“bubonic” plague/ “black death”	1300-1900s	flea bites	dead flesh/ulcers	lack of sanitation/hygiene unproven, inflated numbers
“smallpox”/ “cowpox”/ “horsegrease cowpox”	1700-1900s	“virus”	mult. skin eruptions	lack of sanitation/hygiene (~1854) must ignore data
“poliomyelitis”	1940-1950s	“poliovirus”	wheelchair/iron lung	DDT/lack of nutrition
“ebola”	1976-present	“ebolavirus”	blood from all orifices	mostly fiction/some poisonings
“AIDS”	1981-present	“human immunodeficiency virus” (“HIV”)	wasted flesh/K. sarcoma	diet/lifestyle/drugs (“poppers”/AZT)

Notes:

1. Where were all these fearful epidemics before they were “discovered” and entered into collective consciousness?
2. tool: “zoonotic” origin/transmission – claimed from animals to man.
3. tool: “asymptomatic” – this special claim only became prevalent in the past 5 years or so.
4. tool: poisoning through vaccination programs to prove original claim – this can be historically shown by data/graphs.
