For the third straight year, songwriters from Nashville's Combustion Music, Canada and some local superstars return to Los Barriles to perform their original songs and raise money for the East Cape Guild Scholarship Fund. Artists Morgan Evans (from Australia) and Nick Sainato (alternative pop artist from Ohio) will also be performing in Los Barriles for the first time. Canadien songwriter Cara Luft will be making her second appearance in Los Barriles. Also performing will be local favorite Carl Schweitzer and long time returning local Adrienne Ackerman who has gone on to great success up north including performing the theme song for the movie Ezra. 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Allspice

Allspice has been used in Mexico for millennia. Its name in English suggests a mixture of various spices, but while it is reminiscent of pepper, nutmeg, clove and cinnamon, it is not a blend of those spices. Allspice is the berry of the Pimenta dioica tree, native to Mexico, Central America and the Caribbean. The medium-sized tree thrives in wet forests, with its seedlings benefiting from the shade until they are established. In the summer, the tree produces small whitish flowers that become berries. These are picked green and are allowed to dry, traditionally in the sun. Allspice looks a lot like a peppercorn (native to South Asia), except it is bigger. This explains why Christopher Columbus, who was introduced to allspice in Jamaica, named it pimienta gorda (fat peppercorn).

Allspice has a long history in Mexico where it has primarily been grown in what are now the states of Veracruz, Puebla and Tabasco. It is known that the ancient Mayans enjoyed allspice in their hot cacao drinks. Possibly because of their anti-microbial and pleasant fragrance, the leaves of the tree were also used in their funerary practices. Archaeologists have found evidence of human remains wrapped in cloth into which allspice leaves had been placed. Ethnographic work in allspice growing regions shows that in recent history the bark, leaves, and berries of the trees are used. The bark is manufactured into strings used to tie down the .





hatches of houses. The leaves, when seeped, make a satisfying tea that is reminiscent of cinnamon. And a water extract of the berries is used to treat gastro-intestinal issues.

Traditionally, allspice was grown in remote communities by indigenous families or in some places, entire communities. During harvest time, everyone took part, from children to the elderly. As times change, however, some agribusinesses have entered that market, globalizing the reach of Mexican allspice. Throughout Mexico, families use allspice in many recipes. Allspice is used as a pickling spice. It is included in adobos, and in a number of rice dishes. The shrimp recipe that follows brings together allspice, chiles, vanilla and pineapple. Crank up the grill and enjoy, you're in for a treat!

Grilled Shrimp & Pineapple Salad With Vanilla & Chile de Arbol Vinaigrette - Ensalada de Camarón y Piña a la Parrilla con Vinagreta de Chile de Arbol y Vainilla

The Vinaigrette:

1 cup olive oil

2 garlic cloves, peeled

1 vanilla bean finely chopped

1 to 2 chiles de arbol, stemmed and chopped, seeds removed

¹/₂ cup olive oil (additional)

¹/₂ cup red wine vinegar

1/4 tsp. ground allspice

2 tsp. salt, or more to taste

Ground black pepper, optional

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. sugar, or more to taste

- 1. Heat the olive oil in a saucepan set over medium heat, until hot but not smoking.
- 2. Add garlic clove, vanilla bean and chiles, and cook about 15 seconds, stirring constantly. Be careful not to let them burn.
- 3. Remove the pan from the heat and immediately pour its contents into a mixing bowl to cool.

4. Remove the pan from the heat and immediately pour its contents into a mixing bowl to cool. 4. Put the additional $\frac{1}{2}$ cup olive oil, red wine vinegar, salt, pepper, allspice, sugar and above mixture in a blender. Blend until smooth, there will be pieces of vanilla bean in the mixture.

