CITY COUNCIL PASSES ANTI-ICE RESOLUTION



Lincoln City, OR— After considering five different resolution proposals regarding our community’s stance on ICE operations in our town and county, City Council members in Lincoln City voted unanimously to pass Resolution 2026-06 D. Presented to City Council by Indivisible member Mary Beth Guerena, the proposal offered the most all-encompassing language as far as opposing not just the establishment of an ICE detention facility in our county, but also opposing the establishment of an ICE base of operations in our town.

DHS has been making inquiries about long-term leasing of hotel rooms within driving distance of Newport — which includes Lincoln City. If we were to roll out the welcome mat here, it could grease the wheels for the establishment of the Newport facility.

Instead, we have chosen to stand in solidarity with our sister beach towns in protest of an ICE presence here. Doing otherwise would have certainly jeopardized the character and the commerce of Lincoln City as many of those who keep our restaurants and hotels running might no longer do so, and those who visit our town could elect to take their business to another town not occupied by ICE.

Numerous Oregon towns have recently drafted resolutions in response to the escalation of DHS/ICE activities in our communities.

A resolution, though typically not legally binding, is an official statement, expressing the position of an official body, such as a city council, on a particular topic. It can go into effect immediately.

Our City Council and those who spoke out against ICE establishing a base of operations here, either through protest, letters or by stepping up to the mic, deserve our thanks.

It was just reported before presstime that DHS is saying it no longer has plans to install an ICE detention facility at the Newport airport. But Newport leaders remain cautious due to a continued lack of transparency and communication on the part of DHS and ICE. Oregon Rep. David Gombert recently told Indivisible's Shar Walbaum, "I'm not aware of any changes. As the article states, there are no plans until at least May. That's a reprieve. 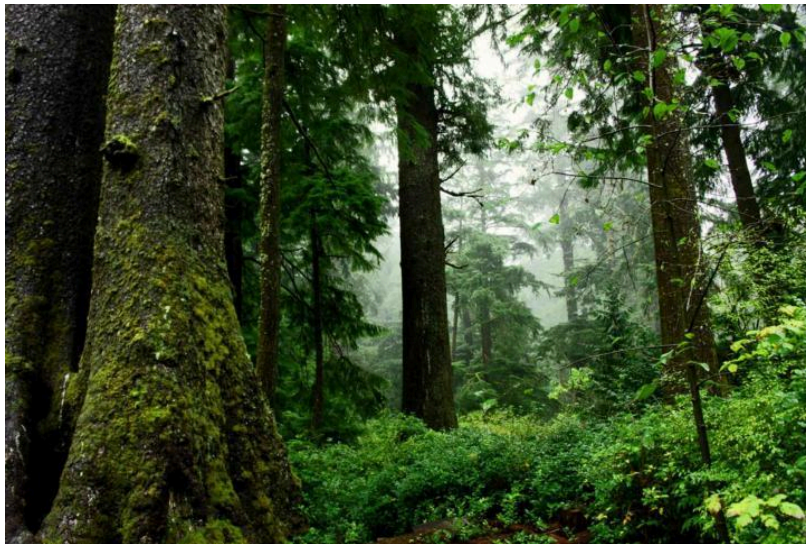


HEADS UP!



BLM PLANS TO DECIMATE OUR OLD GROWTH FORESTS

Leaving no stone unturned in its quest to destroy all that is good in our country, the Trump Administration recently announced its plans to clear cut old growth forests in Western Oregon. In order to ramp up lumber production, the BLM has set its sights directly on areas including the Valley of the Giants. The Sandy River corridor. The North Fork Clackamas. Mary's Peak. Crabtree Valley. Alsea Falls. The Upper Molalla River.



These places, encompassing 2.5 million acres across 18 counties (Lincoln County included), have been managed since 2016 by the BLM to maintain strong protections for habitat, water quality, and endangered species, while also allowing for recreation, tourism and timber harvest.

