Disease-free plant matter is discarded onto an area at the edge of the property in what amounts to a giant compost pile. Many plant starts pop up in the Spring which he transplants including petunias and gourds.

learning Show results, Ashley Kannal had the time of her life. Since her days as a Mahoning County Board of Developmental Disabilities workshop client, Ashley has always been one of the most enthusiastic gardeners we know. Her dedication to horticulture was rewarded with 2 Best-In-Section awards (*Annuals* – coleus and *Hanging Basket* – asparagus fern), and placing third in the Sweepstakes competition. Here she is beaming over another blue ribbon coleus entry.

As she did a couple of years ago, Cindy



Salerno edged out Horticulture Show Chairman Rodney Toth in the Sweepstakes. In addition to many blue ribbons, Cindy took Best-Of-Sections with her *Alocasia* 'Calidora' leaf in Bulbs, Tubers, Corms, etc., and Miniature Rose 'White Bride' in Roses. Rodney had section winners in Dahlias (Harvey Koop), and Potted Plants (*Colacasia* 'Coffee Cups'). Vince Cappittee won Best-In-Show with his 7 ft. plus



'Kentucky Green Gourd' in the Ornamentals Section. Show clerks were afraid of breaking this monster so they moved the entire table into the display room. Vince has a 12 footer still growing at home and will enter it in the Giant Pumpkin competition at Parksí Greenhouse. Imagine how long it will be when the competition takes place in October. The gourd has to be in contention for a new world record.

We had a decent turnout in the Youth Division with some excellent entries. Remy Sharpless won



Best-In-Show with a 'Red Dynasty' Cabbage in the Vegetables Section while placing second in the Sweepstakes competition. Cole Dotson won the Sweepstakes with entries including his 'Aunt Molly's