The Salad:

* 2 fresh pineapple, peeled and sliced about 1/2" thick into rounds for grilling

* oil to brush the pan or grill

* 4 lbs large shrimp, fresh or thawed from frozen, rinsed, peeled, deveined

* 1/2 cup olive oil

* salt to taste

* ground black pepper to taste

* lettuce of choice

* 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup red onion very thinly sliced and rinsed in cold water to remove the bite

1. Heat the grill until hot and lightly coat with oil. Grill the pineapple slices for about 4 minutes per side until they are slightly charred. Remove from heat. Once they are cool enough to handle, cut in half, remove the core and cut into medium sized wedge shaped pieces. Set aside.

2. Sprinkle the shrimp with salt and pepper and lightly oil them. Skewer them so that they don't fall through the grate and grill them, being careful to not overcook them. Set Aside.

3. Place the greens in a salad bowl. Drizzle some of the vinaigrette and toss, so that they are lightly coated but not soaked. Transfer the greens to a serving platter.

4. Assemble everything on a serving platter, placing the shrimp, pineapple and red onion on top of the lettuce.

5. Drizzle a bit more of the vinaigrette on top and serve.

You Say You Want A Resolution! By: Sefi Held

Millions of people eagerly make lofty resolutions to work out more, lose weight, drink less, spend less time on their PDA's etc., etc. Unfortunately in as little time as six to eight weeks those resolutions have fizzled like the New Year's champagne. The studio I worked at in Ontario, Canada was always busting at the seams in the first few weeks following New Year's day. All 20 of the spin bikes were booked a week in advance of each class, and there was a waiting list for the most popular time slots on the schedule.

One of the many reasons for this quick loss of resolutions to change is because people start out with such unrealistic goals and the difficulty of breaking those deeply ingrained habits and these "goals" lead to a lot of disappointments that undermine the willpower we need to keep those resolutions. I actually like the word "intentions" better than resolutions and this simple change of wording has helped some of my clients attain their goals easier with less pressure.

The good news is that small, realistic changes in routines can help us with some of those unhealthy habits by achieving results slowly and changing our couch potato ways. The key is to take baby steps so that your intentions last long after the New Year has passed and your willingness to change the habits you are not satisfied with.

Did you know that 40% of our daily actions are habits and not decisions. The cornerstone of successful behaviour change is willpower. Like any muscle, willpower requires energy to sustain it and if your intention takes a lot of self-control and is too difficult for you this time, your willpower wanes. The 5 Stages of Change is a common questionnaire for evaluating potential clients and their desire to change. (Norcross, Krebs & Prochaska 2011)



5 Stages of Change

1. Precontemplation. The person has no intention of changing behavior in the next 6 months and may be either unaware of problematic behavior or demoralized by past failures.

2. Contemplation. The person is aware of a need to change and intends to take action in the next 6 months but lacks commitment to actually start.

3. Preparation. The person has decided to start changing behavior within a month and has a concrete plan of action, such as going to a class or gym or starting a specific diet plan.

4. Action. The person has made specific changes in the past 6 months. Effective strategies include setting up rewards to encourage new behaviors and avoiding high-risk situations.

5. Maintenance. The person has executed the desired behavior for 6 months and is working to prevent a relapse.

HERE ARE A FEW HELPFUL TIPS TO KEEP YOU GOING

1. Decide to change. Committing to change is a predictor of success.

2. Believe in change. When believing in change becomes a habit, change becomes real.

3. Pick one specific habit to change. Focusing on just one habit conserves willpower.

4. Identify the routine. Journaling helps identify repeated behaviors.

5. Isolate the cue. Writing down the location, the time, the emotional state, who was present and the action/event that took place before an urge occurred helps identify the trigger.

6. Experiment with rewards. Trying different rewards can isolate a craving.

7. Plan. Deciding what to do to revise the old habit loop is the last step.

Change one habit. Changing too many habits at once can weaken willpower

Keep it simple. Weight loss and fitness goals should be within your reach with small daily changes. Drastic resolutions like "I will never eat" or "I will always exercise every day" limit the likelihood of success.

Write it down. Self-monitoring strengthens control. Journaling and food-and-exercise logs boost willpower and encourage habit change.