This is all about to be reversed. And there will be no public meeting. According to Acting BLM Director Bill Groffy — most recently the Senior Director of Legislative and Regulatory Affairs for the Colorado Oil and Gas Association (COGA) — the great forestry expert, President Trump “...has made it clear — enhanced domestic timber production is vital for our national security, economic prosperity, and effective wildfire management.”

Lincoln County Commissioners Narrow Down Candidates to Fill Claire Hall's Vacant Seat

NEWPORT — Remaining members on the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, Walter Chuck and Casey Miller have picked four finalists out of a field of 23 candidates to replace late Commissioner Claire Hall. Those chosen will be interviewed the week of March 16.

The candidates include: Cristen Don of South Beach, a former Oregon Department of Fish & Wildlife and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration employee; Matthew Harwell of Newport, a retired Environmental Protection Agency employee and scientist; Marci Baker, a Lincoln City council member and restaurateur; and Chris Chandler of Newport, a former Economic Development Association of Lincoln County executive director and current member of the Oregon Coast Community College board.

FINANCIALS

ILC's financial information was shared with a breakdown of expenditures and upcoming needs. Monthly, quarterly, and random but repeated donations are reported, but recurring donations would be more effective, as they would add stability to the budget.

The projected expenses for 2026 and midterms are \$6244.98, and the budget currently has \$1087.27, which leaves \$5157.71 needed. Information was shared regarding making recurring donations to indivisiblelincolncityor.org, or using the Act Blue website with a QR code. A collection was taken at the meeting of \$211 and will occur at every meeting to help boost ILC's finances for supplies and activities.

- Resistance Singers and Resistance Knitters and Crocheters.

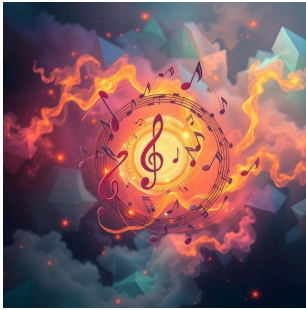

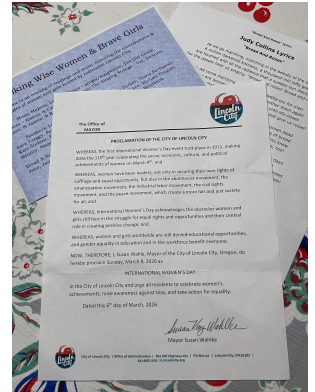

Enhancing Security in a Time of Scrutiny

Digital security is important for all of us whether attending a demonstration, or texting or emailing others in our organization. According to a technical adviser we spoke with recently, who wishes to remain anonymous for security reasons, the federal government has a wide-ranging surveillance network in place. “Your phone, laptop, tablet, car, door bell, TV, any mobile device is subject to being monitored at all times,” they said. “This includes license plate reading, location data, and multiple databases combined to map your personal and work life.”

LOCKING DOWN YOUR PHONE

But don't despair. Our adviser says the first line of defense is to lock down, not just turn off, your mobile cell phones — both IOS and Android. They recommend visiting the following links to learn how:

They add that the Electronic Frontier Foundation (EFF) at <https://www.eff.org/> is a great source of information to keep yourself digitally safe — as is the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) <https://www.aclu-or.org/>.



“An alternative to locking down your phone is to take burner phones to rallies and leave your regular phone at home. You can buy a cheap (\$29-\$39) phone at places like Walmart, Best Buy, etc,” they note, but caution, “Do not buy with a credit card, pay with cash. A credit card will link the phone to you personally and that is what we are trying to avoid. Buy prepaid cards from places like Straight Talk. Again pay cash. Every time you use a

new card you can change the phone number. However, it's best to limit the phone usage. Don't put apps on the phone. Keep it minimal. The idea is to not be traced.”

Our adviser suggests that another alternative is a Faraday bag. “Much like the cover you put on your credit cards so they can’t be read from a distance, the Faraday bag ensures the phone can’t be monitored or read,” they explain, adding that Faraday bags are inexpensive (approx. \$10), come in many different sizes, and can be found online or in some electronic stores.

