



Do I have to mask?

Masks are Emergency Use. You cannot legally be required to wear a mask.

US Code: 21 U.S. Code § 360bbb 3; 21 USC Part 50.23, 50.24; 29 CFR § 1630.14

Masks as part of COVID spread reduction have not been shown to work

COVID is airborne and too small for masks

Covid airborne particles are typically 0.25 – 10 µm (microns) in size, potential spread by just virus (0.125 microns)

N95 masks filter only 95% of 0.1 to 0.3 micron particles, letting infectious particles pass through
