## Family Man

In the February, 2007, issue of the *Germinator*, we published a short bio of Bill Slabe who passed away last



month. It was aptly titled 'Family Man' as his life centered totally around his wife and children. At the time, Bill and his wife, Patricia, had been married fiftyone years. They had three living children with one having passed away at a young age. He was a Korean War era vet and, after

working in the steel mills, was employed thirty-three years for Ohio Bell Telephone.

He and Patricia were heavily involved in the Wells Evangelical Lutheran Church in Girard where he did maintenance, and planted and tended the landscaping. They also enjoyed square dancing. Most of all, the family was infected with a wanderlust that took to all corners of the United States. They would hook up their camper and improvise their tours changing course as their mood dictated.

Bill was a dedicated member of the Mens Garden Club serving as our president, 1st and 2nd vice president and Membership Committee Chairman. He was also a longtime member of the Greenhouse and Horticulture Committees. He was awarded the Bronze Medal (now the Bill Carney Memorial Bronze Medal) in 2004.

#### Photo Historian

An organization's newsletter should do more than report its activities, give purpose-related advice and occasionally offer a chuckle or two. It should chronicle and save for posterity that entity's ongoing history. Given that standard, *Germinator* photographer Bob Stas

who passed away last month, went well above and beyond.

For starters, almost every photo appearing in our club's newsletter, *The Germinator*, over the past decade was taken by Bob. For every pic that made it to print, there were three or four that didn't. Bob



not only saved most of them but cataloged the members and occasion for future reference.

Despite chronic health problems, he not only did his job at almost every club function and project, but often put the camera down and pitched in. His photo collages


#### Art In The Garden

It isn't often that one of our members gives a presentation at our monthly membership meetings, and we were happy that Joe Fagnano volunteered. He is a biology major at YSU, our club's recording secretary, Spark Plug Award winner as an outstanding new member, and a past club scholarship recipient.

Joe began with a quote from poet, novelist and conservationist Sir Walter Scott; "Nothing is more the child of art than a garden", and "As a gardener you are an artist, and all that is nature your medium". He then

began an impressive slide show detailing the use of plants, and man-made structures and objects in making a garden space beautiful and inviting. While shape, texture and size must also be considered when choosing and mixing plants and complimentary objects, we will limit our report to the blending of color.

One of the most helpful tools in planning a flower bed is the 'color wheel'. With the exception of white which is the absence of color, and black which is the absence of the light with which we see color, all colors



are the result of mixing the primary colors of red, yellow and blue. Secondary colors are the mixing of two primary colors is equal proportion. The exception is brown which is the blending of all three. Tertiary colors are the mixing of primary colors in unequal proportion. Mixing in white produces a 'tint', while adding black produces 'tone'.

'Complimentary' colors are those on opposite sides of the wheel; red and green, orange and blue, etc. 'Analogous' colors are those next to one another like orange and red, blue and purple. Combining plants with complimentary colors has a stimulating effect while combining analogous colored plants creates a soothing effect. Also producing a calming effect is combining 'cool' colors such as blue, green, purple and white. The 'warm' colors red, orange and yellow excite the senses.

In addition to height and size, location in the garden is also important. Cool colors and soft textures produce an impression of distance, while warm colors and bold textures appear closer. If neighboring plants violate these rules of color, mixing in neutral shades like white pulls them together. Bloom time is also important. If one variety is just opening up when those next to it are in decline, the effect is lost.

# Try New Plant Varieties This Year

It seems if you order a few packets of seeds, you get catalogues from several seed companies - I guess they 'share' your name with each other. I have started my plants from seed for many years. It allows me to grow varieties that are not available in big box stores or garden centers. I have found this very useful especially for flowers as the stores sell only what is popular while ignoring many old fashioned or heirloom plants.

From past orders I can look back to see which varieties did well and which disappointed. Last year was unusually hot and dry so I don't hold it against plant varieties that did not flourish. Every year has its adversities and we, as gardeners, have to adapt to changing conditions

So, order some new and interesting seeds this year or try some new plants from the garden centers. Who knows, a new plant might turn out to be a resident of your garden every year.

#### When To Sow Seeds from Feb. 2016 Germinator

When to sow depends upon the plant and its relationship to the 'last frost date' (LFD). Due to a changing climate, some internet sites have our area in Zone 5 while others have us in Zone 6 (Burpee). For the sake of argument, we'll use the Burpee LFD of April 15. The below chart.date spread allows for flexible planting.

In the chart, SS indicates starting seed indoors and DS means directly sowing in the garden. (\*) refers to a second crop. Except for cool weather crops like lettuce and snow peas, generally sow and transplant when soil temps reach 65-70 degrees.

## Squirrel-Proofing Bird Feeders

Anyone who enjoys feeding our feathered friends with a pole-mounted feeder knows that squirrels soon learn how to take advantage of an easy food source. Several methods seem to work on most fluffy-tailed varmints with some more effective than others.



We recently saw a YouTube video of a 'slinky' mounted to the top of the pole. The squirrel climbs up far enough to grab the bottom of the toy, then falls off when the slinky drops down under its weight. The weight of the squirrel species and the height of the pole will determine how much slinky should be deployed so some experimentation may be required. Fox squirrels are the largest topping out at about 2 lb.; gray (black) squirrels can

weigh a little more than a pound; and red squirrels can grow to a little more than a half pound.

One of our members applies axle grease to the pole and says the squirrels soon give up trying to climb it. He also hangs seed and suet feeders from a 20 ft. high tree limb using thin, durable nylon cord. Although there is evidence that some squirrels learn to climb down the cord, his resident fox squirrels have yet to do so. Perhaps smaller, lighter species could are more acrobatic but foxy keeps them away.
