Guide to Fall Vegetable Gardening

The days are getting shorter and autumn is on its way so it's time to plant cool season and short maturity vegetables. With the right timing and plants, fall can be one of the most successful times to garden.

Salad Greens – Lettuce, spinach, arugula and mesclun grow well in cool weather and are less likely to go to seed like spring planted crops. Lettuce and spinach germinate poorly when soil temps climb above 60 degrees so, if planted in late summer, cover beds with shade cloth.

Hardy Greens – Kale, collards, Swiss chard, mustard greens and bok choy thrive in cooler weather. A light frost will even sweeten the taste of kale. If planning to harvest kale at full size, plant about two months before the first frost date. If growing as 'baby' greens, sow seeds just a few weeks before frost is expected.

Cole Crops – Brussels sprouts taste best when sweetened by a light frost. Since it takes a long time to mature, it should be planted in early to midsummer. Other cabbage family members include broccoli, cabbage, kohlrabi and cauliflower.

Root Crops – Beets, carrots, turnips and radishes that mature in cool weather will be sweet and mild. In fact, they can be grown throughout winter.

Peas – They grow well in cool weather but developing pods can be damaged by frost. Plant so they mature a week or two before the frost date, and prepare to cover plants if an early frost is expected. Keep the soil well watered to ensure germination.

To figure when to plant, start with the average first hard fall frost (28 degrees). If, for example, Black Seeded Simpson lettuce matures in 45 days and you add a 14 day harvest period, seeds should be sown 66 days before a hard frost is expected.

Plant fast maturing crops such as lettuce, arugula, mustard and mesclun in succession. Make a small planting every few weeks from midsummer on to enjoy a continued harvest. Sometimes gambling on extended warmer weather will yield a longer harvest. Giving crops some protection including cold frames, row covers and low tunnels can also extend harvest times.

Root crops like beets, carrots, turnips and parsnips should be mulched before the ground freezes hard. A foot of straw over and 18 inches on each row side offers protection that can be moved to the side for harvesting then replaced.
