Ready for Sunshine and/or Rain!


The grandstand at the Manitoba Agricultural Museum has been a project, in various forms, for nearly 30 years. After the main structure and seats were replaced, the dream always was to have a roof overhead to keep the sun from beating down on the heads of the visitors during the hottest week of the year, Threshermen's Reunion! A new roof always seemed to be beyond our reach, but news came that the Portage Ex grandstand was to be demolished.

Hmmmm, is there any chance we could "recycle" the roof to the Ag Museum and will it fit? Yes, to both questions! The task of consulting with the construction company, creating the budget, funding the move, completing engineering studies, securing permits, etc. was well under way within weeks of getting approval from the Portage Industrial Exhibition Association to continue. Letters went out to all possible contributors and in less than a year the move and the dream has become a reality.

Grants and donations along with fundraising events are the major source of funding for Manitoba Agricultural Museum to continue. It is such a great feeling to know that one does not have to look too far away for possible help. The Manitoba Agricultural Museum is very thankful to be able to work with the North Norfolk-MacGregor Foundation that is so locally focused on our area. Present and former residents have supplied the seed for the Foundation and to see the dollars returned to local projects and watch it grow in so many ways is wonderful.

The North Northfolk-MacGregor Foundation grandstand roof grant to the Museum, in the form of \$10,000, was the largest to date. Other grants over the past six years have been for building restoration, new building construction and the Museum playground. The annual sponsorship for the people movers is another form of the Foundation's support.

On behalf of the Manitoba Agricultural Museum, thanks to the members of the Foundation Board for their continued support of the activities and projects in the North Norfolk region of our province.




Austin Hall Near Completion

This has been an exciting year for the Austin Hall Building Committee. After four years of planning and fundraising with the help of a lot of people, shovels were finally put in the ground.

The foundation was poured and the building was erected. Electrical and plumbing pipes were laid and then covered with the concrete floor! Hydro, gas and water and sewer were brought into the building.

The inside of the building is taking shape as most of the walls have been framed up. The design/building committee is now investigating the lighting component of the interior design. With lumens and candlepower, it is a real learning experience. The community received a pleasant surprise this year when in May, they were advised that the hall building project had been included in the Building Canada stimulus funding. MP Candice Hoeppner was in Austin on May 19th for a tour of the hall and to present the area residents with a giant cheque for \$216,000.

Fundraising is still ongoing for the new kitchen with a high-tech dishwasher and a walk-in cooler, exterior signage, landscaping and completion of the parking lot once the old hall is gone.




Long Awaited Addition at Austin Cemetery

The Austin Cemetery Committee has been in the process of wanting to display the names and location of the interments in the Cemetery. The Committee approached the North Norfolk-MacGregor Foundation for help in erecting an information display board.

Granted with financial help from the North Norfolk-MacGregor Foundation and the design and construction help from the RM of North Norfolk shop staff, the Committee was able to complete this long awaited info board. Thank you to all.

The info sign is located by the Austin Cemetery cenotaph. Watch for the burial lists and map next spring. The Committee is still looking for more information on unmarked and other possible graves. Requests for more information will be posted on the board.



Austin Pre-School Connections

The Austin Pre-School Connections is a group that was formed in 2001. The goal over the past few years is to bring pre-school programming and activities into our local community. A variety of successful programs have been well attended by community members from all over the R.M. of North Norfolk. Below you will find a list of programs that are being held in Austin and a brief description of each. Funding for these programs in received from both the Healthy Child Coalition and Pine Creek School Division. An additional \$2,000 was presented by the NNM Foundation at the annual celebration.

Shake Rattle and Roll

This is a parent/child physical activity program encouraging early movement and co-ordination using song and a variety of equipment such as beanbags, balls, etc. This program is for children ages 2-4 years old. The 6-8 week session is run twice a year and is held in the gym at Austin Elementary School on Monday evenings.

Kit and Kaboodle

Kit and Kaboodle is a family literacy and language program. Each session includes a circle time for rhymes and songs, a sound game, a group story and parent/child book sharing time. This is a 6-8 week session that runs twice a year for Pre-School children ages 18 months to 5 years, and their parents. This program is held at the Austin Community Centre.

Book Bags

Presently 90 theme bags are available for loan. Each bag contains books and activities based on themes. These bags are housed in the library at Austin Elementary School and can be borrowed at any time. Books and activities are suitable for children 0-7.


DVD Lending Library

Pre-School Literacy/Numeracy Sessions

The Pre-School Literacy/Numeracy Sessions are parent-child oriented and are set up as center activities. Parent and child rotate through a variety of literacy/numeracy centers based on particular theme for that day. These sessions in October run once a month and are located in the Kindergarten classroom in Austin Elementary School. All children attending the sessions leave with a story book and activities to use at home. Pre-registration is required for these Literacy/Numeracy sessions. New Library Shelving Thanks to Foundation Grants!



