CANDIDATE FORUM AT THE FEBRUARY MEETING CINDY SHOFFSTALL

Our meeting on February 16th will be held at the **Holiday Inn**, top floor. We will be hosting a candidate forum for everyone running for City Commissioner.

Six candidates have qualified for the two open City Commission seats in the March 12th election. They are running for the two at-large seats currently held by Suzanne Atwell and Terry Turner. These two seats are elected by the entire city, not just our district.

In the March 12th election, voters will choose two of the six candidates listed on the ballot. A candidate must receive the majority of the votes to win. If nobody receives a majority of the votes, a second election will be held two days later with the three people who received the most votes. If one person receives a majority of the votes in the first election, then the two runners-up will face off in the second election.

NORTH LIDO PARK

In May 2006, North Lido Park was a problem park, owned by the city and maintained by the county. Illicit activities, drug use, and homeless camps were hidden in the tangle of non-native trees that choked the park. The Brazilian Pepper Tree and Australian Pine Trees had taken away the park's biodiversity and turned the landscape into a jumbled mess of the two plant species competing to choke out and destroy any opportunity for native plants to survive. Hidden in the density of this mass were homeless camps, trash, and numerous pathways used by those seeking illicit activities. Lido Key residents rarely ventured into the park and the police had had difficulty in trying to end the issues in themselves based on the vegetation.

A joint initiative started by the Sarasota Police Department and the Sarasota County Parks Department began that month to help end the problems and start to restore the park back to its natural state. By the end of that year, the majority of the 77 acre park's Brazilian Pepper Trees had been removed and the restoration had begun. On February 10, 2007, Sarasota Bay Estuary Bay Buddies helped in removing hundreds of seedling Australian Pines, Brazilian Pepper trees, Carrotwood trees, Hawaiian beach naupaka, all non-native species. They also assisted in removing the remnants of six homeless camps that had been exposed. Sarasota Bay Estuary Program (SBEP) became a major partner in the restoration of the park itself. Through this partnership, a tidal stream was designed for the park and the sand dredged from the project was used to form the large sand dunes that are located in the center of the park itself. On any given day you can watch mullet, snook, and schools of small fish navigating through the stream. stream now attracts wading birds, ospreys, and the occasional bald eagle, all trying their skills in catching a fish here. SBEP has assisted us in planting hundreds of native plants over the past several years.

A connection was made with Friends of Oscar Scherer State Park, which resulted in helping both parks in a very unique way. Friends of Oscar Scherer were looking for a firewood source. They wanted to sell firewood to campers at the state park without impacting the native tree species at the park itself. North Lido Park's invasive Australian Pine trees provided that firewood source to meet that need and it helped us in removing the trees with their free labor. A true win win situation.

NORTH LIDO PARK

The Lido Key Residents Association gave full support to the efforts to return their neighborhood park to a safe place to walk and applied for a grant through the City's Neighborhood Partnership Office in 2009. The grant required direct neighborhood participation either through matching funds, which were made possible by the generous donation of the Korp family, and sweat equity by volunteers willing to help in the restoration effort itself. The result was returning the park entrance on Emerson Drive to native plant species and removing the impenetrable barrier of old and dying Australian Pines that lined the street. The City of Sarasota Public Works Department has also provided continued funding for removal of trees and partnered with the County Parks Department and SBEP to plant native Sable Palms and hundreds of other native plants along the road that winds through the park.

The work continues at the park at a slower pace since the center of the park has been restored to its natural state, but the park is now facing a new threat to its progress. Thousands of Australian Pine seedlings are now sprouting in the restored areas and new dunes. The sweat of hundreds of volunteer's hours will soon be challenged by this non-native species, again attempting to take a foothold in the park. One mature Australian Pine tree can produce 30,000 seed a year. Is the work endless, yes, in some sense of the word? Can we win? We will if we try hard enough.

What can you do to help? Take a walk in the park, learn what a seedling looks like and leave after you have stopped and pulled up a few seedlings. Leave them bare rooted on the road's edge so they won't have an opportunity to reroot again. The partnerships that were formed to help restore the park will continue their efforts, and with the help of the Lido Key Residents Association joining in this small way, the work already done won't be undone.

Interested in a LKRA work day? We have a work day scheduled for February 8th, from noon to 4 p.m. If you are interested in helping out, bring some gloves, dress in some comfortable pants and shirt that you don't mind getting a little dirty. Parking will be available on Emerson Drive for all volunteers. Come out and help continue to turn this diamond in the rough into a destination location for walkers, runners, birders, and most importantly your neighbors and friends.
