Rodney Knows Seeds

As anyone who has enjoyed attending Rodney and Kay Toth's Labor Day Weekend Open Yard will attest, there are few area gardeners who can hold a candle to him when it comes to seed selection. His array of strikingly beautiful and unusual plants has awed visitors and inspired visiting gardeners for two decades. So it was a treat for February membership meeting attendees when he shared how he picks what plants he wants to grow during a given season and where he gets the seeds.

Rodney began with a bit of trivia - the first garden club in the U.S was the Ladies Garden Club of Athens, GA. As a side note, it is said that one of the reasons our own club was formed 87 years ago was to belie the image of vegetable and flower gardening as primarily a women's activity. He then rated several seed companies listing their good points and downsides - expensive (Parks), or offering only their own brand (Burpee).

One organization named good old *Asclepia tuberosa* as the 2017 Perennial Plant of the Year. Better known as orange milkweed or butterflyweed, a good source of seed might be our own Paul Shanabarger who may still have some left.









Other award winners are: *Okra Candle Fire*, edible winner; *Celosia Asian Garden*, ornamental from seed winner; and *Prism Hybrid Kale*, ornamental.

There are award winning plants that are unavailable to the general public and only in to greenhouses as

seedlings. But you can easily buy them during our Spring Plant Sale. They include National Plant of the Year, All-American Selections' *Supertunia Vista Bubblegum*. Our sale will also have *Supertunia Raspberry Black* and

Supertunia Bordeaux.

Tips On Purchasing Firewood

We may be a bit late in passing this along, but the Ohio Department of Agriculture issued the following information in a November news release to ensure you get what you pay for when buying firewood, and to also advise what the current laws are in that regard.

- 1. Non-packaged firewood must be sold by the cord or fractions thereof. Stacked, a cord is 8 ft. long, 4 ft wide and 4 ft. tall, or 128 sq. ft.
- 2. If sold in bulk, firewood must be purchased in ton measurements, weighed on a certified scale.
- 3. If advertised as a certain type of wood, the load must be at least 90% of that species.
 - 4. It is best to buy local and burn local as invasive







species like gypsy moths and Asian longhorn beetles in some form may be present. Pictured here are the moth nest and adult, and longhorn beetle adult.

We believe Ohio law still prohibits moving firewood across county lines. While the emerald ash borer is well established throughout Ohio, isolated stands may have withstood the invasion and may someday become the source of resistant ash tree species. And there should be plenty of dead ash nearby to stock up on firewood.

Any questions or concerns involving firewood sales, or if the seller will not correct an issue, should be forwarded to the Ohio Dept. of Agriculture's Division of Weights and Measures, 614-728-6290, or contact your county auditor's office.

Areas across Ohio are slated to receive gypsy moth aerial treatments by the Dept. of Agriculture this spring. Go to agri.ohio.gov/divs/gypsy/gypsy-index.aspx for maps of treatment areas and gypsy moth info.

Grouping Vegetables in Containers

Two groups of vegetables that can be planted in containers are salad plants and root plants. Gardeners should group together plants that benefit each other by preventing insect infestation and encouraging growth.

A group of salad vegetables that can be grown together includes a tomato plant, surrounded by lettuce, spinach, strawberries and carrots. The roots will not conflict with one another. Adding sage and rosemary



will deter insects.

Root vegetables such as beets, carrots, onions and turnips can be planted together. Growing lettuce on the surface of the soil will retain moisture, and adding savory increases the onion crop.

These same recommendations also apply when growing in raised beds. Remember that soil should not be of a primarily fine, easily compressed variety like peat moss. The larger the container the better. It should have drain holes in the bottom to prevent waterlogging during heavy rains. Daily watering will probably be necessary. Containers are available with a water reservoir beneath but should have an on/off spigot. Eight hours of direct sunlight is necessary especially for tomatoes *Source*: Reference.com sourced through garden.com.
