Julie Witmer, Dr. Laura Deeter & Dr. Robert McMahon 'Rotanical Opportunities for Unexpected

'Botanical Opportunities *for Unexpected & Diverse Locations'* was the subject of Ms. Witmer's presentation. She owns the Julie Witmer Garden design and holds a Horticulture Certificate from Britain's Royal Horticulture Society.

She espouses using native plants because they are more adaptive to local soils. Julie gave a list of plants to use in a variety of bedding conditions including wet and boggy; damp and shady; damp and sunny; and dry and shady.

Dr. McMahon gave a tutorial on 'Houseplant Care'. He is retired Professor Emeritus from the OSU Agriculture Technical Institute (ATI) in Wooster. He said the #1 reason for ailing houseplants is poor watering habits. The best tool is a finger pushed two knuckles deep into the soil.

Dr. Deeter, sporting an OSU colored Mohawk, is a Full Professor at ATI, honored with many awards and in much demand as a speaker. Her first presentation covered 'Basic Soil Science'. An inexpensive pH meter is sufficient for knowing the approximate soil acidity, all that's necessary for growing most veggies and native plants. Her second talk was 'Hortus Mustus', or plants everyone should have.

She advises her students that farmers should grow winter crops that 'fix' nitrogen. In spring, that vegetation is rolled flat and then seed is drilled into the soil. The use of fertilizers and herbicides is thus diminished, and as is wind and rain erosion.



GOGY members attended in respectable numbers with many helping setting up the venue the day before and cleaning up afterward. It was a full club effort and it makes one proud to be a member.

The 'small hitch' mentioned earlier was other



horticulture events that weekend. That and not having a recent, full day seminar resulted in attendance dropping by about a third. By scheduling in mid-February next year, as we've done in the past, should see crowds returning to normal levels.

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Off The Wall Gardening Advice

The National Gardening Assn. publishes a weekly newsletter offering gardening advice on a variety of horticulture issues. Sign up at garden.org. Here is an example from its 'Search' promp.

Soak rusty nails in water in an old coffee can and you've just created fertilizer. Acid loving plants like rhodondendrons, azaleas and hydrangeas will love the boost.

Are your pruner blades and shears blades rusty? Dampen a piece of aluminum foil and rub the surface of the blades. The rust will come right off.

Do you have old, well-used sneakers that are ready for the trash. Hide them in your garden to keep deer and other wildlife away.

Are you growing peppers this year? They love sulfur. Put match heads at the bottom of the hole when transplanting.

If you have an aquarium, save some of the water when cleaning for your plants. They'll love the fish poop.

Dental floss is good for more than cleaning your teeth. Use it for tying climbing plants to a trellis.

Old socks make a great soap holder. Place a bar inside and tie it to a faucet. When done working in the garden, wet it and use it to clean your hands.

Protecting Plants From Frost

Clear skies with falling temperatures predicted are prime conditions for 32 degree nights, especially when winds are out of the northwest.

Light breezes and humidity are good for plants unless the air is cold. In the absence of wind, the coldest air settles to the ground draining heat from soil and plants.

Planting on the highest and lowest locations is not ideal. The top of a hill will experience the coldest temps first; cold air is heavier than warm and will settle to the lowest point.

Deep, loose, heavily fertilized soil will release moisture more readily resulting in a higher dew point. Heavily mulched plants will freeze more quickly as moisture is prevented from rising and evaporating from soil.

New growth is more likely to be damaged by frost. Maroon and bronze colored leaves tend to be more frost tolerant as are downy or hairy leaved plants. Compact plants and those planted closer together also resist heat loss.

If expecting frost, water them and the soil. Covers need not be directly on the plants. Suspended 6 inches above raises temps 10 degrees below.
