Baseball, Apple Pie & Pot

This month we celebrate the 241st anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Since many of our founding fathers were farmers who grew hemp, and since many states including Ohio have or are considering some form of legalization of marijuana, we feel a short discussion of hemp's (marijuana's) history in this country should be explored.

Hemp, cannabis sativa, is a plant first domesticated in Asia thousands of years ago. At the time of the American Revolution it was a versatile crop on which a nation's security could depend, mainly due to its use in nautical rope, fabrics and paper. In 1797, the USS Constitution required 50 tons of rope hemp. The antagonism between European nations at the time and the fact that most hemp was grown in Eastern Europe encouraged the British Empire to demand American colonist farmers grow and export hemp to the Crown.

America's independence resulted in fabric imports from England being cut off, and hemp and flax cloth became important alternatives. Both George Washington and Thomas Jefferson grew hemp. Washington is quoted as writing, "Make the most of Indian hemp seed and grow it everywhere". As reported,



several U.S presidents have admitted smoking pot including Bill Clinton ("Didn't inhale"), George W. Bush and Barack Obama ("Inhaled. That was the point").

Betsy Ross's prototype American flag was made of hemp. The paper used for the Declaration of Independence was made of hemp fibers. Durable clothing like early blue jeans worn by miners was hemp based as was the fabric for covered wagons. While cotton was being grown in the U.S., high costs due to labor intensiveness in processing made it less popular until the cotton gin was invented.

Cannabis was used as a medical ingredient in other countries for thousands of years, and appeared in U.S. patent medicines in the late 1800's. As we learned from Cassie Nespor's 'Past Medical Quackery' presentation at our April membership meeting, other 'miracle' elixir ingredients included cocaine, heroin and alcohol. Marijuana began being labeled as 'poison' in some states as early as 1906 and, by the mid-1930's, became regulated under the Uniform State Narcotic Drug Act.

As early as the mid-1800's, cannabis was listed as a "fashionable narcotic" and, by the late 19th century, oriental-style hashish (a concentrated form of marijuana) parlors were flourishing alongside opium dens in every

major city on the east coast - 500 alone in New York City. In 1910, the end of the Mexican Revolution saw a large influx of immigrants in southwestern states of peoples who had been using the drug for centuries. Cannabis was cheaper than alcohol and, with the advent of Prohibition, increased in popularity.

The Great Depression brought about tensions between immigrants and European Americans over jobs resulting in some draconian laws being passed. In 1975, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that it was "not cruel or unusual for Ohio to sentence someone to 20 years for having ... cannabis". Since then, while marijuana is still listed as a Schedule I drug under federal law on par with heroin and crack cocaine, baby boomers coming of age and influence brought about a decriminalization trend where possession of small amounts is a minor misdemeanor or, in some states, legal for medical and/or recreational use.

A clarification between hemp, *Cannabis sativa*, and marijuana, *Cannabis sativa indica*, is probably overdue. The difference between the two lies in the amount of the psychoactive chemical, *tetrahydrocannibal* (THC), each contains. Hemp contains about .3% THC while marijuana has up to 25%. Another chemical contained in both plants is *cannabidiol* (CBD), a substance that has been found to significantly reduce seizures and pain associated with some medical conditions and nausea associated with chemotherapy. Botanist have bred plants that have very low levels of THC and elevated levels of CBD - thus the medical marijuana soon to be legally available in Ohio.

In 1978, a California man sued the federal government for arresting him for using cannabis to treat his glaucoma. While a judge ruled that he must be supplied with the drug, President George W. Bush later discontinued the program when the man tried to extend the program to HIV/AIDS patients to treat pain, nausea and lack of appetite. However, the government still shipped cannabis to a man suffering from bone tumors. Medical marijuana remains a controversial issue being 'hashed' out especially during political campaigns.

About 20 years ago, scientists discovered a system in the brain that responds to 60 cannabis chemicals that play a role in many bodily functions including the heart along with the digestive, endocrine, immune, nervous and reproductive systems. While a great deal of study still remains to be done, research on MS patients found that the drug helped manage pain and reduce muscle spasms. There are also indications that it works as an appetite stimulant for AIDS patients and those undergoing chemotherapy. It is also being tested as an alternative drug for brain disorders such as schizophrenia and Tourettes syndrome.