Get social. Social support improves adherence. Let your family and friends know your plan - it helps garner support when temptation strikes.

Give it time. Positive habits require development of new neural pathways, a process that takes at least 3 weeks.

Create positive rewards. Successful goal makers visualize new routines and allow rewards.

Be ready for relapses. New Year's goals often meet their demise with the first relapse. Drastic changes and stressful life events de-

crease willpower. То stay on course, continue towards improvement and don't abandon the good habits that you started. Cheers to continued success and а very healthy and rewarding 2025!!



We're Ready to Welcome Children!

Big news! The John Gullo Home for Children in El Cardonal has officially received its operating permit. This means we are now able to open our doors and provide a safe, nurturing environment for children in BCS whose families are experiencing medical crises. It's been a long journey to get here, and now we're in the final stages of hiring staff, sourcing necessary equipment, and preparing the home for the children who will soon call it their temporary refuge.

Meet Our Team

Leading the charge is Belén Meza Sandez, our Facility Director, who began her role in December. Belén has been working tirelessly to navigate government processes, secure the permits, and oversee final preparations. She is a dedicated advocate for children and families in need, and her leadership is the cornerstone of our mission.

Joining her on February 1st is Sara María Esparza Lucero, who will serve as the Assistant Facility Director. Sara brings a wealth of experience as an educator and community advocate, and her passion for helping others will be invaluable as we provide 24/7 care to the children. Both Belén and Sara will live on-site in the apartments at the home, ensuring round-the-clock support and attention.



We are also in the process of hiring a cook, sourcing an RV for parental visits, and finalizing staff training in safety and operational procedures.

How You Can Help -

While the home is ready and the staff is coming together, there's one critical element we still need: funding. The John Gullo Home for Children operates entirely on donations. There is no government funding. This means that every meal, every utility bill, every hour of care is made possible by the generosity of people like you.

To give you an idea of what it takes to keep the home running, here's the math:

• The annual operating budget is approximately \$100.000 USD.

• With space for 24 children, that breaks down to \$4,166 per month or \$173 per child per month.

Recurring monthly donations are the most effective way to ensure we can meet these ongoing needs. When we know we have a steady stream of support coming in, we can focus on providing the best care possible without the uncertainty of whether we'll be able to keep the lights on.

What Does It Take?

To fully fund the home's operational costs, we'd need:

- * 24 people donating \$173 per month, or
- * 48 people donating \$87 per month, or
- * 96 people donating \$43.50 per month.

The power of recurring donations is that they allow everyone to contribute at a level that's comfortable for them while collectively making a huge impact.

What is the Crescent Moon Project: Art for Children?

The Crescent Moon Project (CMP) is a free, communitydriven art program for the children of Los Barriles. Founded by Los Barriles native, Priscilla Duran, in 2018, CMP was born from a desire to provide creative opportunities in a town with limited extracurricular activities for youth. With the help of volunteers, CMP began offering free art classes, expanding in 2021 when Melissa McDonald joined the program to help grow its reach, holding weekly classes in local spaces and even creating a vibrant community mural.

The following year, the Crescent Moon Project rented a dedicated art space at Palmas de Cortez Resort with support from local sponsors. By 2023, a full-time art teacher was hired and CMP became an official Mexican non-profit organization with a Board of Directors. This past year, CMP reached an impressive milestone—over 125 children participated in its art classes, contributing to an astounding total of 700 hours of creative engagement!

The Crescent Moon Project is much more than an art program—it's a celebration of creativity, community, and the bright futures of Los Barriles' children. Through the generosity of donors and volunteers, CMP continues to inspire and nurture the next generation of artists in our town.

Why Art?

Art plays a crucial role in a child's development, offering a range of benefits that go beyond just creating beautiful pictures. Here are some ways in which art is important:

• Fosters Creativity: Encourages children to think outside the box and express themselves in unique ways

• Enhances Social Skills: Promotes collaboration and communication, building stronger relationships

• Día del Niño and Dia de Los Muertos: Crescent Moon Project, along with the Rotary Club, sponsors these local Los Barriles celebrations (commemorative dates celebrating children and those who have passed)

• Fun Community Art Fundraisers: Events such as "Ornaments & Margaritas" offer adults the opportunity to create art while raising funds for our children's programs.

