

Government Accountability & Transparency Reform Act

Restoring Public Trust through Transparency, Ethical Standards, and Structural Reform

THE ISSUE

Public trust in government institutions has declined due to concerns over transparency, conflicts of interest, and lack of accountability.

Key concerns include:

- Limited visibility into legislative processes
- Influence of lobbying without full public disclosure
- Financial conflicts of interest among elected officials
- Lack of structural limits on tenure

LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

Term Limits & Congressional Accountability

Establish a two-term limit for Members of Congress, with the option for a third term only through a voter-initiated special election.

Compensation Reform

Reduce congressional salaries to \$80,000 annually to reinforce public service over career incentives.

Prohibition on Stock Trading

Ban individual stock trading by Members of Congress while in office to eliminate conflicts of interest.

Mandatory Community Service Requirement

Require Members of Congress to complete 15 days of verified community service annually within their districts.

Transparent Spending & Voting Act

Ensure public access to clear, accessible records of spending and voting behavior.

Lobbying Disclosure Requirements

Mandate full disclosure of all lobbyist interactions.

Plain-Language Legislation Requirement

Require all bills to include clear, plain-language summaries accessible to the public.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

- Increased transparency in government operations
- Reduced conflicts of interest
- Greater accountability to constituents
- Strengthened public trust in elected officials

FIRST ACTION

Introduce a comprehensive accountability reform package addressing term limits, compensation, transparency, and ethical standards.