OTHER STEPS TO CONSIDER

Most of us are not used to thinking about security to such a degree. But in fact, it appears to be a burning topic these days. Especially with the brewing interest in using AI for surveillance, in today’s political environment, such concerns are not unreasonable.

In addition to the above, our technical adviser urges caution regarding what we put in data streams, and advises against sharing names and Indivisible information in any form of written communication as they may be read and added to a growing database of information that the current government may use against us. This includes this newsletter.

EDITOR’S NOTE: A CONUNDRUM

The security measures for phones, especially when attending rallies, certainly make sense. And it seems wise to remain prudent when living in such volatile times. But I have queried some of ILC’s members about whether they would wish to remain anonymous in *The Tidal Wave*, and there are divided opinions.

Most of us, though, especially those of us who write op-eds and letters to the editors of papers, and speak out publicly feel that our names are already out there in spades. That horse has already left the barn. In addition, papers often will not print pieces penned anonymously.

However, I respect anyone’s wish to remain anonymous as a contributor or subject in this newsletter (please let me know). Stories can certainly be run without bylines, with a pen name, or treated as interviews with anonymous sources as this one was.



I’ve worked in publishing for years and for me, journalistic anonymity just goes against what I believe in: journalistic integrity, accountability, free press and free speech. Maybe I’m being naive, but I, for one, refuse to be silenced. What do you think?

Our Voting Rights are Under Threat

The midterms are just around the corner and it's time to begin thinking about voting. And not only the who but the how.

First, the changes in the mail pick-up schedule implemented by Louis DeJoy to reduce costs, will affect pick-ups at roughly 23,000 of our 33,700 post offices, impacting roughly 149 million voters. In addition, The United States Postal Service (USPS) finalized a rule on postmarks — the time stamp placed by the post office, which is often used to determine the date when something was sent for legal purposes. Postmarks are now applied at a regional processing facility, not at the post office. This can potentially cause blown deadlines for ballots sent by post.

A group of mostly Democratic senators sent a letter to the USPS voicing concern that mail processing changes could affect postmark dates for mail-in ballots during an election year. According to agency policy, postmarks might not indicate the first day the Postal Service received the mail but rather the day it was handled in one of its processing facilities.

MAIL IT EARLY

The Postal Service therefore advises that people dropping off mail at a post office can request that a postmark be applied manually, ensuring the postmark date matches the mailing date. Manual postmarks are free of charge. However, to ensure that ballots are received and counted, voters are encouraged to mail them early or drop them off at the nearest ballot drop box. This coming midterm will be a critical vote to strengthen our fight against fascism. Every vote will count!



In Oregon, Initiative 37, a petition to end vote-by-mail, did not receive the 156,000 signatures necessary by the July 2 deadline. The initiative would have required that elections in Oregon be held on a single day, using a paper ballot and requiring photo ID. SB210, which proposed ending universal mail-in voting in favor of in-person voting requiring photo ID also failed. We need to celebrate these failures, while still recognizing the momentum to end Vote-By-Mail continues.

Trump has been attacking Vote-By-Mail for a decade, and shows no sign of stopping. But the push back against ending VBM and claims that it fosters fraud has clearly been



effective. Not only does Oregon have a higher voter turnout than other states, 75% to 64%, it also has a low criminal fraud rate of .00006%. We need to be vigilant in protecting our voting system in Oregon.

MAKE VOTING HARDER AGAIN

Republican lawmaker, Rep. Bryan Steil (R-WI-01), recently unveiled the Make Elections Great Again Act — a new bill that would impose the most extreme federal voting restrictions in history. The measure would require photo ID and proof of

citizenship to vote, ban rank choice voting, ban universal vote-by-mail, and mandate that every state create a centralized voter database that would control federal elections.

