SPRING PLANT SALE

What a difference a weekend can make. On Wednesday morning, May 4th, there were about 40,000 plants and 175 hanging baskets crowded into the Mahoning County Board of Developmental Disabilities' (Bev) MASCO greenhouse. By the time the Mens Garden Club Of Youngstown's Spring Plant Sale was over the following Saturday evening, all baskets and 95% of the plants were sold.

Greenhouse and Plant Sale Chairman John Schinker



puts in countless hours preparing for our primary fundraiser that enables all other club projects, activities and scholarships. Years of experience enables him to tweak the inventory to improve sales. This year he added more petunias, tomato and pepper varieties, and 12" hanging baskets. He had to buy 40 additional baskets at a premium from Chuck's Greenhouse in North Jackson as the original stock was sold out by Friday morning. Winners of the hanging basket raffle were Marylou Burns of Boardman, Joyce D'Amico of Columbiana and Jean Montgomery of Youngstown.

A significant portion of our inventory is historically purchased by MASCO employees and the families of clients. As a special 'Thank You', they were allowed to



shop a day early. This also helped keep manageable the first day's crowd of buyers. Significant purchases were also made by the Youngstown Country Club and member Rodney Toth who stocks up on plants for his landscaping business.

Don't be concerned about those leftover plants. They were donated to the OSU Extension Gardening Partners, Paul C. Bunn School, Mill Creek MetroParks' Veggie Garden Program, Akron Children's Hospital Patient Garden, Dave Williams' planting of the MASCO garden, and our annual decorating of the war veteran memorials in downtown Youngstown and Smoky Hollow. The club will host a pizza party for MASCO clients who will each receive a plant to take home.

John was particularly pleased with the membership's response in planting seedlings, watering, and assisting customers during the sale. In previous years, he often had to call individual members when work needed done. This year all he had to do was make an announcement at membership meetings and guys show up.

While some work like preparing the baskets was delegated to Chuck's, the greenhouse is still labor intensive. Two members who contributed the most were Bruce Brungard who tended the Leonard Kirtz School



greenhouse where some plants were started earlier in the year, and John Fox who spent many hours at MASCO. Members who watered daily were a big help. They were: Dennis Zap, Terry Voland, Schinker, Carlo Rubino, Art Roden, Fox, Pat Cunning, Dave Campana, Brungard, Mike Beaudis and Mike Banks.

The plant sale was promoted in a number of ways. The club information booth at the Canfield Fairgrounds in April was organized by Brungard and manned by Beaudis, Campana, Tom Liggett, Bob McGowan, Roden, Schinker, Paul Shanabarger (2 shifts), Bob Stas, Richard States and Zap. And a few days before the sale, Bruce and John talked about the sale with Jessica Briganti on WFMJ TV's Early Show. We apologize if we missed any contributing members.

MetroParks Daffodil Show

Be they known as daffodils, daffadowndillies and jonquils, these members of the amaryllis family are also called narcissus, named for the mythical Greek lad who fell in love with his own reflection - something like the today's obsession with smart phone 'selfies'.



Exhibitors at the Davis Center show, however, save their love for these iconic symbols of Spring. Among those with the most entries were Marcy Dubec, Cynthia Foust, Mary Grace Fowler, and Janet Yaniglos.

To the uninformed when it comes to daffodil competition (meaning us), the show schedule reads as Greek as Narcissus himself. In addition to five divisions with thirteen sections each, there are seven additional divisions including Historic, Youth, Unidentified, Standard and Miniature Collections, and the Fellows and Wister Awards Collections.

USA Today ranks Fellows Riverside Gardens in the Top Ten nationally for viewing daffodils. The show was highlighted by the recently renovated Daffodil Meadow, originally installed by the Garden Club of Youngstown in 1930; the Brent Heath Daffodil lecture; and the Guided Walk viewing daffodils, tulips and hyacinths.

Mulching Alternatives

Mulching flower beds and gardens has many benefits including preventing unwanted seed germination which means less weeding, retention of soil moisture, encouraging beneficial microbial activity, moderating hot day/cold night soil temperatures, helping to prevent plant diseases, promoting earthworm activity, and recycling nutrients into the soil.

There any number of effective mulches including grass clippings, bark mulch, leaves, newspapers and

recycled tire material. Instead of investing in expensive mulches, a small chipper-shredder can pay for itself by recycling pruned plant material breaking it down into a more easily spread and faster decomposing state. Remember that decomposition, especially that of fresh plant matter, naturally removes nitrogen from the soil that must be replaced with fertilizer.

Invasion of Brood V

Having been buried for years, they will claw themselves to the surface and gross out anyone laying eyes on them. They are big, ugly and their non-stop screaming can drive you mad. Their rotting flesh will make you long for the smell of decaying fish.

No, they're not zombies - they are 17 year cicada (*Magicicada*), Brood V. The mature nymphs generally emerge when the temperature 8" beneath ground reaches 64 degrees. While local populations vary, this brood should now be your new alarm clock.



The nymphs crawl up whatever vertical structure is handy and molt their exoskeletons. For two to four weeks, the males scream their mating call by rapidly vibrating ribbed membranes on their backs. Successful mating results in the females laying about 600 eggs. Hatched nymphs start out sucking twigs, fall to the ground and burrow down to spend the next 17 years sucking roots.

One member recalls, when a child, he would put a shed shell on the coffee pot or on his shirt in the morning to startle drowsy mother. Fast forward to 17 years ago when his neighborhood endured a massive invasion of these harmless but annoying creatures. In addition to flocks of birds gorging themselves, squirrels and even his dog snacked on them occasionally. Probably a lot of protein there for the taking.

Winter Seminar Speaker's Latest Book

A presenter at our 2014 seminar, Marta McDowell's *All The Presidents' Gardens* tells the story of White House landscaping and the people who shaped it over the past 200 plus years. There is a rich historical depth and breadth to the book including 215 color and black and white images. While Marta's previous books on Beatrix Potter's and Emily Dickenson's garden interests were engaging, this latest effort reads almost like a novel flavored with her engaging sense of humor.
