

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
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plenty of surprises.

Health & Wellness at the Center


Rotary's motto is *Service Above Self*, and for our club that often means very practical health and wellness projects.

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EAST CAPE GUILD IS SOON TO BE 30!

At 29, the East Cape Guild is one of the oldest non-profit organization on the East Cape. We will celebrate our 30th year in 2026! Many locals know the Guild well, but with the influx of new people to town, we thought we ought to let you know who we are and what we do.

The mission of the East Cape Guild is to provide educational benefits for the students of the East Cape, BCS.

The East Cape Guild was established in 1996 to provide scholarships to local students to attend high school. The Mexican government pays to send kids to school only through the secondaria level (9th grade). After that, parents must pay tuition, transportation, and other costs (uniforms and supplies) to continue their child's education. These costs can approach \$500 USD annually, depending on the transportation costs, and are difficult for some families to pay, especially if they have more than one child at the high school level.

The process of awarding the much sought-after becas (scholarships) begins in January when the Guild distributes applications to the secondaria and preparatoria schools. The students must submit the applications in Spanish and Eng-



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lish, as well as provide proof of their grades and a letter of recommendation from a teacher or other non-related person. Becas are awarded based on academic achievement and financial need. Scholarships are awarded based on the ranking and on the amount of money the Guild has raised each year. To receive a scholarship in year one and subsequent years, the student must maintain at least a level of 8 (out of 10) in each of their classes. *In May of 2025, we awarded 190 high school and 80 college scholarships*.

The East Cape Guild is an entirely volunteer organization that raises funds by holding community fundraising events and through cash donations. Donations can be tax deductible under US law by donations through the International Community Foundation.

The Guild serves a variety of towns and communities in the East Cape, with its service area ranging from Mira Flores in the south to El Triunfo in the north. It provides scholarships to students from the larger towns, e.g., Los Barriles, La Ribera, Santiago, Mira Flores, El Cardinal, and San Bartolo. It also provides scholarships to children from smaller towns and remote ranches.

The Guild members and board include Mexican, American, and Canadian citizens. The Guild meets once a month to discuss its fundraisers and activities. Membership is \$50 per year. We welcome you to join this meaningful organization.

The Guild is known for its FUN FUNDRAISERS. This year's fundraisers include the recently concluded Parade of Homes/Poker Run, Tamale Day at the Los Barriles Concha on February 1, and the Nashville Songwriters VIP dinner and Concert on March 6 and 7, 2026. Keep an eye out on the Los Barriles Facebook pages and the Baja Pony Express for ticket information.

Since its inception, the Guild has raised over \$1,363,888 and funded over 3992 scholarships. Your town mayor, your builder, your architect, your engineer, your restaurant or spa owner, and your Mexican neighbors may have been scholarship recipients. The Guild, with humility and appreciation for the community that supports us, submits that it has provided academic and professional opportunities to the citizens of the East Cape that did not previously exist.

So, that is who we are. Please consider joining the Guild, attending our fundraisers, or financially supporting the

deserving students of the East Cape.

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Buying EBike?

The hottest selling thing in the bike world is the ebike. The number of companies selling ebikes has exploded in the last ten years. The market is so hot that car manufactures Mercedes and Rivian have joined the fray. There are so many choices available that choosing the perfect bike can be a daunting task. If you are considering purchasing an ebike, there are several things which you need to think about before purchasing. For some of us, budget is a major factor. Prices range from \$800 to \$20,000. So, what do you get for more money? Some of the lesser-priced ebikes are weak on components, so the best thing in shopping is to take a test ride. I have test-ridden bikes that ranged in cost from \$800 to \$15,000. Yes, the components on the higherpriced bikes are very good, but realistically, I couldn't justify the top-priced ebikes. One thing in shopping is finding a bike shop that has a good range of options Be careful that a shop isn't trying to dump inventory. Before I selected a shop. I checked a store's reputation for sales and service. In the end, I found a shop that takes time fitting the rider to the bike that works best for you. What may seem like a perfect ebike for me might not be at all good for you. The shop I use treats every customer well and stands behind their products. The service they provide is top notch!