The same day, Senator Mike Lee (R-UT) and Representative Chip Roy (R-TX) introduced the SAVE Act, a bill that raises serious concerns, particularly for women. This bill also requires photo ID and proof of citizenship to vote, requiring citizenship documents and eliminating the use of drivers' licenses or state-issued voter cards.

Nearly one-third of women voters do not have access to citizenship documents that reflect their current legal names, adding bureaucratic and economic hurdles, making it harder for women to register to vote. These bills represent an extreme threat to our voting rights and must be defeated.

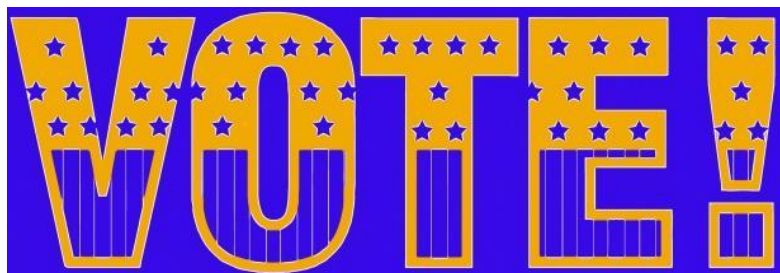

MAKE SURE YOUR VOTER INFORMATION IS UP TO DATE

Democrats up for re-election this year in our districts include US Senator Jeff Merkley, US Representative for the 4th District Val Hoyle, State Representative for District 10 (David Gomberg), and Governor (Tina Kotek). Three Lincoln County Commissioners will be up for election in a May primary, with run-offs likely in November.

If you want to vote in the May 19th Democratic primary, you must be registered as a Democrat. April 28, 2026 is the last day to register or change party affiliation, and registration cards must be postmarked by this date. To ensure you are registered, visit:

HELP GET OUT THE VOTE: PARTICIPATE IN THE POSTCARD PROJECT

Francie Meyers is becoming known for her dynamic postcard get togethers. Of a recent soiree, she notes, “We wrote 100 ‘news-boosting’ postcards in January that were mailed

out in early February. This month we wrote 600 postcards — the same ‘news-boosting’ type — that Peter and I will send out next month. Once we return from our trip mid-April, we’ll resume our efforts to GOTV via postcards in a number of states.”

In fact, at the last meeting, Meyers shared that many of us could also host postcard fill outs aimed at swing states. She says the goal is to hold three before midterms, 500 cards at a time, and a focus on voters of color. So, consider hosting in the next few weeks and months. The website is turnoutpac.org/postcards for the current project. The postcards are free and come with a script and voter name/address list.

STOP THE SAVE AMERICA ACT



The House narrowly passed the SAVE Act last month, and now it moves on to the Senate. This is really an act of voter suppression under the guise of election security, created to address a nonexistent problem of voting by noncitizens. Its passage or the passage of others like it could disenfranchise more than 21 million Americans unable to easily access required documents such as a passport or birth certificate. Those on the lower end of the economic scale and women, who often change their last names upon marriage, could be severely impacted. And it could end our beloved vote-by-mail.

The bill will likely face stronger opposition in the Senate. But this is no time to be lackadaisical. In fact, as we go to press, the SAVE Act is stalled in the Senate as Trump is saying he won’t sign any more bills until it passes. For more, see:

And don’t be afraid to pester Congress, like Oregon Coast resident Doug Holbrook and his friends did — 20 of them — mostly from the Portland Frog Brigade — showed up in DC before the President’s State of the Union speech in February. They joined their DC

frog chapter and others to co-sponsor the State of the Swamp live rebuttal event and to hand out copies of the Constitution to members of Congress, and, as Holbrook says, “to remind members of what they pledged fealty to.”

During their Fate of the Union Town Hall, Wyden and Merkley had nothing but praise for the frogs. Merkley says they’ve become a national symbol of resistance to this authoritarian takeover and to ICE, Trump’s secret police. Wyden added, “Those frogs are making us proud. They are the hit of this period of time.”