What is the Impact of the Crescent Moon Project: Art for Children?



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Siri, Texting, USB's, VPN, Viruses & Other Diseases **Of Modern Life!** By: Lane Sykes

I have always been suspicious that Apple's Siri was listening for more than their alert word "Siri". Apple just settled a lawsuit for \$95 million dollars. Apparently, Siri was compiling data and allowing other companies access to that data. Personally, I have had conversions in my house that shortly turned into targeted ads. One couple discussed a dog carrier and within hours, they received ads for dog crates with a dog almost identical to theirs. The good news, if you owned an Apple product that had Siri enabled, you can receive \$20 per device not more that \$100 per household. The web page to file for your share of the lawsuit payout is not yet active. When that page is available, I will post it on the BPE.

Texting is something that we all use. Is it safe. Well yes, maybe. The security guys have found some serious loopholes that have not yet been closed. If you text Apple to Apple, the text is encoded end to end - safe. If you text Android to Android, your text is encoded end to end - safe. But! If you text from Apple to Android, it's clear text without any encoding. Same issue Android to Apple. For secure texting cross platform, use "What's App". What's App is encoded end to end regardless of platform. For most of us who cares if I text a friend: "I'm headed to the beach".

An easy way to have your computer hacked is through a USB drive or even a USB cable. To be honest not all USB drives have embedded firmware nor do USB cables. But, let's say that you are at a coffee shop and find a nice shinny USB flash drive on the counter or table, that device may have malware. If you buy a cheap USB cable, it too could contain malware. Now, not everyone is trying to hack your computer but, it's something to be aware of. A number of companies have had "ransom ware" installed on their servers. The bad guys leave a USB flash drive at the nearest coffee shop to the computer system that is their target. Some one finds the drive, takes it into the office, plugs it into the company computer to see what's on the drive. The "ransom ware" now has access to the servers. The bad guys are smart enough not to activate the software until days or weeks later. Then they lock all access to the servers and hold all the company data hostage until the ransom is paid.

Now that we're on the subject of viruses, do you need an anti-virus? With a Windows machine running Windows 10 or 11, probably not. I use the free already installed Microsoft Antivirus included in the operating system and that works just fine. I go to web pages that most people should never visit. No issues in the past 10 years. Why? The money is not there for the bad guys. The money is in ransom ware. I use a Mac as often as I use a PC. There are no

viruses in the wild for a Mac. One big reason for that, there's no money to be made. The Apple market share by percentage (15%) is not there for bad guys to spend the time. In addition, Apple spends a good amount of time locking down their operating system.

For years I've used a browser extension called "Honey". It tracks items that you have an interest while shopping online and can alert you to price drops. Well, Honey has been caught doing some not so nice tactics. They have adjusted their software to jump ahead of legitimate links when you buy a product thereby cutting legitimate web sites from earning their share of referrals. Honey has been known to collect and sell your shopping habits.

VPNs are not just for streaming. If you are on a public WiFi, you may be vulnerable. For instance, your at an airport and while searching for a WiFi network, you stumble across "Free Airport WiFi". That internet access may be setup by a bad guy in search of valuable data. If you enable your VPN, you are safe. The VPN creates a tunnel from your device to the site you're requesting. If you're heading to a banking site, no worries since the Banks and Financial Institutions use strong encryption. But, I still use my VPN in those instances. But! Some banks block VPN's. I have at least 3 banks that block VPNs, one of which is Intercam Bank. Not a real threat since the banks use strong encryption.

> What a Milagro!! I still get "holy showers" (as some call goose bumps down here) when I think of the talent, ingenuity, and kindness that Julio presented. I have ordered string heddles and a reed that will complete his work of art.

