Despite dreary skies and threat of rain, the venue was filled with beautiful plants and people ready to snap up some great bargains. Last year's hiatus seemed to have whetted rather than dulled the crowd's appetite for expanding its horticultural horizons.

At past auctions, members and guests brought covered dishes and desserts. This year, and what may become the norm, extra-large pizzas and soft drinks were



provided by our club. We thank new member, Sue Sofko, for picking them up.

Rodney Toth did his usual great job as auctioneer ably assisted by Barb Arquilla and John Schinker. There



was a larger than expected number and variety of plants to be dispersed, but he kept the action moving along with sprinklings of humor. Horticulture knowledge is an essential element for being a good plant auctioneer and Rodney certainly fulfills that requirement.

Bargains were certainly the rule as many exceptional plants went for only \$1 or \$2. The highest bid was \$11 for a beautiful *Brugmansia* (angels trumpet), a real steal, brought by Tom Arens and snatched up by Bruce Brungard. The plant

varieties were numerous and varied: Annual flowers and veggies; and perennial ground covers, grasses, shrubs, berries and ornamental plants. The most unusual items offered were six bags of aged horse manure brought by Barb that went for \$4 each. The sweetest smelling compost you'll ever sniff.

While some attendees only purchased a few items,



others had visions of vastly expanding their landscapes and gardens. A large number of purchases combined with an open pickup bed meant a slow drive home.

We'll be looking forward to next year's auction and a good time had by friendly people.

GROW Plantings FlyingHigh

The Gardeners of Greater Youngstown's civic project mentoring FlyingHigh clients planting and tending the GROW vegetable, herb and flower beds is well underway. Under the leadership of founder and Director Jeff McGaha, FlyingHigh services people overcoming

substance abuse, educational and social issues, and preparing them for productive lives.

Destined for farmer's markets in city 'food deserts',



the produce is grown in four areas of the GROW facility. The trellised area contains tomatoes, yellow squash, beans and cucumbers. Hot

peppers occupy the side lot. Lettuce, spinach, collard greens, carrots, zucchini, onions, kale, cabbage, broccoli, beets and hot peppers are

located in the taller raised

beds; and herbs, basil and parsley are grown in the short raised beds. Flowers are dispersed throughout the various beds. Club members are enjoying good relationships with the clients and staff.





Gardening Odds & Ends From gardeningknowhow.com When & How to Weed

Yes, it can be a pain in the derrière but if you want maximize plant health and fruit production while maintaining a neat appearance, it must be done on a weekly basis.

Merely yanking weeds out risks leaving stems and roots that will only result in rejuvenation. The correct way is to pinch the base of the weed and gently pull thus minimizing the number of roots that remain. Canandian

thistle and dandelions have deep tap roots so troweling our several inches of root may not completely get rid of them but their inaccessibility to sunlight will weaken repeated comebacks.



Weeding should be

done on a weekly basis, and is most effective after a shower, watering, or in the morning when the soil is moist to maximize root removal. It's a bad idea to allow weed plants to form seeds because they can remain viable for years to come. Mulching with grass clippings can prevent weeds from emerging but also introduces grass and lawn weeds to bare areas. Many gardeners swear by the effectiveness of PREEN, a combination pre-emergent and fertilizer, but it should only be applied after sown garden plant seeds germinate.

Minimizing Cucumber Beetle Damage

These pests come in 2 varieties but produce the same damage. Both are yellowish-green or orangeish-green with either black stripes or dots on their backs. Adults do



damage to the roots, leaves, flowers and fruit of beans, cucumbers, melons, asparagus, corn, eggplant and squash while the larvae attack

the roots of these plants. They also carry cucumber bacterial wilt and cucumber mosaic which are fatal to cucumber, squash and melons.

Row covers applied in the spring when the beetles emerge is the best defense. The covers are removed when flowers form so that pollination can occur. Soldier beetles, tachinid flies, ground beetles, nematodes and wasps are natural predators but may be harmed by spraying insecticide. If you decide to spray, do so in the evening and start in mid-spring when the pests emerge, and continue spraying for 2-3 weeks. Spray again in early summer to kill the larvae, and again in late summer to destroy adults.