When looking at ebikes, there are three classifications to consider. Class 1 ebike. Assistance: Pedal-assist only. The



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motor provides boost only when you are pedaling. Top speed: The motor cuts out at 20 miles per hour. Class 2 ebike. Assistance: Has a throttle, allowing the rider to use an electric boost with or without pedaling. Top speed: The motor cuts out at 20 miles per hour. Class 3 ebike. Pedal-assist only. The motor provides boost only when you are pedaling. Top speed: The motor cuts out at 28 miles per hour. There are some manufacturers that are building Class 3 bikes that include a throttle. My personal preference is a class 3 as I like have the option of 28 mph boost. Ultimately, the choice is up to you. Once again, it is a good case for test riding before purchasing.

My first ebike was a mid-priced Class 1 bike which I thought would work for me in Los Barilles. The bike was heavy, weighing more than 80 pounds and the components were substandard. The power was not enough for me to ride up the steep hills without overexerting myself, and the battery didn't hold a charge long enough to ride long distances. Had I followed my advice about test riding before purchasing, I would never have purchased the bike.

My next bike had better components, and the battery kept me going for 25+ miles. I did test the bike, and it seemed like it would work for me. What I didn't do was test ride it on the same conditions I would encounter in Los Barilles. The bike worked well for my wife who weighs 120 lbs., but it wasn't quite enough for my 180 lb body. I found a local buyer who weighed in at 120+ and it is perfect for her. After several mistakes, I settled on a Class 3 bike that has lots of power, good components, and came in at \$3,000. An added bonus: the new bike has 3"-wide tires which will allow me to ride comfortably on dirt and gravel roads.

At my home in Washington State, I have an ebike that works perfectly for me. Because I never ride on anything other than pavement, the tires are 2" wide. The power is enough to allow me to ride comfortably. While riding at home, I have learned a lot about how to get the most out of my bike.

One way to ride is to use the motor to give the most assist possible. The advantage of this style allows the rider to ride as fast as possible with the least amount of effort. The downside is twofold. First, battery life is greatly diminished, reducing range. The second downside is exercise. By increasing boost, the amount of work is diminished, so the calories expended is low. After playing with me bike, I settled on a strategy that works for me. I use a smart watch that measures my heart rate. My goal is to keep my heart rate between 130 and 140, so I adjust the boost and gear ratio to maintain my heart rate.

On the Road to Nowhere, I start out at the lowest assist and adjust the gearing, so I can ride at 20+ mph until I begin the climb to the first summit at the five-mile mark. Depending how am feeling, I adjust the boost to keep me riding uphill at a speed of 15 mph. In the early days of ebike riding, I thought that turning off the boost would conserve battery life. In reality, as long as you are coasting, the battery is not drawing power, so it isn't necessary to turn the battery off.

Once I begin the second climb, I adjust the boost to keep the power where I am working and not overusing the battery. Over the last year, I have played with different scenarios. It's amazing how boost management can conserve battery life.

One important thing to do while riding is to monitor battery life. No matter where I ride, I turn around and head home when my battery power level drops to 60%. Remember, when you are riding back to town, you have more than a mile and a half climb before you reach the last summit, so watch your power level.

In town, you can rent an ebike. Renting one for a day is a great way to introduce yourself to the ebike world, but be careful, because once you try an ebike, you'll want one!

You don't have to be a millionaire or a superstar to find out. Welcome to the world of Liveaboards. What is a Liveaboard? It's just what it sounds like. You live aboard a boat, with a group of like minded individuals, on scheduled packages and head out into the blue to experience a variety of experiences. Liveaboards operate in many locations throughout the world but here in Southern Baja, you can choose among sailing adventures, kayaking adventures, marine life watching, snorkeling or diving adventures.