> Although Nancy will have a loom at home, there are 4 others at the center which they all share. Also, they express that getting together helps with figuring out problems and inspires creativity.

> I hope you go to the Cultural Center in San Antonio and see their amazing weaving. The Center is open Tuesday

For flying, if your dog or cat is under 20 pounds, you can take them as carry-on, in an airline approved pet carrier. You must reserve a space, check with your airlines if animals are allowed in-cabin. There is a fee.

If your dog is over 20 pounds, they must fly in cargo. Currently, only Alaska Airlines and WestJet allow dogs in cargo. You must reserve a space, and have an airline approved crate. Again, there is a fee. Always check with your airline for current policies and regulations.

The requirements to bring a cat across to the United States are simpler:

They must appear healthy and have a health certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian. A rabies vaccination isn't required, but the CDC recommends it.



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Traveling To The United States (And Canada) With Your Dog

Happy New Year! The USDA/APHIS and CDC have imposed recent mandates on travelers taking their dog from Mexico to the United States, and no doubt it's causing some confusion. Hopefully this will clarify what you need to do.

To import a dog from Mexico into the United States, you must meet the following requirements from the USDA and the CDC:

Age: The dog must be at least 6 months old when it enters the United States;

Health: The dog must be healthy and free of infections, external and internal parasites;

Rabies vaccination: The dog must be vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian at least 30 days before entering the United States;



Other vaccinations: The dog must be vaccinated for distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus, parainfluenza, and leptospirosis (DHLPP) within 12 months of entering the United States;

Health certificate: The dog must be accompanied by a health and rabies vaccination certificate issued in English by a licensed veterinarian;

Microchip: The dog must have an ISO-compatible microchip;

CDC Dog Import Form: The dog must have a CDC Dog Import Form receipt;

Screwworm Certificate: The dog must meet APHIS requirements for screwworm-free certification. Canada does not require a screwworm certificate, but if you are driving, or you have a layover in the U.S., you will need the certificate.

The CDC Dog Import form should be filled out by the person bringing the dog. This should be completed on-line (Google CDC Dog Import Form). Mexico is considered a dog rabies-free/low-risk country. Once completed, you'll receive a receipt by email. The receipt can be printed or shown on your phone to U.S. Customs officials and/or the airline. This form is good for 6 months and is free.

When flying directly to Canada, you only need a health certificate - a rabies vaccination is recommended (not having one can cause problems at the border). There is NO age limit; CDC and screwworm forms, and microchips are not required.

In the Los Barriles area, Dr. Cristobal Cosio, in Buenos Aires, and Dr. Gretel de la Torre, in Las Cuevas, can examine your pet to make sure it's healthy, give any vaccinations needed, do the microchip placement, and complete the health certificate.

A screwworm certificate must be completed within 5 days of crossing the border, whether by air, sea or land, and completed by a licensed veterinarian who has been certified to evaluate screwworm.

At the time of this writing, Dr.'s Cristobal Cosio is working on getting his screwworm certifications - possibly/ hopefully some time in February.

At the time of this writing, Dr. Gretel's husband, Dr. Saul Ortega, is the only vet certified in the area. Please contact Dr. Gretel's clinic as soon as you know your departure date to make an appointment. Dr. Saul has a clinic in San Jose, but he can see dogs one or 2 days each week, depending on demand, at Dr. Gretel's clinic in Las Cuevas. These appointments are either early, before he goes to San Jose, or when he returns back to Las Cuevas, around 5 pm or later. If nothing is available at Dr. Gretel's, you will have to go to San Jose to his clinic. Dr. Gretel will be taking classes for the certification in February.

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Whale Encounters in Baja Sur Mexico

Baja Sur offers a wide variety of marine life encounters. From Grey Whales in the Pacific to Humpbacks and Blue Whales in the Gulf of California, to turtle releases on both coasts, to Whale Shark snorkeling in La Paz Bay, mobula ray conflagrations and massive schools of fishes for boating, diving and snorkeling encounters, the choices almost seem endless. Here is some basic information on a few of

the amazing whale experiences possible in this rich marine environment. There are many great local operators who can help you plan the adventures that best fits your needs.

