City Moves Forward with Undergrounding Utilities Feasibility Study

The Sarasota City Commission voted unanimously on October 20 to authorize a feasibility study on undergrounding power and telecommunications lines across St. Armands, Lido Shores, and Lido Key.

This vote does not approve construction or assessments. Instead, it authorizes City staff to begin a detailed study that will evaluate project costs, technical feasibility, funding options, and overall impacts on property owners.

The effort will be led by Alvimarie Corales, Chief Transportation Planner, who serves as the project manager for the initiative, working in close coordination with Public Works Director Nikesh Patel and City Engineer Sage Kamiya. Together, they will oversee consultant selection, boundary refinement, and coordination with the City Attorney and Finance departments to ensure a transparent and methodical process.

Strong neighborhood participation helped advance this step. The barrier-island associations and merchants have voiced clear support for burying utilities to improve safety, reliability, and aesthetics. Residents point to the experience of nearby communities, such as Longboat Key, where underground systems have significantly reduced power interruptions during major storms.

The feasibility study will determine how undergrounding can best be implemented across the three island neighborhoods and businesses and will present estimated costs and funding scenarios. Once complete, the findings will return to the City Commission for consideration before any design, assessment, or construction decisions are made.

This marks an important milestone in strengthening Sarasota's coastal resilience while preserving the charm and character that define St. Armands, Lido Shores, and Lido Key. A Public meeting is anticipated to happen in early 2026 to provide additional updates.

Lido Beach Shore Protection Project: Contract Award Marks Major Milestone in Coastal Resilience Efforts

To help residents and stakeholders stay informed on the Lido Beach Project, the City of Sarasota has created a dedicated webpage: https://engage.sarasotafl.gov/lido-beach- renourishment. You can also access this page from the Capital Projects site on the City's website.

We're committed to keeping this page current with project updates and milestones — including the exciting recent news below. In close coordination with Sarasota County and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), the City continues to make significant progress on vital shoreline protection efforts for Lido Beach. These efforts include the next phase of beach renourishment and a future dune enhancement project, both of which are essential to reducing storm impacts and protecting our coastline.

USACE Awards Contract for New Pass Maintenance Dredging

The City of Sarasota is pleased to share that on October 22, 2025, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers successfully awarded the New Pass Maintenance Dredging project to Coastal Dredging Company, Inc. This milestone marks an important step toward restoring and stabilizing Lido Beach. The dredging project will improve navigation and provide approximately 200,000–300,000 cubic yards of



beach-quality sand to replenish Lido's shoreline. Construction is anticipated to begin in late fall 2025 with completion by spring 2026, ahead of peak sea turtle nesting season. With a contractor now on board, the City will continue to coordinate with USACE and share schedule updates on the project website as they become available.

Project Scope and Timeline

The coordinated project includes:

- New Pass Dredging: Conducted by USACE to enhance navigation safety, with the dredged sand reused to replenish Lido Beach. Project mobilization is anticipated in late 2025 or early 2026.
- Beach Renourishment: Placement of beneficial sand fill to stabilize the shoreline, protect adjacent infrastructure, and enhance ecological and recreational value. Beach fill operations are expected to run through Spring 2026.
- <u>Dune Enhancements:</u> A 1.57-mile-long dune system will be constructed to reinforce natural storm protection and improve habitat continuity. The dunes will start after the Beach Renourishment, scheduled for Fall 2026 through early 2027.
- Dune Walkovers: 3 existing access points will be reconstructed following the dune project.

Commitment to Coastal Protection

The City of Sarasota remains dedicated to the long- term protection and preservation of Lido Beach. These efforts are made possible through continued collaboration with Sarasota County, the USACE, FDEP, Mote Marine Laboratory, the Sarasota Audubon Society, and our engaged local stakeholders. We also extend our sincere appreciation to the offices of U.S. Representative Greg Steube and U.S. Senator Rick Scott for their advocacy and collaboration with our City Commissioners in advancing this critical project.

Temporary Lane Closures

SR 789 from Bird Key Drive to Sarasota Harbor West

Starting October 6, 2025

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) will conduct ground penetrating radar (GPR) testing on SR 789 from Bird Key Drive to Sarasota Harbor West on Monday, October 6, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. to locate utilities and steel bars in the deck in support of the drilling operations beginning next week. The work requires a lane closure of the westbound outside lane. Additional overnight lane closures are scheduled from October 6 through November 30 from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. Crews will be drilling and boring for core testing for the future bridge replacement. The community can expect noise from the drilling equipment. Motorists are encouraged to plan for additional travel time through the area. Mote Announces Grand Opening for Mote Science Education Aquarium (SEA)

Mote Marine Laboratory & Aquarium is proud to announce that the new Mote Science Education Aquarium (SEA) opened to the public on Wednesday, October 8, 2025. To reserve tickets for admission visit mote.org/tickets.

