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Waytonka Club: Decades Of Service

There are numerous non-profit organizations doing great things in the Wayzata area, but none that go back quite as far as the Waytonka Club. It's a small group of women making a big impact. The organization was serving the community well before it took the name of Waytonka Club in 1937.

One of those original members was my grandmother "Billie". It was a way for her to help the less fortunate and as a trained nurse, it was a way to assist young ladies who had interest in pursuing a career in healthcare.

The original 42 members met regularly at the Wayzata Bank, then later in the Wayzata schools, then at the Wayzata Country Club, St. Bartholomew Catholic Church, and currently in different locations in Plymouth and Wayzata. The main purpose of the group is to support local families in need, and health and wellness, especially in the local schools.

Back in December 1937, the club had a Christmas party where toys were wrapped for underprivileged children. In January of 1939, the club put on their first of now famous rummage sales and netted more than \$100. Not bad considering that would be \$2,200 in today's dollars. In May of 1944 an annual \$25 Girl Scout fund was set up to help send girls to camp.

Waytonka Club has always provided scholarships to selected students intending to study the health or education fields. The first scholarship was \$25. In 1974, four girls were given scholarships valued between \$200 and \$375 per year. A year later, the nurses' scholarships were raised to \$500 for each girl. Currently, the Waytonka Club provides at least four scholarships annually at \$1,000 each.

My aunt, Paula O'Connell, and co-chair Pat Robbins reinstated the after-rummage sale party at the Legion Hall. It was a fun way to celebrate all the hours put into organizing the event that funded a large portion of the organization's annual funding.

And here we are in 2024. The Waytonka Club continues to do great things in the community. Be sure to support them and attend their Spring Marketplace sale in May!

Automatic Signals

Machinery is reported in motion on both state and county levels to eliminate two of the greatest traffic hazards to the daily commuter between the lake area and Minneapolis. These hazards are the crossings of county road 18 and county road 73 at Oak Knoll.

Every year these crossroads, even though guarded by metal stop signs, have taken their toll in accidents and lives, but no move has been made until recently to eliminate the danger. Both crossings are badly lighted at night, giving a driver unfamiliar with the area no warning that he is approaching a busy intersection. Inpatient drivers waiting on the stop roads often in the past have misjudged the speed of on-coming traffic and attempted to cross the four traffic lanes ahead of approaching cars. This mis-judgment has often proved disastrous. Plainly, the answer to the problem has been automatic traffic signals.

A contract has been let for the installation of such signals at the crossing of county road 18 and state highway 12. A shortage of electronic equipment to operate the signals is now holding up the construction of the signal devices. It is hoped that the stop-and-go signs will be in place this spring, however.

No action has been taken as yet on the Oak Knoll crossing which, while having the bad features of the number 18 crossing, is further complicated by the service road which leads to the Oak Knoll shopping district.

Plans for erecting signals at this crossing are proceeding in the state highway department. However, it is the policy of the department to erect such signals (those dealing with both county and state highways) on a shared cost basis. As yet the Hennepin county highway department has not seen fit to agree to these terms. On two separate occasions the township and the school board have tried to undertake the county's share of the expense only to be stopped by a ruling from the attorney general's office, refusing to allow the expenditure because county road is not under the jurisdiction of either body.

It is the fervent hope of those lake residents who regularly use highway 12, that this difference can be worked out in the near future so that proper signals can be installed to lessen the present danger and prevent future loss of life.

Messing In The Kitchen

Here are a few recipes made to order for munching while enjoying the warmth of the living room on cold winter evenings, watching TV shows or just reading.

This one's for the children but the grownups like them too:

- Tasty Apples**
1 cup white sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 cup syrup (light or dark)
1 tablespoon butter
Combine all ingredients and boil to 245 degrees. Dip ripe red apples into syrup and then dip into ice water. Place on waxed paper to harden.
Something new for you grown-ups to dip your chips or crackers into.

- Clam Cheese Dip**
1 can mixed clams
3 three-oz. paks. cream cheese
2 t. Worcestershire sauce
Dash of garlic salt
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
Mash all ingredients together; mix well until smooth. Chill and serve with potato chips or crackers. This can be chilled overnight but is best if made one hour is sufficient.

Cheese Popcorn
Mix 6 cups freshly popped corn with 1/4 cup melted butter. Sprinkle with 1 cup grated parmesan cheese. Toss to mix popcorn, butter and cheese thoroughly.

- Now this one is a bit different but tasty enough to tempt the most stubborn appetite.**
"Zesty Baked Eggs"
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup milk
1 cup grated American cheese
6 eggs
Combine mayonnaise, Worcestershire sauce and seasoning; add milk gradually; stir until smooth, add cheese; cook on medium flame to warm setting, stirring until cheese melts and mixture is thick. Put tablespoons of mixture in each of 6 custard cups, break an egg into each cup and add another two tablespoons of mixture. Place in shallow pan with 1 inch of hot water. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes.

- Serve with a tossed salad; hot rolls and your favorite luncheon beverage and dessert.





City Officials & Wayzata Legion Discuss Potential Pull Tabs At Post 118



The construction of the building was a team effort with Legion members spending evenings, days off and weekends to build the club. There were many young World War II veterans who were willing to volunteer their time to make it happen.

But it wasn't just Legion members who got involved. The community came out in full force to help the cause. Local businesses donated building materials, hardware, plumbing, a furnace, and food for the men working on the weekend. The original building was 30 feet wide and 75 feet wide and consisted of a small bar, kitchen and meeting room. The construction of the new Legion building was a passing of the torch of sorts. While the World War I veterans created the Post, World War II vets made their mark by creating a community hub from the ground up.

In 1963, an addition was made to give the Legion its current size. In 1990, the Club was remodeled in 1990 adding a kitchen in the back of the building.

The Wayzata American Legion represents pride in the community. It was built on weekends, evenings and days off by people who wanted Wayzata to have a place to meet.

The City of Wayzata officials and leaders from the Wayzata Legion Post 118 are discussing the possibility of the legion post adding pull tabs. Wayzata city code and ordinances allows one establishment to offer pull tabs.

Only one organization may conduct the sale of pull tabs and only at one location as approved by the City Council (City Code 716.04 Permitted Gambling).

The Wayzata Lions Club holds the only license and operates at the city-owned Wayzata Bar and Grill. The City has the authority to expand charitable gambling licenses to additional organizations and at other locations.

Pull tabs were first offered at the Muni in 1988.

Post 118 has a gambling license and offers bingo and raffles. Its gambling proceeds go to Courage Kenny Foundation, Gillette Children's Foundation, Make-A-Wish Foundation of Minnesota, Plymouth/Wayzata Youth Baseball, Salvation Army, and the Wayzata Crime Coalition.

The Legion says it intends to donate 15-25% of the pull tab revenue to the City of Wayzata.

The Wayzata Legion has been an institution in this community for more than 100 years. It was established in 1919 and in 1948, the Post got its own building which still stands today along Wayzata Boulevard.



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