In April 2026 I am taking a small group of scuba divers on a liveaboard to a diver's bucket list area I have visited several times before. Contact me for details on that charter at info@lbbeachgear.com. I first went on this ship, the Valentina, a 115 ft ship out of La Paz by Fun Baja as part of group of 20 divers who departed San Jose del Cabo Marina in Feb 2025. Destination – the remote Revillagigedo Archipelago, commonly referred to as Socorro, the largest of the four volcanic islands that lie 285 miles southwest of Cabo San Lucas. This marine national park is known for big marine life such as Giant Oceanic Mantas with up to 30 ft wingspans, many varieties of sharks, dolphins, whales and more which makes this a bucket list trip for most advanced scuba divers. The crossing is over

30 hrs each way and most trips are 10 days to allow enough time to enjoy all these waters have to offer.

Typically travelers arrive at least one day ahead of departure to allow for travel delays, recover from jet lag and also to meet up with your fellow travelers. For this trip I was introduced via common friends about a year ago as they began to plan this trip. I had previously visited these islands 4 years earlier and was ready for a return trip. Many who use Liveaboards travel in pairs so they have a built in roommate and dive partner. But others like myself on this and earlier trips I have made, use this as an opportunity to make a new friend. Cabins are cozy so you need to travel light with minimal clothing as it's a very casual environment. En-suite bathrooms are provided with bunk beds being fairly typical.

We boarded the ship and immediately began to settle in while the ship fueled and finished provisioning. Valentina has a crew of 10 who operates the ship, cooks and serves all the delicious meals as well as all the dive operations. We enjoyed dinner and went to bed while the ship began it's long journey to the first island of our adventures. We traveled all the next day and arrived the following morning. The ship offers outdoor and indoor lounge areas so there is plenty of space for everyone to either spend time together or separately. There was a former park ranger aboard serving as one of our dive guides who provided detailed briefings on the islands and what we could expect to experience when diving this area. Most specialty Liveaboards offer naturalist briefings or area experts so you get the full benefit of local knowledge.



Liveaboards are eat, sleep, experience and repeat. You have none of the usual time lost with transportation to and from lodgings and whatever you really want to be doing. You live on top of what you are there to see. Typically we woke up when they ring a bell so we can make our way upstairs for coffee or whatever your morning choice is followed by getting into our dive gear so we could be ready to board the skiff. We were divided into three teams, mine was the Sharks, and we always dove with the same group with the dive guides rotating across the three groups. We also rotated the order in which we dove so each group got to be first in the water. Short 5-10 minute ride to the dive site and then back roll entry followed by descent into an amazing world. All too soon we run low on air or dive time and had to return to the surface. It's deep drift diving so the

skiff returns when we surface as a group. Excited chatter about all the cool stuff we saw on the dive began as soon as we hit the surface. Once back aboard we shed our dive gear, put on something dry and headed for the dining room to replenish and share stories with the other groups. After a short surface interval we returned to the dive deck to do it again as 3-4 dives are offered daily.

Sometimes it felt like we dropped into a Manta party with 5-6 gentle giants gliding around. They love our bubbles and would swim above us to enjoy them. They each have unique markings like a fingerprint and our guide told us they have one that's been seen for over 35 years. We saw many types of sharks cruising by us at the cleaning stations they visit where fish pick off their parasites in a truly symbiotic relationship. Dolphins made their appearance, octopus and eels roamed the reefs and a mom and baby Humpback whale glided above. This was peak whale season so their singing was our background soundtrack along with our own breathing. It's truly a magical experience. Balance And Osteoporosis

Balance, which is essential for integrated movement, declines as we age. We start to lose our balance in our 50s, but it can be challenged at any age due to medical conditions, injuries and certain medications. The good news is that simple exercise can help maintain and even restore balance.

Why is it important to balance? Accumulation of your body parts working together - muscles, tendons, and joints sending signals to your brain to say this is where we are in space and to make minor adjustments to keep you upright and from falling down is essential.

