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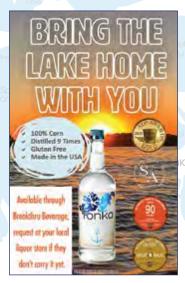

When the Chilly Open kicked off in 1984 ... it was the same year that Apple launched the Macintosh personal computer, Prince's Purple Rain album was a huge hit, and those ultra-patriotic Olympics were hosted by the USA.

The event is a unique frozen golf event on Wayzata Bay that has attracted participants from all over the country and even folks from overseas.

This year visitors can enjoy golf, the Chili Cookoff, Snowga, and Snowkiting.

Through the years, the Chilly Open has had various, festive themes. This year's theme is a nod to Las Vegas. Other years included: Fairways to Follies, the 20s, the 70s, the 80s, the Olympics, Auto racing, Superheroes, and Gone Country. Each golfing team is encouraged to dress up and play the part.

Wayzata native, and professional golfer, Tim Herron designed two of the holes in 2005.

In 2002, the golfing portion of the event was cancelled because warm temps created thin ice. Meanwhile, 2021's golf and chili cookoff were iced because of the pandemic.

In addition to the frozen golf, the famed chili cookoff is a big draw. Restaurants battle it out with the goal of having the top-rated dish.

You only have one body and you are going to live in it for the rest of your life! The better you care for your body, the better it will serve you and the longer it will last.

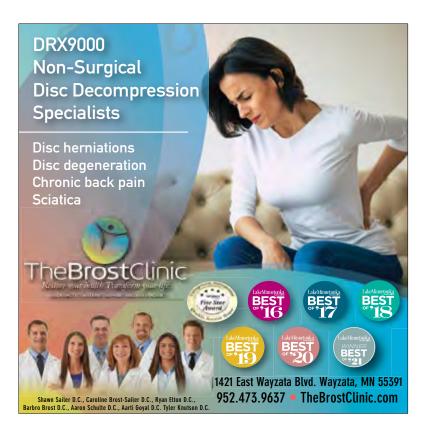

When it comes to winter activities in Wayzata, nothing beats Klapprich Park. Skating, hockey, and maybe a little sledding. It's a picturesque scene,

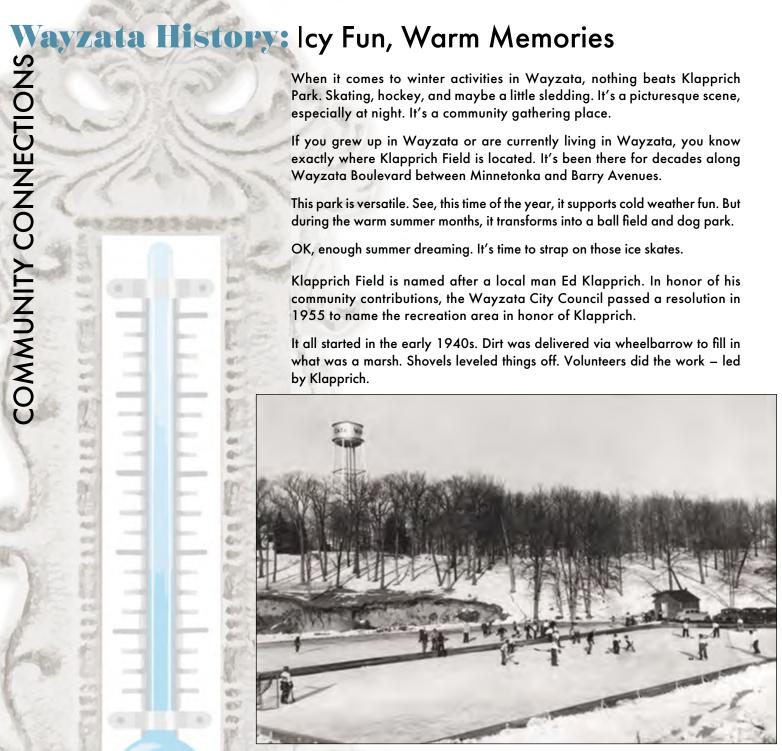
If you grew up in Wayzata or are currently living in Wayzata, you know exactly where Klapprich Field is located. It's been there for decades along Wayzata Boulevard between Minnetonka and Barry Avenues.

This park is versatile. See, this time of the year, it supports cold weather fun. But during the warm summer months, it transforms into a ball field and dog park.

OK, enough summer dreaming. It's time to strap on those ice skates.

Klapprich Field is named after a local man Ed Klapprich. In honor of his community contributions, the Wayzata City Council passed a resolution in 1955 to name the recreation area in honor of Klapprich.

It all started in the early 1940s. Dirt was delivered via wheelbarrow to fill in what was a marsh. Shovels leveled things off. Volunteers did the work – led



A hockey rink was completed on the east end of the marsh by the mid-1940s. The boards surrounding the rink stood only 18 inches high. The warming house was a donated garage.

In 1955, Klapprich and others passionate about hockey went before the school board to ask for a hockey program for Wayzata High School. The board agreed and the team would play at the rink on the marsh with Klapprich as the head coach.

A cement block warming house would be built on the northwest corner of the rink in the late 1950s.

Klapprich Field was added to the Wayzata Parks System in 1986.

In 2005, the old warming house made way for a new one.

Check out this community gem before the ice melts. Make your own memories at a place that has been a community gathering place for decades.



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
