


JOHN SCHINKER - Leading By Example

For those of us who knew him well, John Schinker's passing leaves a huge void in our lives. He will, however, forever remain in their hearts and memories, and an inspiration to live kinder, more productive lives. His was a life defined by love of family, and dedication to hard work, charity, and intelligent leadership.

John, with twin brother Bill, was born in Youngstown, the youngest of seven children, and lived his entire life in the area. His dedication and quiet tenacity were revealed on the

high school football field. A two-way player for the Austintown Fitch Falcons, he excelled at offensive guard and was the smallest defensive tackle in the Steel Valley Conference. John also ran the quarter and half miles in track. He was inducted into the Fitch Athletic Hall of Fame.



Football remained a big part of his life while coaching at St. Christine grade school

and the Boardman Pee Wee Football league. A few players went on to play in the NFL. He coached his sons when they became old enough to play, and never missed their and his grandson's games. A big fan of the Ohio State Buckeyes, he also took great interest in the band.

After high school, John earned college tuition toward a math major degree from Youngstown State University while working in the Republic Steel open hearth. Upon graduating from college, management wanted him to become a metallurgist but he instead became a pipefitter at Reactive Metals, retiring in 2002 after a thirty four year career.

More than a few years ago, John was in a friend's wedding party where a pretty young woman caught the



bride's garter. His friend told him, 'You'll like Georgia. She's a school teacher, makes good money and owns a car". The sales pitch was less impressive than the girl herself. Nature took its course and he and Georgia (nee Zucco) were married fifty six years. He is mourned by sons John, Jr. and George, daughter Dvnele Schinker-

Kuharich, and four grandchildren. Georgia has always been a bubbly, out-going counterpoint to John's quiet intensity.

John built a 1,600 sq. ft. garage with a rear section dedicated to a fully equipped woodworking shop. He

planned to make quality furniture upon retiring. But as it is said, "If you want to make God laugh, tell Him your plans". While some furniture was made for family and friends and, later, items for our garden club, an interest in gardening took over. John signed up for the Fellows' Master Gardening Course amassing more volunteer hours than any other student. Then club president Joe Alessi talked John into joining the then Men's Garden Club of Youngstown.

His contributions to the club began at the old greenhouse on Market St. in Boardman where most of the men were older and left the heavy lifting to John. Then Greenhouse Committee chair Larry Whetson noticed John's work ethic and said he had found his replacement. Esteemed club members Hugh Earnhart, Joe Alessi, Bill Carney and John approached the Mahoning County Board of Developmental Disabilities about the use of its Bev Rd. derelict, unused greenhouse which was part of the facility's workshop. The deal was the county would take care of the greenhouse infrastructure while our club would landscape the grounds, clean out debris and rehab the growing tables which were stored outside and were severely rusted.

A great deal of work went into making the facility what it is today. With some fits and starts and a few moves to other locations, it has been our Spring Plant Sale home ever since. Our club also secured use of the Leonard Kirtz School greenhouse, and we always hosted a pizza party for the clients that included a take-home plant. We also grew mums and cool-weather ornamentals on Fellow's property to raise club income. He quickly learned that there is much more to running a greenhouse than planting a garden. Problems can arise from disease, insects, supply availability, equipment breakdowns and many other situations. He talked to anyone and everyone who could provide the needed information.

A vast majority of our organization's income that goes toward scholarships, other club activities, and savings can be attributed to John's efforts. Now the responsibility of Bruce Brungard, it is hoped members will carry on this tradition

John's dedication to spreading gardening interest throughout the community went well beyond our club's greenhouse. For many years, he along with Lynn Zocolo and other members mentored kids at the MetrParks Youth Gardening Program. His dedication to children goes back to, as a teen, volunteering at Youngstown's Pearl St. Mission.

We can't account for all of John's contributions to our organization without mentioning leadership. He has held the top executive positions of our national The Gardeners of America, the Central Great Lakes Region and our club. With so many new members since he joined, John was an invaluable source of institutional memory. Our present and future leaders will especially miss that expertise.

Much of the information herein came from an article we wrote about John fifteen years ago. We hope John's contributions to our organization inspire present and future members to honor his memory with their own dedication.
