Club News

In the many years the *Germinator* has reported on our organization's monthly membership meetings, we can't recall any that didn't hold our interest. It isn't that some may have been humdrum, but they are well in the past - gone and forgotten. The point is our meetings have become increasingly educational, interesting and fun. Great speakers, member participation and delicious snacks are among the reasons every member should attend if possible.

And so it was at our September meeting. Dennis James, owner of DJ's Garden Center in Transfer, PA, is always a crowd favorite, and we are fortunate he speaks before our group once a year. In addition to sharing his expertise, he always brings numerous examples of his presentation subject.



DJ filled two long tables with plants that provide color and aesthetic interest in gardens from late summer into winter. They included varied species of hydrangeas, beautyberry, winterberry, sedums, asters, anemone, mums and hyperconia.



When it comes to hydrangeas, paniculata and oakleaf varieties are his favorites. But with new





varieties being developed all the time, there are also some wonderful smooth, mountain and climbing hydrangeas worth looking into. Example: Smooth variety Annabelles produce huge white blooms but a heavy rain will knock them down due to their weak stems. A new variety, Invincibelle, produces much stronger stems. Panicle hydrangeas which produce blooms from existing stems should be pruned to 12-15". Smooth varieties which bloom on new growth should be cut back to 3".

When purchasing mums, DJ advised looking for 'perennial' on the tag as opposed to 'hardy' which probably won't survive winter. He shared much more plant wisdom with us but space prohibits. We look forward to his next visit.

Terry Voland displayed a spring-loaded apple picker, a gift from Dan Chambers, and Heather Randall showed us a living 'succulent wreath' that included 'hens & chicks'.





Another feature is garden pics by members sent to gardenersofgreateryoungstown@gmail.com, and displayed on a large screen. They included Barb Arquilla's home landscaping and huge tomato harvest, Norma Harned's primrose (bog) garden, Tom Arens Monarch caterpillar and datura, and Dawn Reed's unusual sun flowers and fall bouquets.

58th Annual Horticulture Show

Gardeners of Greater Youngstown's members demonstrated their love of gardening and dedication to our organization by both the numbers of who entered and their many exhibits. Winners included both familiar names and relative newcomers. The event went off without a hitch.

Since selling his landscaping wonder in Liberty and moving to a condo, one would have expected

Rodney Toth to toddle off into the gardening sunset. No such luck for his worthy competitors. He took best in show with his 'moonshine' dahlia and won the sweepstakes by a huge margin including best



of sections in annuals (celosia 'Chinatown') and potted plants (begonia 'Gryphon').



Rodney, the sweepstakes rankings were very close. Elsa Higby took second which included a vegetable best in section (celery 'Kelvin'). Tied for third were John Schinker and Lisa Nicklash. John had best of sections in perennials/biennials ('Arunda Donax' ornamental grass) and annuals ('Candy' onion). Lisa didn't win any best of sections but had a slew of blue ribbons. Because there were so any vegetable entries, two best of sections were awarded.



Rounding out the other best of sections were Tom Liggett's gladiolas 'tricolor' (bulbs, tubers, etc) and Susan Murphy's 'Ring of Fire' sunflower (ornamentals). There were no rose nor fruit entries.

Isiah Carelly again won the Youth sweepstakes

by a large margin and pocketed the \$25 Robert Voland Youth Prize. His 'Tropicana rose' won best in show, and had best of sections with his 'Millions' grape tomatoes (vegetables) and 'blue crop' blueberries (fruits).



He is mentored by Terry Voland and Josh Kaglic. Mallory Soles took second with one best of section.





Norm and Greg Cappitte again won the Larry Whetson Memorial Heaviest Tomato Contest with a 2 lb. 15 oz. monster, and the Bo Korody Memorial Largest Zinnia Contest with a 5 1/2" beauty.

The Pests Just Keep Coming Asian Jumping Worm

Amynthas ssp. which has invaded the U.S. from the mid-Atlantic to the Midwest, is a highly active anthropod with the ability to flip off the ground. In sufficient numbers, its introduction can cause major environmental harm to forests and agriculture.



The problem is that native trees have evolved to take in nutrients slowly, and invasives like the Asian jumping worm and European earth worms remove the leaf compost too quickly. Bottom line: Don't dispose of garden debris near native trees.

The Spotted Lanternfly Is Near





An acquaintance recently went to retrieve his car from the Pittsburg Airport long term parking and found hundreds of *Lycorma delicatula* swarming about. Report sightings to our local Extension Office and the Dept. of Natural Resource after killing as many as possible.

Asian Lady Beetle

While our native ladybug beetles seem to be vanishing, *Harmonia exyridis* has become increaseingly common. Slightly larger than its American cousin, it has larger white spots behind its eyes and an 'M' shaped mark as shown below.
