



REPORT SUMMARY

In the month of March, the UK has offered to teach the Uzbek Parliament members about youth rights protection to help the country further improve its legal system. A “Human Rights House” was established in Uzbekistan. And, the global boycott of Uzbek cotton was finally ended by the Cotton Campaign, signalling a significant improvement in Uzbekistan’s human rights laws. However, in the 2022 World Happiness Report Uzbekistan was ranked 11 lines lower than last year.

For improving the local labour market, the government of Uzbekistan has decided to assist the young generation in making the study-work transition smoother. Government organizations were tasked to open vacancies for the youth and, subsequently, hire them.

In terms of sustainability, Uzbekistan has set plans to stop the use of non-renewable types of energy by 2050 and is trying new collaborative approaches and tools to tackle environmental issues.

In addition, Uzbek tourism is becoming more convenient and accessible to a wider range of people thanks to the opening of the Support Centre for Disabled Entrepreneurs. And, due to the inflow of Russians an Action Plan was signed with Russia to promote tourism in Uzbekistan.

Measures being taken to boost student employment in the Uzbek labour market

Under the chairmanship of the President of Uzbekistan, government officials were instructed to assist students and graduates in finding a job. It was revealed that out of 510,000 students 100,000 have a desire to work. And, currently, the labour market has 105,000 vacancies available for them.

During a videoconference the President of Uzbekistan gave a number of tasks to local authorities:

- For ministries and agencies to work with universities related to their industries and organize regular employment competitions
- Involve students in research projects funded by state grants in 2022
- For khokims to cooperate with the private sector and universities and regularly hold job fairs

Uzbekistan drops by 11 lines in the ranking of happy countries

The 2022 World Happiness Report, which is published by the United Nations Division of Sustainable Development Solutions, has dropped Uzbekistan rank to 53rd out of 146 countries. Among other Central Asian countries, Uzbekistan came in 2nd with Kazakhstan in the lead at rank 40. For comparison, in 2021 Uzbekistan was in the lead with a rank of 42.

Unemployment rate in Uzbekistan amounts to almost 10%

As of the beginning of 2022 the unemployment rate in Uzbekistan amounted to 9.6%. This is 0.9% less compared to the same period in 2021. The total size of Uzbekistan's labor resource for 2022 grew to 19 million people. As of January, most of the employed citizens were in the official sector and 4.3 million people were economically inactive, which is 0.5% less than last year.

HEALTHCARE

Imported medical equipment to be exempted from VAT and customs duties until 2025

The President of Uzbekistan has announced “medical equipment, items, tools and materials imported by medical organizations” to be VAT free from the 1st of April 2022 to the 1st of January 2025. It was added that private clinics will be free from paying “tourism fees” for medical tourists and charged less for attracting foreign medical professionals.

Uzbekistan plans to stop the use of non-renewable types of energy by 2050

Natural gas, coal and oil are planned to be fully replaced with renewable energy sources. The government expects for 30% of its energy to be renewable by 2030. However, hydrocarbon neutrality by 2050 will be hard to achieve as many industries are highly dependent on traditional energy sources. This is coupled with the energy demand growth rate of 11-12% per annum.

As a catalyst for the renewable energy transition, individuals and businesses are being rewarded for switching to and using solar energy.

On the right bank of the Tupalang River in Surkhandarya, citizens from a nearby makhalla discovered 512, and later 620 copper coins and a chess board dating back to the Mirzo Ulugbek era. The artefacts were handed to the Agency for Cultural Heritage and the State Museum of Arts of Uzbekistan. According to the preliminary conclusions of archaeologists, these treasures are the largest and best preserved artefacts from the XV century.
