MGCY 55th ANNUAL HORTICULTURE SHOW

If the Men's Garden Club of Youngstown has an age restriction (some might think its 70 and over), maybe we shouldn't. That's because young Cole Dotson put everyone but his grandfather, Rodney Toth, and a few other members to shame at out annual Horticulture Show. Cole ran the table in the Youth Division sweepstakes with 16 entries. His 'Packman' broccoli took Best In Show.



His other entries taking Best In Section honors were: **Fruits** – Ground Cherries; **Annuals** – *Celosia* 'Chinatown'; **Mixed Veggies** – 'Kennebec' potatoes, 'Envy' carrots, 'Green Majic' broccoli, 'Muncher' cucumber, and 'Blue Lake' beans.

We normally report Youth Division results after the Adult competition because, except for member Robert Voland's entries when he was a teenager, they were often of lower numbers and relative quality. Not so this year. To be frank and with few exceptions, Cole put most of us to shame. This was especially true of our members whose participation was anemic compared to years past.

He's Back!

One major exception was Rodney Toth who has had significant competition from Cindy Salerno the past few

years. Whether it mattered or not, Cindy didn't enter this year. Rodney won both Best In Show with his 'Holyhill Lover Boy' Dahlia, and took the sweepstakes with 32 points including five Best In Section awards. His 'State Fair' entry won the Boe Korody Memorial Largest-Best Zinnia award.



Bruce Brungard had 18 points for second including one Best In Section, while Tom Ares was third with 17



points and three Best In Section. The difference between 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} was the number of red and blue ribbons.

To those of us who knew him, it was a bit humorous that the *Warren Herald Tribune/Vindicator* reported Larry Whetson had won the heaviest tomato contest. In fact the competition, the Larry Whetson Memorial Heaviest Tomato contest, is named for one of our most cherished past and, sadly, deceased members. As he did last year, Norman Cappitte took the award with a 3.3 lb. monster.

Norman won Best In Show last year with his 8 ft. long Kentucky gourd. This year, his 9 1/2 ft. gourd took Best In Section in Ornamentals. He also wowed us with a 8 ft. banana plant leaf that was for display only.
