

When **Javier Cabanillas** was a six year-old boy growing up in a little ranch in **Sonora, Mexico,** he would set up pots and pans in the yard, play the beat of "**We Are The World**" and pretend he was at a big stadium, performing '80s mega-hits in front of an enraptured audience.

The enraptured audience portion of his childhood dream has certainly come true. Since moving to **San Francisco** in 2011, Cabanillas has become one of the key conga players and bandleaders in the landscape of the **Bay area's Afro-Caribbean music.** 

"One day I sold a bunch of my stuff, packed up the car with my congas and came to San Francisco armed with no musical connections," he says with a laugh. "A friend of mine had an auto body shop in the area and put me in touch with a salsa orchestra he had hired for a party. Fortunately, this led to an opportunity to jam with them. After that fateful night, I never stopped playing."

Soon, Cabanillas was hired for a steady Monday night gig with the prestigious **Pacific Mambo Orchestra.** He ended up touring the U.S. with the band and recording a **GRAMMY winning album in 2014.** 

As time went by, he decided to develop as a composer and express his own musical ideas – influenced by traditional jazz, classic salsa and contemporary Cuban music – through his own project. An eight-piece band featuring singers and virtuoso instrumentalists, the **Cabanijazz Project** releasedits critically acclaimed debut album in 2018. Titled **Infrasonic**, it was



featured on **NPR** and **PBS** radio, also highlighted in digital playlists by DJs from all over the world.

Before moving to the U.S., Cabanillas spent 12 years crossing the border on a daily basis, living in Tijuana while working as a music teacher in schools around San Diego.

"My experience teaching percussion to people of all ages taught me about patience and discipline," he reflects. "All those lessons served me well, as I learned about the music business and built lasting relationships with many performers. When people meet me, they can see right away that I'm incredibly passionate about making music."