A Clear View


In late 2008, a group of community-minded volunteers and suppliers came together and gave MacGregor's H&H Trailers Normac Centre a significant facelift. Seamless viewing glass was installed in the interior seating area on the south side of the skating rink to allow for a clear and unobstructed view of the ice surface. Dubbed the "Clearview" project by the 2008 Grade 5-M class of the MacGregor Elementary School, the task was undertaken in September 2008 and was completed within 3 weeks. The community truly embraced this venture, and many volunteers, sponsors and donors all pitched in. With the help of the Foundation and private fundraising, enough was raised to not only purchase and install glass on the skating rink side of Normac Centre, but also to purchase the glass for the curling rink side as well. Currently, there is some trim work to complete on the skating rink side, and the curling rink installation is yet to be done.


On December 28, 2008, the volunteers and sponsors of

this project were recognized at the Grand Opening of the Clearview project. The names of the Clearview donors are displayed within the Centre as a way to acknowledge their support to this worthwhile endeavour, and to leave a legacy for years to come.

The skating rink was divided into curling sheets, and the newly installed seamless glass gave the hundreds of curling fans in attendance an excellent way to witness the action of this milestone event.

It is heartwarming and remarkable to witness how the community rallied around this project and made it happen in relatively short order. The organizers of this project want all who were involved in this to know that their work is truly appreciated, and to be proud to be a part of such a supportive and active community.

Youth in Philanthropy - June Report

MacGregor Collegiate Institute students has the opportunity to participate in the Youth In Philanthropy program for a second year, thanks to the continued support of the Thomas Sill Foundation and the North Norfolk-MacGregor Foundation. Our committee continues to be comprised of a small group of students, some from last year's committee and some new numbers along with teacher advisors Heather Martens-Rempel, Elly-Finch Chambers and Heather Howarth.

Students began the year by identifying their values and forming a statement of those values. The statement of values was made from the viewpoint of the entire committee. 

The committee consisting of eleven members had to reach a decision by consensus. There were twelve worthy groups interviewed and we wished we had more money to give. After an afternoon of respectful debate the decision was made. YIP members were pleased to award \$500 to Healthy Mondays, \$500 to Youth For Christ, \$500 to MacGregor

Soccer Club, \$250 to Henderson House, \$250 to Healthy Communities, \$250 to the Library and \$250 to the Kinettes. We presented the money to each organization at the year end supper meeting with the Foundation Board.

This was a very rewarding process and we thank you for the opportunity to participate in this worthwhile project once again.







Annual Celebration of "One Community"

The theme of the evening was "Building" and the thirty-six in attendance were reminded about how the Foundation works on building one community. 



Access for All

The generous donation of Henderson House and the adjoining property provided MacGregor with the opportunity to preserve a piece of our heritage, and recognizes the contributions of those who went before. Henderson House is a meeting place where people can gather. It is a comfortable, friendly place where people can sit and visit in an unhurried atmosphere. It is the home that many older residents had to leave behind. It is the home that many younger folks never experienced. It is a place for social interaction. It is a place to offer cultural events and a place to display and encourage local talents. Although the house is a special place for seniors, it is also of interest to the younger generation. They have come to help and to enjoy socializing with the older people. Henderson House has become a favourite summer Saturday destination.

By the fall of 2008, it had become evident that the house needed wheelchair accessibility. Of the more than 200 visitors who enjoyed the house and the activities within, some, unfortunately had to remain outside in the garden because the steps were a barrier. Hence, plans were begun to install a ramp and provide a wheelchair accessible washroom. A quote from a government grant application "Accessible Community and recreation facilities are as much a part of our infrastructure as bridges and roads."

In the broad meaning of recreation, Henderson House is

a recreation facility for seniors. It is important to the many who enjoy participating in events held there. Government funding to a maximum of \$5000 representing one third of the project's cost for the first stage was secured. The town of MacGregor, the Lions' Club, the Foundation, YIP, Communities in Bloom and individuals provided more financial help. The pork producers of Manitoba headed by Hutterian communities partnered in fundraising with our pork barbecue. The garage sale was a success. This funding combined with generous donations from the Saturday events has made the project a reality. Although some fundraising is still needed, Henderson House is wheelchair accessible. The ramp has been used by people in wheelchairs and those using walkers. How good is that!

This summer more than 300 people visited and enjoyed the cultural displays and the hospitality. Displays and events included antiques, paintings, photography, Ugandian art, carving, scrolling, and a Scottish celebration. Accessibility made it possible for many care home residents to enjoy Henderson House. A special day was held in their honor.

Eadie was ahead of her time in visualizing needs. She knew that to combat social isolation, seniors needed a "playground" where they could connect with people and do things together. She was ahead of her time, too, in knowing the importance of keeping active. What a legacy she left!



Not Only H1N1 is Contagious

Beautification is contagious. It is spreading through our community with the addition of parks and floral display and the planting of trees. Maintaining a town, village or hamlet that is visually appealing with well cared for parks, green spaces, floral displays and murals requires commitment from councils, from staff and from dozens of dedicated volunteers. It needs residents who are on board with improvement and upkeep of their yards and schools that get young people involved.
