GabbaCamp is the creation of Golden String, Inc., a not for profit organization located in Youngstown for the betterment of adults and children with intellectual, developmental and physical disabilities. Andrews Garden Lectures and Classes, garden bus tours, coordinating the regular Wine on the Terrace at 5pm events, the Summer Garden Party and a newsletter.

The organization has 640 active members with dues ranging from \$45 to \$1000 for five levels of membership. Members receive discounts at over 360 U.S. gardens and parks, and are kept abreast of related activities through social media platforms including a website and email. Sponsored events are promoted through 'email blasts', one of which promotes a succulents class on June 22^{nd} .

Some attendees encountered snowy, windblown roads coming to the event, but pressed on. We're sure they were glad they did. The presentations, food, raffle items and welcoming atmosphere are what they've come to expect from one of our organization's signature events.

Prior to past president and event committee member Tom Arens' introduction, attendees were treated to delicious baked pastries, fruit and breakfast beverages. They also had their initial opportunity to buy raffle tickets and take their chances at an impressive array of baskets donated by 32 generous donors. Kudos to the 21 members who solicited the donations.







Of course, the main attraction is the entertaining and knowledgeable speakers the audience expects from our seminars and this slate did not disappoint. Space here precludes going into detail on their presentations.

First up was Davey Tree Service arborist **Shawn Fitzgerald**, a 35 year veteran in the green industry. He covered tree selection, planting, pruning, mulching and the spotted lantern fly. While the latter is a threat



to grape vines and trash trees like the tree of heaven

and silver maples, Shawn doesn't believe this pest will be as destructive as the emerald ash borer.

Next up was **Denise English**, director of pollinator education for OSU's Dept. of Entomology. Without pollination done by Ohio's 400 species of wild and domestic bees, 1/3 of our food supply would disappear. She recommends planting a wide variety of native plants including trees.





Chris Baker is the founding Baker's Acres owner of Greenhouse in Alexandria. OH. His mixed presentation anecdotes, like humorous in "finding" cuttings of exotic annuals that will be added to his eclectic inventory. He is partial to

Brugmansia (angels trumpet), one of our Spring Plants Sale's offerings, that is very fragrant at night.

Our final speaker was **Dr. Laura Deeter**, full professor at OSU's Ag. Tech. Institute in Wooster. Her high energy and humorous style has been a draw for several of our seminars. She recommends planting a variety of perennials that will provide year round color and interest.



Those contributing to this seminar's success were our host, Fellows Riverside Gardens, a great lunch from Inspired Catering and table center pieces from Petitti Gardens. Shaye Cahill did her usual stellar job on audio/visual, as did our president and committee chair Clare Neff. Other

Spring Bulbs Sprouting in Winter

Lately, local winter temperatures have been fluctuating wildly between the low teens and high

fifties. Extended warm spells cause soil to warm with daffodils and other early spring bloomers sprouting foliage. Is there anything gardeners can do to mitigate damage or death when temps drop again?

Bulbs sprouting in winter can be problematic in the short run but this is normally not a

long term issue. Frost will damage the emerging foliage but the bulb will form additional leafy stocks later in the season. If, however, there is significant green growth, action must be taken before the freeze. Add extra mulch, cover the plant with cartons or sheets. Bulbs are hearty. If the entire top of the plant is lost but the bulb is planted sufficiently deep, it will sprout again the following year.

For perennials and woody flowering shrubs, plants that sprout early need protection. These plants can be covered with a lightweight tarp or sheet when a freeze threatens. If blossoms are completely lost, more may form but the display will be smaller and less impressive. As for the health of the plant itself, freezing temps won't typically kill a healthy plant. Native plants are adapted to winter climates and their blooming capacity will recover the following year.

Turf Grass Care in Early Spring

While many gardeners admire those who forsake lawns in favor of a yard full of flowering perennials, annuals, shrubs and other plants attracting pollinators and native wildlife, the time and effort involved makes this ideal impractical for most of us.

Sowing grass seed and over-seeding can be done any time other than summer's hottest months but late summer and early fall are best. Use a drop spreader to control seed and fertilizer distribution equally and on the targeted area. An application of slow release nitrogen fertilizer in mid to late spring may be needed. A soil test will determine the amount. Consider seeding in clover to crowd out weeds, fix nitrogen and break up the monotony of green . Also, the pollinators will thank you.

A side note: Lawns became popular in 16th century Europe because trees, shrubbery and wild grasses hid attacking enemy forces.