Falls are a serious risk for older adults, with consequences such as fractures and head injuries that can lead to death. As many as one-third of adults over 65 years who live independently fall annually. If you have been diagnosed with Osteoporosis, the risk of fracture can be devastating. Osteoporosis is a condition that causes bones to become thin and porous, decreasing strength and leading to an increased risk of breaking a bone - making you prone to fractures in the forearm or wrist, upper arm, hip, pelvis and vertebrae. No single cause for osteoporosis has yet to be identified and it is referred to as the "silent thief" because bone loss occurs without symptoms. It can result in disfigurement, reduction or loss of mobility and decreased independence. To help prevent falls, improving balance, removing hazards and addressing issues like poor vision, and nutrition can all help. Your doctor may recommend medications that can help prevent.

bone loss or increase bone mineral density.

Older adults, particularly those with osteoporosis, or spinal fractures need to focus on strength and balance. When I fractured my spine in 2017, I was disappointed in the information given to me by medical professionals regarding safe spinal movements. Even the lectures I attended at some of my conferences did not provide answers that I was satisfied with. An interesting fact that I did learn while seeking out more information on this disease is that our peak bone mass is achieved at an early age - age 16 in girls and age 20 in young men.

I was fortunate to meet an integration leader with Osteoporosis Canada this summer and she suggested that I enroll in the Level 1 and 2 BoneFit certification course. I registered for this immediately and when the next Level 1 online is available, I'll be a student again but need to wait and take the practical Level 2 when I return to Canada - yes, I will always be that lifelong student.

Research has shown the benefits of exercise interventions in the prevention of falls and that exercise training can reduce falls by a whopping 23%!

Programs combining balance exercises and functional training reduced falls among participants when compared with non-exercisers. Programs that blend balance with functional training are likely to reduce falls, and consistent Tai Chi, Yoga and Pilates practice may also lower risks.

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

Having a strong trunk and hip complex helps us maintain balance for years to come. Incorporating multiplanar exercises targeting the core musculature and the gluteals are extremely beneficial as well as balancing by starting on the non-dominant side.

Let's stay balanced and become too fit to fracture!




ideas and dedication could be exactly what we need to keep this mission thriving.

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Guardians of the Sea: The Story of Grupo Tortuguero and Turtle Hatchling Releases

Every year, as the warm winds of autumn sweep across the East Cape, a remarkable event unfolds along our pristine beaches—the release of thousands of sea turtle hatchlings into the vast blue expanse of the Sea of Cortez. From mid-October through the end of November, weather permitting, the beaches come alive at sunrise as tiny turtles begin their journey toward the ocean. Around 7:30 AM each morning, visitors and locals alike gather to witness this aweinspiring spectacle.

A Mission Born from Wonder


The heart behind this conservation effort is Grupo Tortuguero, now in its 16th–17th year. Founded by brothers Noe and Omar Araiza,. The organization began with a simple yet profound moment: Noe and his young daughter watched a mother turtle lay her eggs on the beach. Her expression of wonder sparked a lifelong commitment to protect these ancient creatures.

Since then, the Araiza brothers have dedicated countless hours—often outside their full-time jobs—to rescuing

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




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nests, safeguarding eggs, and ensuring hatchlings have a fighting chance at survival. Their passion has transformed into a community-driven mission that releases 25,000–35,000 hatchlings each season.

Behind the Scenes: A Labor of Love

The process begins long before the hatchlings emerge. Each year, Grupo Tortuguero secures two permits from the government in La Paz:

- * Nest Collection Permit (June–November) for a 14-kilometer stretch from La Ribera to north of Playa Norte.
- * Nursery Permit for the protected beach site where eggs are incubated.

Before dawn, Omar patrols the beaches on his quad, searching for signs of nesting females. When he finds a nest, the delicate work begins—gently transferring eggs into sand-filled bags without breaking their fragile shells. By 7:30 AM, he arrives at the nursery with 8–12 bags, each containing dozens of eggs. Inside the nursery, Noe and Omar reconstruct nests 18–24 inches deep, count the eggs, and carefully place them for incubation. After about 45 days, the hatchlings emerge, ready to imprint the sand before heading to sea.