The 12-acre Mote SEA campus is located at Nathan Benderson Park, a nexus site for Sarasota, Manatee Counties and the entire region; Mote SEA will transform Mote's ability to provide informal science education and enhanced levels of ocean literacy to much larger and more diverse populations from around the world. The 146,000-square-foot facility will enable individuals of all ages and



backgrounds to engage with the ocean and experience a window into Mote's globally-significant marine science research and conservation initiatives.

As its name suggests, science is the attraction at Mote SEA. The innovative facility features three state-of-the-art STEM Teaching Labs focused on Biomedical, Microbiology & Immunology; Marine & Coastal Ecology; and Ocean Engineering, AI Technology, Robotics & Sensor Development. These labs will provide hands-on experiential learning to more than 70,000 K-12 students annually from Sarasota and Manatee county schools (as well as those schools in nearby counties), including over 26,000 Title 1 students, completely free of charge. In addition, Mote SEA will include five STEM Workforce Training Labs offering professional experience, alongside Mote scientists, as part of an array of high school, undergraduate and graduate research experiences in: Aquaculture & Fisheries, Conservation, Coral Genetics & Restoration, Artificial Intelligence, and Veterinary Clinic & Diagnostic Research & Practice. The STEM Teaching and Workforce Training Labs include wall-to-wall glass windows, so guests can observe and enjoy scientists and students learning and conducting research in real time.

Founded in 1955 in a one-room trailer in Placida, Florida, by world-renowned ichthyologist Dr. Eugenie ("Genie") Clark, Mote has become one of the most unique and impactful independent marine research and science education institutions in the world. Sarasota hotel, once owned by a dog, demolished

The Sandcastle Resort on Lido Beach in Sarasota was built in 1953. Later it was purchased by New York hotel magnate Leona Helmsley. When Helmsley died in 2007, though, she left her dog named Trouble the hotel and \$12 million. But, Trouble the dog died in 2011, and the money he received was added to a family charitable foundation.

And like many older, ground-level beach hotels in the area, The Sandcastle was heavily damaged

by Hurricanes Helene and Milton. Crews from J.P. Services of Sarasota began demolishing the





hotel on Monday. They believe it will take several weeks to demolish the hotel and separate materials.

The backstory: Leona Helmsley was a sometimes brash, high-powered New York businesswoman who owned hotels and real estate. She was known for battling one of her arch business rivals, Donald Trump. New York writers dubbed Helmsley the "Queen of Mean." Her most famous quote is "We don't pay taxes. Only the little people do."

What's next: The property is now owned by the same hotel company which owns the local Opal Collection hotels in Clearwater, Sarasota and Naples. They plan to build a new luxury resort on

Thoughts from a Recent Scholarship Recipient

"I was offered the opportunity to intern at Mote after I joined the O-Tech Club, which was offered by Mote Marine at my high school. John Langen was a club advisor. We built a ROV from PVC pipe and little motors. I didn't know anyone, but having hands-on experience kept me engaged and wanting to do more. Everything was new, but I quickly caught on and was able to help more and more. The scientists from Mote were there to help with difficult parts as well as answering questions about what they do and how it assists in research.

Interning at Mote Marine with the Ocean Technology group has been a new learning experience and I'm so grateful to have the opportunity to see how scientists work every day. One of the most surprising things I've learned is how people from different departments work with each other on their projects. One of the projects I have been helping with is a diver recall system, which was requested by the boat captains. I researched different aspects of making an underwater speaker system, such as what frequencies are heard best underwater, and what kind of equipment is used in other recall systems that are already available. I was able to go on the boat one day to help deploy the glider and we even got to release baby sea turtles. While on the boat, I also helped with taking water samples for the scientists in the Ocean Acidification and Red Tide department. It was a new experience, and I had to learn how to do it in the moment with only verbal instructions and watching other people. I learned a lot about field work and the stress that scientists are under, making adjustments and documenting everything, while also dealing with the unpredictable Florida environment.

This experience has already begun shaping my college path and my career choices by influencing my future towards a marine science or engineering-based job. I've learned that engineers can have many different jobs in numerous fields, and it's not always a straightforward path. I am looking at colleges that offer programs for marine technology or paths that can connect marine biology and engineering. I'm also looking into more opportunities for exposure to technology and engineering while also keeping a connection to the ocean. I originally wanted to become a conservationist or a marine advocate, but working with the Ocean Technology team really shifted my interest towards the engineering and technology aspect of marine science. Since working alongside the Ocean Technology team, I am more inspired than ever to work towards a future that will aid research and impact the world."