Human interaction with marine life provides more than just entertainment. Of course the sheer joy of watching these majestic creatures leaping from the water is magical. But awareness of what lives beneath the surface of the seas and oceans is critically important. Through these encounters we can learn about the importance of protection of these species and their environments. Many marine creatures are as curious about us as we are them. Please know I am only advocating responsible, respectful interactions as harassing marine life is highly discouraged for so many reasons.

Mexico has more than 30 documented species of cetaceans. The Baja Sur Peninsula's unique geography offers close proximity to gray whales in the Pacific Ocean's bays one day and humpbacks or Blue Whales in the Gulf the next. Mexican warm water bays offer protected waters for breeding and calving for all the migratory whales. Tour operators have local captains who have grown up on these waters so very experienced and informed. They can create the best interaction for you and the marine life based upon the constantly changing conditions and recent activity in the area.

Grey Whales, approximately 25000 of them, migrate south to Mexico's Pacific warm nursery lagoons each fall to give birth and mate before they return each spring to the cold food dense feeding grounds located in the Gulf of Alaska and the Bering Sea. There are multiple regions and ports in Baja Sur to chose from depending on which works best for you but all offer similar gray whale encounters. There are three main areas from north to south, Guerrero Negro, then the Laguna San Ignacio area, and finally the Magdalena Bay area with multiple ports within that zone.

You will be fitted with life jackets, board small pangas and head out in search of gray whales

that populate the bays from late December to April with the peak season from January through March. Many report the mothers bring their babies right to the panga. I personally have experienced this with the mother lifting the baby up closer to us as if she is showing off her baby. With whale spout spray showering us, we eyed each other before she proceeded to push our panga around in the water entertaining all including the baby. Bucket list experience for sure.

Blue Whales, the largest animal on earth and the largest known population of Blue Whales in the world, close to

3000, migrate along the Pacific coast to the Gulf. The best viewing location is the Loreto Bay National Marine park. It's season, Jan – early March can be windy so it's not always possible to go out. Local boats leave the marina there early as it can be a bit of a ride to reach the areas known for Blue Whale sightings among the many off shore islands. For some scale on how big Blue Whales are, consider that Blue whales are about the length of 3 school buses and are equal in weight to about 30 elephants. When they come up to the surface they look like a small island and it's quite the sight.

Whale watching is possible from the Los Cabos area marinas via organized or walk up tours. They can travel close to shore so any water based activity can turn into a whale watching experience. Divers and boat snorkelers are often treated to first class whale watching during surface intervals. Recently in Cabo Pulmo National Marine Park, at least seven adult humpbacks traveling together moved closer to our boat as we all traveled north. Maybe they were people watching? Visitors and locales see whales from shore during the season, breaching, splashing and generally enjoying their time in Mexican waters. It's always a delight to point out whales to others nearby as it turns into a happy shared group experience.

Whale Sharks – Not whales, they are the worlds largest shark growing up to 33 ft in length but they are docile filter feeders and pose no threat. La Paz Bay is a great place to experience snorkeling with them. This is a government regulated activity to ensure that there isn't too many people for the amount of whale sharks in the area. Two snorkelers at a time slip into the water from the boat, and can result in an exhilarating swim alongside this gentle giant. A good guide is really helpful in knowing when to enter the water. They look like they are hardly moving from the boat but once you are in the water start swimming immediately as they will quickly over-Occasionally they will tip toward the surface, take vou. slow down to almost a stop and begin to gulp. They create a mini tornado to swirl the krill into their mouths and it's fascinating to see if you happen to be in the right spot at that moment. It happened once for my hubby and I and we still get excited when we share that experience with others.

Having these experiences, creating these memories and



sharing them with others are priceless. It's another new day, who knows what you will experience next?