The Science of Return: Natal Honing

One of nature's most fascinating mysteries is how female turtles return to the same beach where they were born—sometimes 12–15 years later. Scientists believe this phenomenon, called natal honing, involves a combination of cues:

- Earth's magnetic field
- Geomagnetic mapping
- Unique beach scents
- Low-frequency sounds
- Seasonal currents and celestial navigation

This intricate navigation ensures the cycle of life continues, generation after generation.

Respecting Ancient Mariners

Sea turtles have graced our oceans for over a billion years, making them among the oldest living creatures on Earth. During nesting and hatching season, we ask visitors to observe from a respectful distance. Quiet, space, and minimal human impact are essential for these magnificent animals to thrive.

Join the Experience

Witnessing a hatchling release is more than a photo opportunity—it's a chance to connect with nature, support con-

servation, and be part of a story that spans millennia. So, set your alarm early, bring your sense of wonder, and join us on the beach as the sun rises over East Cape. Together, we can help ensure these tiny travelers find their way home—today and for generations to come.

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Ponche de Navidad – **Christmas Punch**

A traditional drink during the holidays in Mexico is Ponche de Navidad, or Christmas punch. The beverage, made of fresh and dried fruit, is served at the *posadas* leading up to Christmas, and is especially enjoyed on Christmas eve (Noche buena). The history of ponche is not clear. It may have its roots in India, then moving into ancient Persia, where a drink called "panch" made with lemon, sugar, herbs and rum was enjoyed. It is thought that the Moors brought the drink to Spain, where it was

adapted, undergoing a name change to ponche in the process. The celebratory beverage was then brought to Mexico by the Spaniards where it was popularized. There are now hundreds of recipes for ponche throughout Mexico, with adaptations based on local ingredients.

The tradition of serving *ponche* during the holidays is alive in Baja California Sur, but may not be as prevalent as it once was. A friend, Deyanira from San Bartolo, indicated: "When I was little, I could see my mother and aunties preparing ponche for Christmas Eve. For us, it was a family thing, we enjoyed it at parties with the family on my mother's side. It's traditional, and has cinnamon, hibiscus, tejocote*, fresh cane, apple, guava, prunes. A bit of tequila is optional. It's a hot drink, very good." I wanted to give a very special thank you and a hug to Deyanira Baltazar de Trasviña for kindly sharing her family's recipe for holiday cheer.

Ponche de Frutas de Yadi - Yadi's Fruit Punch

- 2 1/3 cups tejocotes* (cut in halves)
- 2 1/3 cups guavas (cut in quarters))
- 1 cup prunes (cut in halves)
- 5 yellow apples cut in quarters (remove core)
- 4 sugar cane stems (peeled and cut in 6" pieces)
- ½ cup tamarind (peeled and packed)
- 3 cinnamon sticks
- 3 ³/₄ cups white sugar

½ cup *piloncillo* (unrefined brown sugar)

1 1/4 cups dried hibiscus flowers (jamaica)

Optional shot of tequila (per serving)

- Wash the tejocotes, guavas, apples, prepare cane stalks
- In a large saucepan heat 5 quarts of water, add the sugar, cinnamon and piloncillo.
- When brought to a boil, add tejocotes, and sug-
- About 5 minutes later, add the apples.

- Bring back to a boil and add the guavas, prunes, tamarind and hibiscus flowers.
- Simmer at a soft boil until liquid is reduced, but the guavas and apples are not falling apart.

*One of the main fresh fruits in the Christmas punch is tejocotes, known as texocotli in Nahuatl, the language of the Aztecs who ruled at the time of the Spanish conquest. About the size of cherry tomatoes, tejocotes are the fruit of the hawthorn trees, look like crab apples, are orange to golden in color and have a sweet-sour flavor.
