

January is a time when we resolve to change and enhance areas of our lives that we'd like to become more fulfilled. This could mean becoming more involved in club activities. We hope this includes attending next year's event. We had a great time. yashuddabeenthere.

Hellebores - Christmas/Lenten Rose

While robins are recognized as the harbingers of spring among animals, hellebores maintain that position as one of the first plants to flower. There about 15 species within the *Hellebours* genus, the most common are *H. niger* (Christmas rose) and *H. orientalis* (Lenten rose) There are numerous cultivars as these plants are readily hybridized. Despite their name, hellebores are not members of the rose family.

Hellebore's uniqueness includes a checkered past. It is toxic and can cause skin irritation from prolonged exposure so gloves and long sleeved shirts are recommended. In fact, the first known use of chemical warfare occurred in 585 BC when it was used to poison a water system in ancient Greece. The residents of Kirrha fell ill and were unable to defend their city. The plant is also the possible cause of Alexander the Great's death. The good news is that deer and rabbits avoid them.

The plants are somewhat difficult to start from seed so plants are usually 2-3 years old when purchased. As with most hybrids, seedling flower color may vary from mother plants. The 3-4 inch flowers include cultivars ranging from pure white to dark, almost black purple with multiple shades of pink, green, yellow and red. Some with edge shading and interesting color patterns are available.







Installation should be about 16 or more inches apart in well-drained soil with compost throughout the planting area. Mature plants will grow to 18-24 inches tall by 24-30 inches across. Hellebores need little fertilization with an application of compost or a light sprinkle of slow release fertilizer in spring.

In the first couple years after planting, the plants will produce few flowers but, once established, can bloom up to 50 flowers. Foliage will remain green most of the year. They do well in shaded areas and work well with hostas as boarder plants.

Flowers will last for up to 2 months on the plant. Vase life is long, but flowers should not be cut until the stamens fall off and the flower feels papery and stiff. While usually hardy in our zone, harsh spring weather may damage flowers and leaves. Just remove the damage ones and the plant will quickly send out new growth.
