephant seals, blindly ignoring the posted signs. However, when we travel, sometimes we too are blind to the effect of our actions. And they aren't always obvious.

For example, elephant rides in Thailand are widely advertised and hundreds, if not thousands, of tourists partake every year. However, illegal capture and animal abuse is rampant throughout the industry. However, there are many ethical elephant sanctuaries throughout the country where tourists can instead feed, bathe, and play with rescued elephants. It's about making the concerted effort to do your research before you travel. Research travel agencies and brush up on local customs before you book your flights. If you find yourself hiking in Yosemite, don't throw your banana peel just off trail when no one is looking. Pack out what you pack in. Little efforts like these make a huge difference in the long run.

WIN A GALAPAGOS ADVENTURE

Lindblad Expeditions, Greenspace will auction an amazing Galapagos adventure for two aboard the National Geographic Endeavor II which carries just 96 guests. Retail Value is \$13,920. The Galapagos Islands straddle the equator 600 miles west of South America. They are the original UNESCO World Heritage locale and are known for their vast number of endemic species, including marine iguanas, giant tortoises, flightless cormorants, and a variety of finches.

Charles Darwin's observations there on his second voyage on HMS Beagle contributed to the inception of his theory of evolution by means of natural selection. Lindblad Expeditions is the gold standard for adventure travel and began offering expeditions in Galapagos 50 years ago. Because of their intimate size its ships are able to get up close to wildlife with kayaks and Zodiac landing craft. The atmosphere on board is casual and down to earth, with an emphasis on comfort and practicality. The expeditions are led by Lindblad's renowned team of naturalists; Lindblad-National Geographic certified photo instructors and an undersea specialist, whose knowledge and passion for the islands will amplify the once-in-alifetime experience. Your 10 day/9 night expedition begins and ends in Guayaquil, Ecuador, which is

accessible from the U.S. by major airlines. A popular extension of the Galapagos experience is to Machu Picchu and Cuzco, Peru for an additional cost. Trips are offered throughout the year and are subject to availability.

Travel can be booked only within 60 days of travel. A category 1 cabin is offered for this adventure, but the winner can upgrade based on availability. Airfare between Guayaquil and the U.S. is not included. Airfare between Guayaquil and Galapagos is separately charged by Lindblad.
