Introduction

Although his path to art was not linear—he was a forestry technician and even considered the priesthood—the reencounter with a famous painting at age 20 was the catalyst that awakened the dormant artist within him. From that moment, brushes became an extension of his being, a medium to capture that innate capacity to be a "code reader," to print what he perceives both inside and outside of himself. This epiphany, experienced with the force of a fortuitous "accident," underscores that true vocation often finds its way in the least expected moments, demanding passionate dedication.

Authenticity in the 21st century

What truly distinguishes Edgar Mendoza internationally is his unwavering commitment to authenticity. In a 21st century where ephemeral trends often dictate the artistic landscape, Mendoza remains firm in his creative nature. For him, being an artist means creating regardless of whether he is considered anachronistic or contemporary, and maintaining a broad criterion without disqualifying other forms of expression. This artistic maturity is a reflection of his own personal evolution. As he progresses in life, he finds his greatest inspiration in the lessons and experiences that modify his existential concept, recognizing an inexhaustible source of creativity in his own qualities and defects.

The challenge of the creative process

Mendoza's creative process is as challenging as it is gratifying. The gallery: an "artistic boxing trainer"

In his view, a gallery should be like an "artistic boxing trainer," building the artist's trajectory hand-in-hand, helping him forge his true identity and resolving obstacles with empathy. This perspective highlights the importance of a deep and committed collaboration between the artist and those who represent him, such as Héctor Díaz and his gallery, which has been key in projecting his "universal realism." It is this type of alliance that allows an artist like Mendoza to stand out in a globalized market, where the intrinsic quality of the work meets a smart dissemination strategy.

Legacy and the value of art

Edgar Mendoza's philosophy on art and its value is deeply reflective. He considers that art goes beyond its monetary value, its transcendence being confirmed over time, once the artist is gone. For him, art is the most important and transcendent human expression, a sophisticated language that defines us as a species and serves to record our existence and thought. Edgar Mendoza is not just a painter; he is a thinker, a visual narrator whose work reminds us of the inherent beauty in the world and the complexity of the human condition. His art is a testament to the perseverance, vision, and passion that characterize true masters. With every brushstroke, this Mexican artist not only captures reality but invites us to feel it, to see it with new eyes, and to recognize the profound resonance hidden in "Actual Realism." His impact, both on the canvas and in the spirit of those who contemplate his work, secures his place not only as a pillar of contemporary Mexican realism but as an inspiring figure on the international art scene.

Lector de códigos

La esencia del arte de Edgar Mendoza radica en su capacidad de transformar la realidad observable en universos oníricos y poéticos. Colaboración especial

Desde su infancia, Edgar mostró una predisposición especial a observar el mundo de una manera diferente, a menudo reclusándose en sus "rincones" para procesar lo que veía y sentía. Aunque su camino hacia el arte no fue lineal —pasó por ser técnico forestal e incluso consideró el sacerdocio—, el reencuentro con una pintura famosa a sus 20 años fue el catalizador que despertó al artista dormido en su interior. Desde ese momento, los pinceles se convirtieron en una extensión de su ser, un medio para plasmar esa innata capacidad de ser

un "lector de códigos", de imprimir lo que percibe tanto dentro como fuera de sí. Esta epifanía, vivida con la fuerza de un "accidente" fortuito, subraya que la verdadera vocación a menudo encuentra su camino en los momentos menos esperados, exigiendo una dedicación apasionada.

Lo que verdaderamente distingue a Edgar Mendoza en el ámbito internacional es su compromiso inquebrantable con la autenticidad. En un siglo XXI donde las tendencias efímeras a menudo dictan el panorama artístico, Mendoza se mantiene firme en su naturaleza creativa. Para él, ser artista significa crear sin importar si es considerado anacrónico o contemporáneo, y mantener un criterio amplio sin descalificar otras formas de expresión. Esta madurez artística es un reflejo de su propia evolución personal. A medida que avanza en la vida, encuentra su mayor inspiración en las lecciones y experiencias que modifican su concepto existencial, reconociendo en sus propias cualidades y defectos una fuente inagotable de creatividad.

Realismo actual

La filosofía de Edgar Mendoza sobre el arte y su valor es profundamente reflexiva. Considera que el arte va más allá de su valor monetario, confirmando su trascendencia en el tiempo, una vez que el artista ya no está. Para él, el arte es la expresión humana más importante y trascendente, un lenguaje sofisticado que nos define como especie y que sirve para dejar constancia de nuestra existencia y pensamiento. Sin él, el registro de lo que hemos sido, somos y seremos estaría "inconcluso, vacío". Esta visión otorga a su propio trabajo un propósito más allá de la estética: el de contribuir a ese registro impercedero de la experiencia humana.

Su humildad es tan notable como su talento. Cuando se le pregunta por su legado, Edgar cree que solo lo que decidan las generaciones futuras, aquello con lo que se sientan

identificadas, será lo que sobreviva y se considere su verdadera huella. No obstante, su contribución ya es palpable, especialmente para las almas jóvenes que sueñan con este oficio, a quienes puede inspirar con su historia de dedicación y superación, incluso en entornos poco propicios.

Edgar Mendoza no es solo un pintor; es un pensador, un narrador visual cuya obra nos recuerda la belleza inherente en el mundo y la complejidad de la condición humana. Su arte es un testimonio de la perseverancia, la visión y la pasión que caracterizan a los verdaderos maestros.

Mónica Nepote recibe el Premio Xavier Villaurrutia

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La escritora Mónica Nepote recibió el martes el Premio Xavier Villaurrutia de Escritores para Escritores 2024, que entregan la Secretaría de Cultura del Gobierno de México y el Instituto Nacional de Bellas Artes y Literatura (INBAL), a través de la Coordinación Nacional de Literatura.

La autora, originaria de Guadalajara, Jalisco, recibió el galardón por su obra *Las trabajadoras*, "un libro que parte de la poesía y recupera el lenguaje de la costura y la mecanografía para reivindicar el trabajo de las mujeres", dijo el INBAL en un comunicado.

Al conferirle el premio en la Sala Manuel M. Ponce del Palacio de Bellas Artes, la directora general del INBAL, Alejandra de la Paz, expresó: "Con este premio destacamos y promovemos la producción literaria publicada en nuestro país al reconocer a una obra con criterios de calidad, originalidad y fuerza".

Reconoció además a *Las trabajadoras* por hacer "uso de un lenguaje poético para plantear cuestionamientos y reflexiones en torno a los grandes problemas que existen en la realidad y tiene efecto en la vida de millones de mujeres".

Agregó que el libro "tiene una sólida propuesta literaria que aporta una voz crítica, sensible y audaz frente a un tema de mucha importancia social".
